## SLAUGHTER OF INDIANS.

Another Murderous Attack on the Bannocks.

FIFTEEN REPORTED SHOT DOWN.

Killed by Cattlemen Whose Leader Sought Revenge for the Murder of His Father Seven Years Ago—Troops in Readiness to March to the Scene.

BURNS, Ore., Aug. 30.—A courier from Diamond valley reports the killing of fifteen Bannock Indians by cattlemen under the leadership of "Rye" Smith. Smith's reason was revenge for the murder of his father in 1878 in Diamond valley. There is great excitement in town and throughout the country. Troop A is in readiness to march on short notice, and is awaiting orders from the county sheriff for authority to act. Indians are reported as approaching the town from the south, but are believed to be friendly.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 30.—No further news has been received concerning the reported massacre of fifteen Bannock Indians in Diamond valley by cattlemen. At Ontario, the nearest telegraph office to the scene of the reported trouble, it is believed there is some truth in the rumor, but no further information can be secured until the arrival of the stage. There is a daily stage from Ontario, Hesper and Baker City to Burns, the county seat of Harney county, but the seat of the reported massacre is more than a hundred miles southeast of Burns. Burns is 150 miles from Ontario and it requires about forty-eight hours for the stage to make the journey. "Rye" Smith, said to be the leader of the cowboys, is known to be a bad character. It is the Bannock Indians were in that vicinity, they were there for the purpose of hunting.

A PARADISE FOR TRAMPS.

Invading the New York Hop Regions by Hundreds.

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—The hop crop of this state is in danger of ruin because of the refusal of hop pickers to work for the prices which the growers are willing to pay. It is reported that the growers expect to get their crops harvested on the same basis as to wages as last year, but the hop pickers have organized a union to enforce their demands, and if these demands are not granted at once they will strike.

The honest hop pickers in the counties of Madison and Oneida claim they are having a hard time of it. Last year they supposed that they were to receive \$1 a day and board. When settling time came they were paid only thirty cents a basket.

It was a good worker who could fill more than two baskets per day.

Just now the New York Central Railroad company's detectives and the police are having a busy time with the tramps that are flocking to the hop regions. Despite the best efforts of the officials it is almost impossible to drive them away from the cars. These tramps go to the hop fields for a good time. There is plenty to eat in the hop picking season, good hay and straw stacks to sleep in, and beer and cider abound. They lead an easy life for a few weeks, and rob whenever the opportunity is presented. Within the past ten days over 800 tramps have left New York on freight trains bound for the hop districts.

**Tragedy in a Bagno.**

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 30.—Max Nosek, of Marin, Ia., was found dead in a room in a house of ill fame here, with a bullet wound in his brain. By his side lay Hazle Hammond, an inmate of the house, with a bullet wound in her head. The lamp had been overturned, and the clothing of the dead man had commenced to burn.

It is believed the tragedy was discovered. Hazle Hammond, or Ora Minton, as her right name is said to be, is said to have come from Central City, Neb. Nosek, it is believed, was trying to induce the woman to leave the life she was leading and return to her home, and that when she refused he shot her and then killed himself.

It is reported by some that Nosek was the woman's half brother, and by others that he was her husband. The woman may live.

**Suffocated at a Lime Kiln.**

BELVIDERE, N. J., Aug. 30.—The body of an unknown man was found just on the outskirts of town. He had evidently been dead about twenty-four hours. He lay near the eye of a lime kiln on Paul's farm. It is believed that he lay down by the kiln and was overcome by the gas. The man in charge of the kiln, Harry Hess, found the body in a position that indicated a hard struggle. The man evidently was a respectable person, as he was well dressed, and those to whom he spoke said he acted like a gentleman. His age was about 35 years.

**Driven to Desperation by Taunts.**

LEBANON, Pa., Aug. 30.—The sequel to cruel taunts about his deformity was the amputation of a lad's foot in the hospital. The boy is 14 years old and resides at Cornwall. One of his feet was permanently crippled, and there were so many foolish jests about it that the boy decided to cut off his foot. On Saturday he was driven to desperation by the taunts, and seeing an ax he so mangled his lame member that it had to be amputated.

**Struck for Overdue Wages.**

MILLVILLE, N. J., Aug. 30.—The finishers and buttonhole workers employed in the shirt manufactory of A. Lispenard, of New York, struck because of the failure of the firm to pay wages which are owing them for several weeks' work. A few of the employees were paid, but as the firm failed to come up with all the money the rest of the workers struck and the factory was forced to close.

**Fatally Shot by His Uncle.**

MIFFLINTOWN, Pa., Aug. 30.—A serious quarrel occurred here when William Leech shot and dangerously wounded his nephew Edward Kepler. The latter is 19 years old, and lived with Leech. They had a fight, and the uncle shot him with a heavily charged gun.

**Two Perish in an Explosion.**

ASHLAND, Pa., Aug. 30.—An explosion of gas occurred in the Lonest Gap colliery. Two men were killed and two others were badly injured. Michael Bokal is one of the dead. It is thought a naked lamp ignited the gas.

**Her Burns Ended in Death.**

POTTSTOWN, Pa., Aug. 30.—Miss Esther Wenzel, of this place, who was terribly burned on Thursday morning while boiling soap, died Saturday evening. She was 60 years of age.

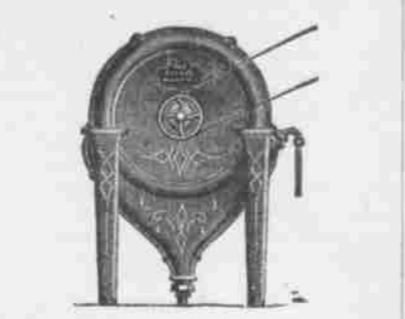

## THE TAMATAVE AFFAIR

Why Commodore Perry Did Not Salute the French Flag.

ANOTHER SENSATIONAL INCIDENT

French Authorities Attempted to Prevent Our Naval Officers from Speaking with Consul-Writer, but Subsequently Apologized—The Coming Walter Interview.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—The failure of Commodore Thomas Perry, of the United States gunboat Castine, to salute the French flag at Tamatave, Madagascar, was accentuated by a subsequent incident of a semi-sensational character, knowledge of which is made public in a statement given to the press at the navy department.

The true story of the salute incident was given in a report received by the department some time ago. In the report Commodore Perry says he did not salute the French flag because of the naval regulations, which do not require a salute to vessels of one country in the ports of another, and of our treaty with Madagascar, by which the United States recognized the Hovas government as controlling the entire island. As there was no representative of the native government on shore at Tamatave he could not salute the Hovas authority, and hence fired no salute whatever.

Commodore Perry's report tells of a misunderstanding between the French authorities on shore and officers of the Castine as to granting "pratique," or formal permission to enter the port. When the first boat of the Castine was landed the French military authorities attempted to prevent the officers from approaching or speaking with Mr. Wetter, the United States consul, and his party on the ground that "pratique" had not been given. Commodore Perry says, however, that "pratique" had been granted earlier in the day.

The French officers were very much excited, and ordered all the Americans back to their boat, one of them shoving Paymaster Dent toward it, and calling on the gendarmes to drive off the Americans as intruders. The excitement among the Frenchmen was intense, and what might have been serious trouble, according to Commodore Perry, was averted only by the coolness and judgment displayed by Ensign George R. Evans and Paymaster Dent.

Ample and full apologies both to the officers of the Castine and to the Government of the United States were promptly demanded by Commodore Perry, and the French representatives at Tamatave came aboard the gunboat the next day and made full and unreserved apologies for their misbehavior. Afterwards an apology satisfactory to Consul Wetter was offered and accepted by him. This closed the incident.

The Castine was sent to Madagascar to inquire into the imprisonment of ex-Consul Walter. That the French resented this is shown by the feeling displayed at Tamatave.

It is not true that either Ambassador Ensta, at Paris, or Minister Denby, at Peking, is to be recalled because of dissatisfaction on the part of the state department with their work.

**THE INTERVIEW WITH WALLER.**

France and America Discussing the Case in a Friendly Manner.

PARIS, Aug. 30.—Le Matin has an interview with Mr. Henry Vignaud, secretary of the United States embassy, on the subject of the Waller case. Mr. Vignaud denied that there was any question yet of demands or disagreement between France and America.

"Ambassador Ensta," Mr. Vignaud went on to say, "for the present has only asked for the production of the documents connected with the case, which were mislaid during the voyage from Madagascar. Mr. Newton B. Ensta, second secretary of the embassy and son of the ambassador, went to Clair Vaux yesterday, with the legal adviser of the embassy, to interview Mr. Waller. France and America are discussing the matter in a friendly and unimpaird spirit, and the friendly relations are unimpaired. No disagreement has arisen or could arise on this subject."

**Raceballists Charged with Murder.**

**Coming Back to be Tried for Murder.**

POTTSVILLE, Pa., Aug. 30.—Peter Parrott, the alleged murderer of Ferrer Marretti at Shanton, this county, last spring, was captured in Australia and is now being brought to this country for trial. The murdered man was found dead on the roadside with a bullet through his head, and the suspected murderer disappeared immediately and was never heard of until his capture. He will be tried at once.

**Pleaded Guilty of Arson.**

LANCASTER, Pa., Aug. 30.—Harry L. Stehman, a son of the late Senator J. M. Stehman, and formerly a cigar manufacturer of Rohrerstown, pleaded guilty of arson in having set fire to his own cigar manufactory, resulting in its destruction. Stehman is not believed to be entirely responsible. The court deferred sentence.

**Four Years for Forgery.**

LANCASTER, Pa., Aug. 30.—H. C. Coffroth, a young man of Salisbury township, convicted of forgery, was sentenced to four years' imprisonment in the penitentiary. Coffroth was previously convicted of the same offense and sentenced to the Huntingdon reformatory.

**A Colored Commissioner from Jersey.**

BORDENTOWN, N. J., Aug. 30.—Rev. William A. Rice, colored, of Bordentown, has been appointed by Governor Veras as one of the commissioners to the Cotton States International exhibition at Atlanta, Ga.

**Kidding the Mafia in Italy.**

ROME, Aug. 30.—The gendarmes and police surrounded the village of Favara, near Girgenti, and arrested forty-two members of Mafia societies on charges of murder and other outrages.
