OYSTER BAY, L. L. Sopt. 30 .- The Seawanhaka Yacht club's perpetual challenge cup for small boats will not be carried away this year by an English champion. In the last of the international races, sailed on Saturday, on a triangular course of twelve miles off Oyster Bay, the little Etholwynn fairly ran away from the Brit-ish challenger, Spruce IV, crossing the finish line to the music of shricking steam whistles, booming cannon and ringing cheers, a winner by ten minutes and forty one seconds. The ease with which the Ethelwynn car-

ried off the honors was a surprise to even her most ardent admirers. Two victories stood to the credit of each little racer, and it was expected that the decisive struggle would be a close one, but in a stiff breeze, and in the sort of salling in which the visitor is at her best, the little Yankee showed her a clean pair of heels over the whole course.


Two Killed at the Gun Proving Grounds. NEW YORK, Sept. 30.-During a test of a Canet rapid firs gun at the Sandy Hook proving grounds the breech block blew out as it was being acrewed in, instantly killing two privates of the ordnance department, who were serving the gun, and injuring two more, one of whom will probably die. Lieutenant Montgomery, who was conducting the test, escaped with a concussion of the ear drum. The dead are: Corporal Robert Doyle, 35 years old, of Philadelphia, instantly killed; Private Frank Conway, of Green Island, instantly killed. Private James Coyne was cut on forehead and neck and face, and will probablydie. Private William McDonald had his left arm above the elbow blown away.


