### A CONFLICT AVERTED

In the Omaha Police Commission Controversy.

THE SUPREME COURT TO DECIDE.

The Contesting Bodles Come Together and Decide to Prevent a Resort to Arms by a Final Appeal, Though Both Claim to

OMAHA, Aug. 15 .- All probability of resort to arms to settle the municipal muddle over the rival police commissions is now very remote, but for two hours yesterday it looked very much as though a serious collision was inevitable. The sidewalks and streets surrounding the city hall were growded with people, and the interior of the building was crowded with sheriffs and officers. The American Protective association commission convened at 10 a. m. in this city, amid considerable excitement. The members were encouraged with cheers from 200 A. P. A.'s present. They were expected to at once place a rival police force on the streets of the city, attempt to oust Chief of Police White

and storm the city jail.

This was the schedule as given by the A. P. A.'s pretending to be on the Inside. The situation was intensified by the report from Kansas City that the A. P. A. councils had 5,000 armed men ready to send to Omaha to maintain the A. P. A. commission. At the same time the old commission was in the mayor's office, ready to issue orders to repel any force ocessary to maintain its position.

After a brief conference the A. P. A. old board before resorting to arms. conference was the result of a letter which Mayor Bemis sent to the A. P. A. board Thursday night, asking the members to meet the old board and endeavor to reach a peaceable settlement of the controversy. The members of the new board replied that they had decided to meet Mayor Bemis and his colleagues, and the mayor replied that they were ready. The two boards remained closeted for an hour or When the door was opened it was announced that an agreement had been reached. Mayor Bemis then sent a telegram, signed by himself as chairman of the old board, and by W. J. Broatch as chairman of the new board, to Governor Holcomb and A. S. Churchill, attorney

"If the supreme court will meet at an early date all the members of the two boards of fire and police commissioners will unite in a request for an early hear-

ing. Can you get the court to fix a short date? Answer." This telegram was sent to each of the

justices of the supreme court:
"All parties agree to submit the police matter to supreme court if early hearing can be had.

This was also signed by the chairman of each board. They wanted it understood that neither board had made any concession. Each side stood as it stood before, and in that respect there was no change in the situation. They had simply agreed that the best interest of all concerned would be served by submitting the case to the court. When Mr. Kandervoort was asked whether members would proceed to organize a police force in opposition to that controlled by the old board, he would not answer directly, but stated that neither board was going to be very strict on the other while the matter was pend-ing before the supreme court.

PIERRE, S. D., Aug. 15.—Ex-State Treasurer W. W. Taylor was sentenced yesterday by Judge Gaffy. When asked if he had anything to say why sentence should not be pronounced on him, Taylor in a low voice replied: "I have not." Judge Gaffy then reviewed the case and the different statutes bearing upon the crime. He considered the much discussed section 1,665 void, and did not believe a two year's sentence was intended to cover such a case as this. He considered that Taylor's worst crime was in attempting to force a compromise after gathering together all state funds he could lay his hands on. The extreme sentence, five years at hard labor in the Sioux Falls penitentiary, was then pronounced.



## THE CUBAN REBELLION.

Conflicting Reports Concerning the Fight for Independence.

CAMPOS' POPULARITY IN HAVANA.

In a Private Conversation He Declared the Revolt Would be Crushed Before Spring, but There Is a Report That He Demands 100,000 More Troops.

HAVANA, Aug. 15.-Since his arrival here, Captain General Martinez de Cam-pos has received deputations from all political parties. His personal popularity makes everybesty glad to welcome him.

Addressing the Reformists he said that

the revolution would probably develop further before the flunle.

Addressing the Autonomists he said that it was his intention to begin an active campaign in September against the insurgents in the province of Santa Clara, afterwards to attack the rebels in Puerto Principe, and lastly those in Santiago de Cuba. He promised that the next municipal elections should be absolutely free, and that he would personally rectify any

case of exercion reported to him.

In the course of a private conversation Marshal Campos expressed the opinion that dissension among the leaders would weaken the insurgent force, and that the rebellion would be crushed before spring, but there is a persistent rumor in circles usually well informed that he has cabled to Madrid that only two courses are open to Spain, namely: Either to send 100,000 troops to Cuba or to grant the island com-

plete autonomy.

low fever among the troops for the last few weeks has been 130 daily. Jose Macco has lived for the past three months on a coffee estate between Santiago de Cuba and Guantanamo. The government is aware of this, but does not attempt to attack him. The insurgents of this district levy fines from \$500 to \$1,000 on plantations. Macco has been re-supplied with ammunition from an un-
