THE TRIAL OF DURRANT.

It is Still Attracting Crowds of Curiosity Seekers.

THE ALLEGED MOTIVE A "FAKE"

Young Wolfe, Who It Was Said Would Give Most Damaging Evidence Against the Accused, Declares He Knows Nothing Against Him.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 6.—The Durrant trial still continues to attract big crowds who are willing to stand for hours at a time just to catch a glimpse of the little mild-faced, Jewish-looking individual accused of two feathery murders.

In reference to the story to the effect that Durrant had told Clarence Wolfe, an intimate friend of his, intention to kill Miss Lamont, The Chronicle prints the following statement from Wolfe:

"I don't see," said Wolfe, "how such a story originated. I am at a loss to know where it came from. Not a line of the article is true, not a line. I am not, and never have been, an intimate friend of Theodore Durrant. I have known him a long time, but I was not in any way intimate with him. We were friendly acquaintances, but nothing more. I rarely had any conversation with him, unless we met at some kind of a church gathering. I know nothing against Durrant."

The most important witness was Dr. Barrett, who testified that the post-mortem examination on the body of Miss Lamont showed a cruel murder, the result of a stab wound accompanied by the murder was found.

Most of yesterday's sessions were devoted to a description of the diagram of Emanuel church introduced as exhibits by both sides. Both prosecution and defense had had drawings of the church made to show the exact spot where Miss Lamont was murdered. Each attorney wished his drawing only to be introduced, and the greater part of the day was spent in wrangling over the respective merits. The only witnesses examined were the draughtsmen who prepared the diagram.

As the taking of testimony proceeds interest in the trial continues. People seem hungry for details, and even unimportant statements by witnesses are eagerly listened to by those fortunate enough to obtain admission to the court room.

In the event of a repetition of the struggling of the crowds around the entrance of the court room, the police have arranged to have a line of policemen extending down the corridors, and allow only those to pass who have business at the trial.

An Italian Will Succeed Mgr. Satolli. ST. PAUL, Minn., Sept. 6.—Regarding the elevation of Mgr. Satolli to the cardinalate, Dr. O'Gorman, of the Washington University, said: "My personal opinion is that the monsignor will probably be made a cardinal in the near future, but just when, of course, no one can tell. After this great honor has been conferred upon him he will remain in this country for some time, perhaps a few months, until his successor is named. Mgr. Satolli's successor would decidedly not be an American. His successor will be an Italian."

Death of a Veteran Engineer. BETHLEHEM, Pa., Sept. 6.—Peter Stoyers, said to be the oldest engineer in the country, who has been frequently honored by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, died yesterday, aged 78 years. He ran engines on the Lehigh Valley, the Reading and the Jersey Central lines for forty-six years, and never had an accident. Railroaders have computed that he ran locomotives a distance equivalent to forty times around the globe.
