STUART DETERMINED.

Looking for a Place for the Corbett-Fitzsimmons Fight.

SEVERAL BIDS FOR THE CONTEST.

It is Wanted in Indian Territory, Oklahoma and Mexico, with Present Prospects Favoring Either Juarez, Laredo or Diaz, in Mexico.

DALLAS, Tex., Oct. 4.—Dan Stuart has been in consultation all day with railroad representatives of the Santa Fe and the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railroads. The first named with the fight to take place at Ardmore, I. T., while the M. K. & T. is trying to get it at Colbert's, on its line, a few miles north of Denison. Stuart is undecided, but the general opinion is that if the fight takes place in Indian Territory it is more likely to be at Colbert's than any where else. There is much bitter feeling here against Governor Culberson. Many usually conservative citizens declare he ought to be burned in effigy.

A large number of propositions were received over the wire by Mr. Stuart from



parties who desire to have the championship contest pulled off in their respective cities or states, as the case may be. There were a number from Mexico, and others from the Indian Territory and Oklahoma. It is understood that Joseph Vendig, of New York, and other interested parties have been requested to come to Dallas for a conference with the president of the club. Nothing definite will be known until after the interested parties have conferred and agreed upon a place for the meeting of the best fellows, and the line of action to be pursued.

MEXICO'S BID FOR THE FIGHT.

Absolute Guarantee of Non-Interference in Three Different Towns.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Oct. 4.—Charles Campbell and several other parties in this city, among them a Mexican official, have made a proposition to Dan Stuart to get a concession in Mexico to pull off the fight there. Stuart has agreed, if absolute immunity from interference is guaranteed. The gentlemen, who have very high and influential connections in Mexican official life, received telegrams announcing that the state of Chihuahua and Coahuila and Tamaulipas had granted concessions to pull off a "general athletic and bull fighting exhibition" in those states Oct. 31. Which, if any of these concessions will be used, will not be determined for several days. If the Chihuahua concession should be used the fight will come off at Juarez, which is just across the river from El Paso. Laredo and Diaz are the towns in the other two states. Each town will be asked to contribute toward the expense, and the amount of the contributions will be an element in selecting the place. The concessions carry with them an absolute guarantee of non-interference. There is a bull ring at each place capable of seating from 18,000 to 20,000 people. These will have to be repaired, and the railroads touching those points have volunteered to defray the expense of repairing them.

The gentlemen who have received the concessions are under contract to turn them over to Dan Stuart free of cost. They are to get their remuneration from the bull fights. Already they have contracts with the famous troupe of toreros in Mexico, and have received six bulls, which are said to be the most ferocious animals in the country.

President Diaz Prohibits the Fight.

CITY OF MEXICO, Oct. 4.—The Associated Press agent endeavored to secure the opinion of President Diaz on the question of allowing the prize fight between Corbett and Fitzsimmons in Mexican territory, but the president was in seclusion with the members of his family on account of the death of his father-in-law, Manuel Romero Rubio. An intimate of the president, however, said the question had already been decided on at a consultation with the governor of Chihuahua. The president had promulgated a prohibition of the fight occurring on Mexican soil. General Diaz is opposed to the introduction of prize fighting here, and is extremely firm in the matter. This is absolutely authentic, and disposes of the matter.

California Wants It, Too.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 4.—A local paper says there is a strong probability that an effort will be made to have the Corbett-Fitzsimmons fight take place in San Mateo county under the auspices of the Colma Athletic club. It is openly stated that the prize fighting permit at Colma was obtained with a view of getting some big fight, the Corbett-Fitzsimmons physical contest preferred. Dan Stuart, the manager of the fight, has stated that he had three places in view, two of which he named as Mexico and the Indian Territory. The third place he did not mention. It is believed that he had California in mind.

Found in an Ostrich Den.

TOLEDO, O., Oct. 4.—The police discovered and raided an ostrich den in the heart of the city conducted by a Chinaman. Among the seven English speaking inmates were two girls, said to be daughters of prominent citizens. Their names were suppressed, but it is learned that one is the daughter of a leading capitalist and the other of a well known railroad man. Considerable of a sensation is the result.

Senator Mahone's Condition.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—There had been no change in ex-Senator Mahone's condition up to midnight. The attending physicians have failed to notice any improvement and hold out no hope.

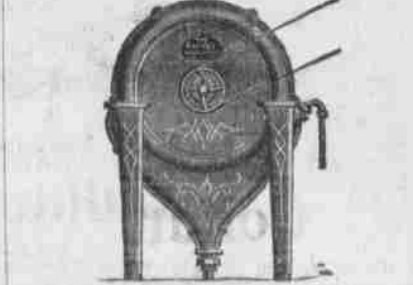

YALE VS. CAMBRIDGE.

All Ready for the Great International Athletic Contests.

YALE MEN IN FINE CONDITION.

From a social point of view the Yale men will exhibit a striking contrast to the Cambridge men in this country—some of the celebrities who will be present.

New York, Oct. 4.—Nothing remains to be done in the way of preparations for the great Yale-Cambridge athletic contest, which will take place on November 30. That it will be a memorable and athletic international affair is without question, and that Yale will get revenge for her defeat last year by Oxford in London is no doubt. The visiting athletes have experienced difficulties in getting to New York, but they are enjoying the city and are ready to render the match a highly successful one.

Albion Jordan, who acted as starter for the New York-London Athletic club's games, has been invited to act in the same capacity tomorrow. Mr. Jordan has accepted the position, and if he acquires himself well he will do so every one will be satisfied. The track and field are in fine shape.

The excitement of conducting a meet with only one day's notice has been aided with gladness by all lovers of the sport. It is especially an English idea, and if successfully introduced here it will probably be adopted by all athletic clubs.

All the Yale men are in fine condition, thanks to Miss Murray, Yale's able trainer. Murray is really a wonderful man, and it is said that he has received a handsome offer to go with a western club, but he will not leave Yale. Even with Stanford out the Yale boys are confident of a glorious victory.

Major program personnel will attend the games, including Mayor Strong, Mr. Whitney, Chauncey M. Depew, Cornelius Vanderbilt, John Jacob Astor, Sir Julian Pauncefote, and probably the young Duke of Marlborough. From the social point of view the meet will certainly be one of the kind ever seen in this country.

Captain Jordan has decided upon his first and second strings as follows, with the order of events as they will be run:

Hundred yard run, Lewin and Wilding; 200 yard hurdle race (over cinders), Fletcher and Pilkington; high jump, Johnson and Jennings; 300 yards run, Fitzherbert and Lewin; putting sixteen pound shot, Watson; half mile run, Horan; broad jump, Mendelson and Jennings; mile run, Lyons and Davenport; throwing sixteen pound hammer, Johnson and Jennings; quarter mile run, Fitzherbert and Lewin; 150 yard hurdle race (over turf), Fletcher and Pilkington.

Reading's Big Firemen's Parade.

READING, Pa., Oct. 4.—Yesterday was one of the greatest days Reading has ever seen. The parade was under the auspices of the State Firemen's Association, and was a magnificent, unequalled success. The streets were a mass of humanity all forenoon, and when the parade moved were simply packed. The universal verdict was that the parade was a credit alike to the local firemen and the organizations that participated, both from Pennsylvania and neighboring states. It was a superb turnout of the finest of the fire fighters from nearly 150 cities and towns. There were over 10,000 men in line, and 100 companies in all. The railroad companies carried 50,000 people.

Blown to Bits by Nitro-Glycerine.

MONTEPELIER, Ind., Oct. 4.—Andrew Cain and William Gross, coal miners, lost their lives in a peculiar manner near here. The men had built a fire over some nitro-glycerine that had been buried in the ground. An explosion followed, which blew both men to atoms. Large trees nearby were torn out by the roots, and pieces of flesh and clothing were hanging from their limbs. It is not known how the cans came to be buried. There is a nitro-glycerine magazine near the scene of the accident.

Another Speedy Two-Year-Old.

PORTLAND, Me., Oct. 4.—At Rigby Park yesterday Bingen, son of Mary King, who was recently bought by J. Malcolm Forbes, the owner of Arion, for \$8,000, won an exhibition mile in 2:12. Bingen made the first quarter in 33 seconds, the half in 1:05 and the three-quarters in 1:38. Outside of Arion's world's 2-year-old record of 2:02, Bingen's mark is the best ever made by a horse of his age.
