

CLEVELAND PRESSES THE BUTTON.

Thousands Witness the Formal Inaugural Exercises-Half of the Nations of the Earth Represented in the Grand Procession-Addresses by Prominent Speakers.

ATLANTA, Sept. 18.—This morning at 6 o'clock the gates of the Cotton States and International exposition were thrown ajar and for 120 days, till the bells in the chimes tower toll the knell of the dying year, the exposition will be open to the people of the world. The opening was the greatest event in the history of the big show. Half of the nations of the earth are represented in the procession today and the more prominent speakers of the country addressed the mul-titude that gathered in the Auditorium to
