The Education of Deaf Children. The Pennsylvania Institution for the Deaf and Dumb at Mount Airy, Philadelphia, begins its seventy sixth year of school work on September 15th. It is a free school, supported by the state, for the education of its deaf children. Applicants for admission must be six years of age, and not over twenty. Oral methods by which the deaf are taught to speak and to read from the lips are pursued, and separate intellectual and industrial departments with experienced instructors are maintained. Fall classes are now forming, and parents and friends of deaf children should lose no time in making application for their admission.
