HOWARD PITEZEL'S BODY

Discovered at Last in a Suburb of Indianapolis.

MORE EVIDENCE AGAINST HOLMES.

The Trunk in Which the Body Was Probably Removed Also Unearthed - The Boy's Body Had Been Partially Destroyed by Five, but Convicting Bones Remain.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 28,-Indianapolis will claim the right to try H. H. Helmes for murder. This claim will be based upon the horrible developments of yester-day, which include the finding of the charred remains of 3-year-old Howard Pitezel, and evidence which should convict H. H. Holmes of having murdered him and then partially burned his body in his stove. Detectives Geyer of Philadelphia, Richards of Indianapolis and Inspector Gary of the Fidelity Insurance company, have been at work for weeks hunting for traces of the boy's body. He was traced here with Holmes and disap-

The city was scoured and work began in the suburbs hunting for a house rented by Holmes on Oct. 10, 11 or 12 of last year. Yesterday morning the detectives went to Covington, a suburb of the city, and the seat of Butler college, and before they had been at work an hour their attention was called by a local real estate dealer to a small vacant cottage situated in the woods at the edge of town, and far from any other dwelling. The party went to the house, and a few minutes later the of-floers found beneath the side porch the missing trunk which was taken from the side door of the Circle House in this city on Oct. 10 by H. H. Holmes, and which was thought to contain the body of the boy. In a barn connected with the house was a large stove of cylindrical shape, of the same pattern as Holmes bought in

Late last evening Dr. J. F. Barnbill's attention was called by a small boy named Walter Jenny to the stove hole where the stove had been. It was filled with refuse. This was pulled out and the remains of the boy were found. Physi-cians and dentists were there, and in this pile of refuse hundreds of pieces of char-red bones were found. The teeth showed that the body was that of a boy between 8 and 10 years of age, and all the other bones confirmed this. All were charred and pieces of flesh clung to some of them. The skull bones and polvis added to the same convincing truth.

The boy had evidently been burned in a coal fire in the huge stove found in the barn. Howard's overcoat was found at a grocery store near by, where Holmes had left it, saying the boy would call for it. He never came. Owners of the house recognized Holmes from the pictures shown them. All identify him as the man who, last October, rented the house with the same story he told in Toronto and other places, came with the boy and and the big stove, wash stand and bed, stayed two days, and then disappeared. Several people have identified him, and all doubt is removed.

One of Holmes' Statements Disproved. CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—Minnie Williams was never at the Presbyterian hospital. as claimed by H. H. Holmes in his recent statement. Dr. Stamer, of the hospital medical staff, said: "I have read Holmes" statement. It is absolutely untrue that Minnie Williams was a patient at this hospital in 1893 or at any time. Holmes' story is false on the face of it. He says



MAY SHOOT TO KILL

In Order to Prevent Prize Fighting in Dallas.

SHERIFF CABELL'S INSTRUCTIONS.

Attorney General Crane Assures Him That the Coming Together of the Pogilists Would be a Rictous Assemblage, and Must be Prevented at All Hazards.

AUSTIN, Tex., Aug. 28.—Attorney Gen eral Crane today gave out his second apinion aneut the Corbett-Fitzsimmons prize fight at Dallas in October. This opinion was called for by an interrogatory propounded by Sheriff Cabell, of Dallas county, as to whether, in suppressing the fight, he was legally suppowered to shoot and kill those who interferred with him.

The matter was referred to the attorney general by the governor, and in his opin-ion he holds that in the discharge of his duty the sheriff certainly has the right to use frearms if emergency demands. The attorney general bases his opinion on the statutes governing riots, etc. He holds that the participants in the fight, their seconds, referee, etc., will comprise more than three people, and inasmuch as they are assembled for the purpose of violating one of the statutes they are an unlawful or riotous assemblings and lay themselves or riotous assemblage and by themselves liable to summary dealings if the emer-

gency arises.

The attorney general argues that the fighters, with all those in attendance, will certainly be a gathering in violation of the law, and that under the law the sheriff or any sworn peace officer is bound to disperse said assemblage at any cost. As to the question of killing those who interfere with him, the attorney general cites article 66 of the penal code, which says: "Homicide is justifiable when necessary to suppress a riot, when the same is attempted to be suppressed in the man-ner pointed out in the code of crime procedure, and can in no way be suppressed except by taking life."

The attorney general also adds at the close of his opinion that while he does not think there will be any occasion for the sheriff to shoot any one in a peaceable city like Dallas, that if the emergency does arise that will necessitate his shooting and killing those who interfere with his duties, that he will in no wise be held responsible for the murder.

Boston, Aug. 28.—George Dixon, the colored lightweight boxer of Boston, was given the decision last evening over Johnny Griffin, the "Braintree Lad," at the end of a twenty-five round match held under the auspices of the Farragut club, in the Newton street armory. The decision was a surprise to the majority of the 3,000 people present, it having been generally understood that there was to be no decision if both men were on their feet at the end of the twenty-fifth round, unless, perhaps, there should be a decided difference in the condition of the boxers. Both men were certainly in very good condition at the end of the twenty-fifth round, al-though Dixon had done the better work of the two. Griffin surprised his friends by Dixon's punishment, and they confidently expected a draw.

Starter Caldwell in a Fist Fight. DETROIT, Aug. 28 -A sensation was created at the Windsor track yesterday. The well known horseman, Frank Ireland, was remonstrating with Delaney (starter Caldwell's assistant) for whipping the boy on Hanban while the horses were at the post. Caldwell took up the quarrel and stepped out of the stand. He and Ireland clinched and exchanged several blows. The executive committee, after the race, promptly cancelled their engagement with Caldwell and fined Ireland \$500.


