IN THE WORLD IN AN INSANE ASYLUM.

London's Famous "Jack the Ripper" Safe in Confinement.

HIS IDENTITY FULLY ESTABLISHED

A Young Medical Student Whose Mind Had Become Unbalanced Through Over Study. The Fact of His Incarceration Bevealed by an Eminent English Physician.

NEW YORK, Sept. 2.-Dr. Forbes Winslow, of London, a well known specialist on suicide and insanity, says that "Jack the Ripper," who by his crimes terrorized London's few years ago, is incarcerated in a county lunatic asylum in England. Dr. Winslow says this fact is known to the authorities, but they have hushed up the case. The doctor has come to New York to attend the medico-legal congress, which will be held Sept. 4, 5 and 6. He will be chairman of the department of insanity and mental medicine, and has prepared a saper on "Suleide Considered as a Mental Epidemie.

The story told by Dr. Winslow follows: "Jack the Ripper" was a medical stu-dent, of good family. He was a young man, of slight build, with light hair and blue eyes. He studied very hard, and his mind, being naturally very weak, gave way. He became a religious enthusiast, and attended early service every morning

at St. Paul's. His religious favor resulted in homicidal mania toward the women of the street, and impelled him to murder them. He lodged with a man whom I knew, and sus-picion was first directed toward him by reason of the fact that he returned to his lodgings at unseasonable hours, and that be had innumerable coats and hats stained with blood.

I have in my possession now a pair of Canadian mocessins stained with blood that the "Ripper" wore while on his murderons expeditions. I notified the Scotland Yard authorities, but at that time they refused to co-operate with me. Subscquently the young man was placed in con-finement and removed to a lunatic asylum, where he is today. Since his incarceration there has been no reptition of the horrible

murders that he perpetrated.
These facts are all known to the English authorities, and it is conceded that the man now in the asylum is "Jack the Rip-per." It was deemed desirable, however. to hush the matter up. The details were too horrible to be made the subject of a public trial, and there was no doubt of the man's hopeless insanity.

TO SET IRELAND FREE.

The Meeting of the Irish Revolutionary Party in Chicago.

NO HOPE THROUGH PARLIAMENT.

The Call for the Convention Declares That There Is No Hope for Legislation in the Interest of Ireland from Either Liberal or Tory Governments.

Chicago, Sept. 2.—The official call for the convention of the new Irish movement to be beld in Chicago, Sept. 24, 25 and 26, has been issued from the headquarters of the executive committee of the organiza-

The Irish struggle for freedom has reached a momentous period. Ireland, abandoned in the crisis of her fate by the Liberal lenders, is told by the Tory seers tary to the Iord Bentonant that the British government is sternly and unafterably op-posed to the greating of any measure of home rule whatever. This is the old policy and the language employed by successive English governments toward Ireland. She has been alternately berrayed by the Whigs and dragooned by the Torles. Nothing worth her acceptance is to be expected from either of the leading English parties.

"Ireland must, therefore, look to her own children and their descendants for support in her great extremity. Parliamentary agriculton has had a long and patient trial, but has interly failed to accomplish its object. It remains for us to consider what other method of proceedure or argument can be used to achieve her liberation.

"The Irish race in America cannot afford to be neutral or supine, while the mother-land is being slowly but surely done to death by the usurpating enactments of a foreign and hostile power. In unison with thousands of our race distributed through-out the Union, and after mature deliberation, the undersigned have decided to call a convention of Irish-Americans to take into consideration the present status of the Irish struggle for freedom, and to devise ways and means best suited to the accom-

plishment of Ireland's independence.
"The qualifications for membership in the convention are agreed upon as follows: All Irish American military, benevolent, athletic, social, religious and literary organizations that favor the independence of Ireland, and are willing to aid her rightous struggle for liberty are invited to send one delegate for every fifty members, and one additional for every fraction over lifty; two delegates for every hundred members, and one additional for any fraction over a hundred, and so on in proportion."


