A LYNCHING IN OHIO.

Brutal Murder of a Venerable New Richmond Banker.

THE ORIME SPEEDILY AVENGED.

The Frenzied Friends of the Dead Banker Tear the Murderer from the Hands of Officers and Hang Him to a Tree-No Attempt at Concealment.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 22 .- At New Richmond, O., twenty five miles up the Ohio river from Cincinnati, late yesterday afternoon a mob took Noah Anderson, colored, from jail and hanged him for the murder yesterday of Franklin Fridman, nearly 50 years old, and president of the First National bank of that place.

Mr. Fridman was among the wealthiest men in Clermont county. He owned a number of farms and lived at Clermontville, about two miles from New Richmond. He was driving into New Rich mond shortly after noon, when he stopped at one of his houses. Hitching his horse at the dooryard he went into an adjoin-ing field, where he was attacked by Noah Anderson, a muscular negro, who had no weapon but his hands. With these he quickly bore the banker to earth and then, clutching his throat with the power of a demon, he literally choked his victim to death. When satisfied that the man was dead Anderson fied. Soon the prostrate man was borne to the house and found to be past all help.

The news of the murder spread swiftly.

Everybody knew Mr. Fridman, and it was not long until Anderson was captured and taken to the New Richmond jail, where a great crowd quickly gathered. Anderson made no attempt to conceal his crime. He gloatingly told all the details and said he had given the old man what he deserved. It is said that Anderson was not right in his mind, and that one of his hallucinations was that Fridman had deprived him of a large sum of money. The truth is the two men had had no dealings together, as Anderson came to New Richmond on a shanty boat only a few months

mond on a sharty toat only a few months ago, and claimed to be a paperhanger.

The crowd about the jail soon became wildly excited. As the negro's confession became known cries of "Lynch him!" "Hang the coward!" arose. A rope was brought and the end seemed near. Prom-inent citizens addressed the mob, imploring moderation. Anderson was in his cell on his knees, crying for mercy. The marshal, when a momentary lull came, attempted to take Anderson to a more seours jall at Batavia, the county seat. sooner did the man appear outside the jail than the frenzied mob rushed at the marshal and, seizing the prisoner, bore him quickly to the nearest tree, and in a brief time he was dead.

There was no masking, no attempt at concealment. Every person present and engaged in the mob knew all the others. It was simply an act of frenzy under most aggravating circumstances. The murdered man was endeared to every citizen, and his taking off was so sudden that his friends and neighbors seemed to have lost their reason.

Twenty-one Bodies Recovered.

SPANISH VICTORIES

Reported from Spanish Official Sources.

REVOLUTIONARY LEADERS KILLED

Twenty-five Thousand Fresh Troops to be Sent Against the Insurgents in November-Cubans Not Vet Ready to Demand Recognition

HAVANA, Aug. 22 .- According to Spanish official advices Major Annibal, at the head of eighty-seven infantry and twentyfour cavalrymen belonging to the Camajuant squadron, was recently attacked at Liano by the vangnard, consisting of twenty men, of an insurgent force. The vanguard was commanded by Captain Gonzalez and the main body of the insur-gents, amounting to about 100 men, was commanded by Manuel Napoles, who oc-cupied strong positions. Major Ani-bal repulsed the vanguard and killed Gonzalez. He then attacked the main body, captured their positions and dispersed the insurgents, who left nine men killed and seventeen saddled horses. The troops also captured six rifles, a small number of machetes and a quantity of ammunition. On the side of the Spanish troops three men were wounded.

Information received by the Spanish authorities from the insurgent camp confirm the report that the insurgents, in the engagement fought at Rojas, lost six-

teen killed and had twenty wounded. It is officially reported that the bat-tallon of Alfonso XIII and the volunteer squadron of the business men of Havana have fought a band of insurgents in Naranjo. The insurgents were dispersed and leftt wo dead.

Colonel Oliver states that the insurgent chief Benigno Rodrigues died from the wounds received, and that in the engagement he seriously wounded the insurgent chief Quintan.

An insurgent band of braves under An insurgent band of bravos under Chief Rego attacked a detachment of troops at Barajagua. The report says that the troops made a good defense, and that the insurgents left forty dead and wounded. When they were obliged to retire they set fire to the village.

At Palanka a column of troops had an encounter with the insurgents under Chiefs Roloff and Sanchez. Sixty insurgents were killed and the remainder were pursued to the confines of the province of Puerto Principe.

The insurgent leader Mujica has been shot at Matanzas. Twenty-five thousand fresh Spanish troops will arrive here in November
