CHOLERA IN THE ORIENT

Japan and North China Fairly Alive with Germs.

SEVENTEEN THOUSAND DEATHS.

Notwithstanding the Efforts of the Officials to Suppress the News in Regard to the Plague the Truth Has at Last Come to Light—An Edict from the Emperor.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 19.—Notwithstanding the efforts of the Chinese and Japanese officials to suppress the news in regard to the cholera the truth has at last come to light concerning the plague. Japan and North China are fairly alive with cholera germs. Siberian officials have declared Japanese ports infected, and from official sources it is learned that over 17,000 people have died in Japan from the plague since its start in Pescadores. In China the disease has gained a firm foothold.

Advices by the steamer Rio Janeiro report that in Tokyo the heat is terrific and the disease germs have been nursed by the climate into virulent life. On the Rio Janeiro little could be learned concerning Yokohama, but nevertheless the plague is raging there. In China, at Hio Poo, the disease is spreading rapidly. Miss Turner and the child of Dr. and Mrs. McFarland of the Chu Chai London mission, were stricken and died. At Nanking much illness prevails among the foreigners, many of them having been forced to flee from the country. The ravages of cholera in Japan are far greater than have been reported. Up to Aug. 28, just before the Rio Janeiro sailed, 17,358 deaths from the disease were reported.

THE CHINESE RIOTS.

An Edict from the Emperor Against Such Outbreaks.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 19.—The attitude of the emperor of China in relation to the recent outbreaks against missionaries is shown in an edict recently issued by the emperor, which is published in a local paper.

The emperor says: "Since the opening of international commerce with western countries foreigners have always resided in our empire in peace and harmony with their native neighbors, and we, in our imperial love for both natives and foreigners alike, have time and again commanded our high provincial authorities to pay extra heed constantly to protect the latter from harm."

"Judge of our extreme indignation then upon hearing recently first of the riots in the capital of Szechuen, where chapels have been destroyed and burned down by the rioters, thereby fanning the flames of destruction far and wide, in so much that a number of sub-province and sub-districts simultaneously followed in the footsteps of Cheng-Tu, and now to receive news from Fu-Kien, reporting that evil characters have murdered and wounded a very large number of foreigners at Kuitien, going so far in their ruthless ferocity as to murder even women and infants."

"With reference to the Szechuen riots, a number of rioters have already been arrested, and will undergo trials, but the chiefs and heads of the Fu-Kien murderers are still at large, and we commanded Pin Pao Chuan and Chin Yu (Tartar general of Foo-Chow) to set to work without delay at the head of the military and district officers and speedily arrest these wicked characters, for none shall be allowed to escape the meshes of the law."

"We would command the various Tartar generals, viceroys and governors of the empire to impress upon all their subordinates the necessity of granting thorough protection to all the chapels, etc., in the districts. They are also to issue proclamations exhorting the people to abstain from listening to scurrilous tales which excite unfounded suspicions in the breasts of all. If there be any who shall dare to raise disturbances in the future they shall be at once punished with the utmost severity of the law."

Little value is attached by foreigners to this edict. It is now well understood that the orders of the emperor of China have virtually no force outside the walls of Peking. On several previous occasions edicts even more forcibly worded have emanated from the throne, but foreign property and foreign lives remain as insecure as ever in the interior of China.

The Kuohong Executions.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 19.—Although the more humble among those concerned in the massacre of missionaries at Kuohong have been punished, the utmost efforts of the British consul have been unavailing to induce the authorities to deal with the viceroys of the province and with other high officials, who are alleged to have been responsible for the riots. It is hoped that Great Britain will insist that these offenders shall be brought to justice.

Fatal Fire in Wisconsin.

OSHKOSH, Wis., Sept. 19.—Oshkosh had a \$200,000 fire yesterday and before it was extinguished, a sash and door factory, one of the largest in the country; a wagon factory, 6,000,000 feet of lumber, two brick saloons and a number of dwellings were destroyed. John Zellman, foreman of the sash department of the Morgan company, went back into the factory after his tools and lost his life. His charred remains were recovered last night.

Silver Forces United.

CHICAGO, Sept. 19.—The free silver forces of the United States are now united and headquarters will be established in Chicago. General A. J. Warner, president of the National Bimetallic league, is the president of the consolidated body, and Secretary Edward B. Light, of the American Bimetallic union, occupies a similar position in the new body.

Fatally Gored by a Bull.

BETHLEHEM, Pa., Sept. 19.—In attempting to stop a runaway bull yesterday afternoon Mrs. Jesse LaBar, aged 65 years, of Bangor, near here, was gored so severely that she will die. Her skull was split open, exposing the brain.

Ten Years for Alleged Blackmail.

LONDON, Sept. 19.—Geoffrey Perkins, an American who represented himself to be a lawyer and journalist, has been sentenced to ten years at penal servitude on the charge of levying and collecting blackmail.

Gunboats for Cuba.

GLASGOW, Sept. 19.—The gunboats which have been constructed for the coast guard of Cuba have been completed, and their crews left Cadix yesterday on the convoy Alexander XIII for Cuba.

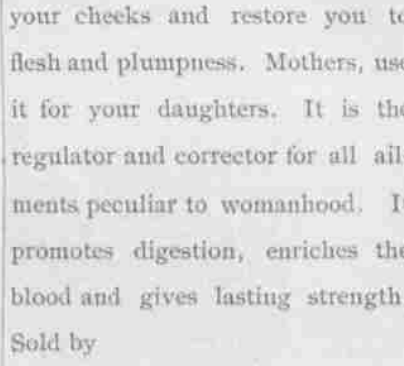

DEATH OR BANISHMENT.

Cuban Revolutionists to be Executed.

VERY PORTENTOUS ULTIMATUM

The Spanish President Declares That in November the Island Will be Surrounded by Cruisers, and It Will be Faced by the Rebels by a Vigorous Campaign.

HAVANA, Sept. 19.—Madrid cable dispatches of Sept. 19 are published in this city. They give the official views of Senor Canovas del Castillo, of Madrid, acting for the government of Spain, concerning the rebellion in this island.

His manifesto is a carefully prepared document, leaving internal evidence of the closest thinking, as well as an intimate knowledge of the whole situation. It clearly is the government program under which the highest authority in Spain has directed its operations since the outbreak of the rebellion. The portion of the rebels will be death or deportation.

The eastern end of the island will be freed from all rebels and their adherents. It will be war to extermination or surrender against all Cuban rebels, macheteros and the like. The military organization will be full and complete. It will be root and branch work this time; no fool will be allowed to remain to create future disturbances. Hereafter Cuba will be for Spain. Spain will enter on the full campaign with only one object in view—the immediate and absolute subjugation of the island. The portion of the rebels will be death or deportation.

Amid the many and very necessary precautionary measures, one will have an instant and appreciable effect on the rebels, who need arms, ammunition and supplies. Early in November when the war vessels are reinforced by the new gunboats, the whole island will be surrounded by two lines of war vessels. One line will cruise in an inner circle and one in an outer circle—practically a huge blocking fleet of some sixty modern warships. It is believed that this arrangement will absolutely preclude the landing of any men or supplies. It will isolate the rebels from all outside aid and sympathizers.

The government of Spain realizes the extent of this island's fleet—nearly 2,000 miles—and the many facilities it offers to the rebels and their allies for landing stores and men.

Senor Canovas del Castillo denounces the men in the field as "a band of bandits, to whom belligerent rights will not be accorded." "That kind of warfare," he says, "is wholly unknown to the Cuban rebels, whose sole object is robbery, murder and incendiarism."

The manifesto simply confirms what has been decided upon here in Cuba. It is an ultimatum of ominous portents to the rebels.

Eighteen persons were arrested here yesterday upon the charge of being concerned in the insurgent cause. Among the number arrested was the secretary of Julio Sagrally, who several months ago was arrested and committed to Moro Castle on the charge of treason.

The Alleged Filibusters on Trial.

WILMINGTON, Del., Sept. 19.—In the trial of the twenty Cubans charged with organizing a filibustering expedition yesterday's session was devoted to the hearing of witnesses for the government. Marshal Lauman told a detailed story of the capture of the Cubans, the substance of which has already been published. He was followed by Captain Nicholson, of the tug "Thauria," Robert H. Graham, Albert Stone, Charles D. Higgins and Lewis P. Bush, all of whom testified as to the hiring of the tug and the expedition. Their testimony contained no new developments.

More Spanish Consuls for Florida.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—An evidence of the active efforts being made by the Spanish government to frustrate the departure of filibustering expeditions from the south to Cuba is afforded by the appointment of four Spanish consular officers for Florida alone. The Spanish minister called at the state department with a statement obtained from the Spanish consul at Key West, that the Lark, the schooner seized yesterday, was only a part of an extensive filibustering expedition fitting out in Florida waters.

Banker McKinney Turns Up.

STEAMBOAT SPRINGS, Colo., Sept. 19.—News reached here of the finding of Glen Ford McKinney, son of a banker of Titusville, Pa., and his safe return to the hunting camp. On the day of his disappearance young McKinney had won the week, which he followed until dark. He was followed to camp that night, and the following day he met some other hunters, with whom he remained until he could get conveyance to his own camp.

Wheeled Off the Safe.

HOWELL, Mich., Sept. 19.—Burglars broke into the carpenter shop of M. J. Dempsey & Son, secured tools, and then forced an entrance to the saloon of Frank Smock. They loaded the safe on a push cart, and proceeded but a short distance when the cart broke down. They then transferred the safe to a wheelbarrow, and hauled it a mile and then cracked it. It contained nothing.

Another Seizure of Smuggled Goods.

ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Sept. 19.—Another seizure of smuggled goods has just been made here, a recently opened jewelry store being raided and several cases of watches and valuable gems seized. All the property is of a character that could easily be brought into the country without the knowledge of the customs authorities.

Charged with Smuggling Diamonds.

CHICAGO, Sept. 19.—Raphael Cordina, a Mexican youth, was arrested at the Palmer House, charged with smuggling diamonds. Gems to the value of \$4,000 were found in his baggage. He claims the jewels were placed there without his knowledge by his father, a merchant at Vera Cruz.

Saw a Schooner Sink.

DETROIT, Sept. 19.—A special from Alpena, Mich., says: The crew of the schooner Kitcher report that when crossing Saginaw bay yesterday they saw a schooner capsized and sink within twenty minutes. A gale was blowing at the time and the Kitcher could not assist them.

Forged His Father's Name.

CHICAGO, Sept. 19.—C. M. Emerson, son of J. E. Emerson, a wealthy manufacturer of Beaver Falls, Pa., was arrested yesterday charged with forging his father's name. Emerson is charged with having passed forged checks at Norfolk, Va., and Minneapolis.
