TO OPPOSE TAMMANY.

A Strong Union of Forces in New York City's Contest.

A FUSION TICKET NOMINATED.

It is Indorsed by Both the Republicans and the State Democrats in Their County Conventions, and Will Probably Suit the German-American Reform Union.

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—There was considerable excitement before the formal opening of the Republican county convention in Lyric hall last evening when the report was received that a fusion ticket had been decided upon, and that the nominating committee had agreed on the following candidates:

For register, Thomas F. Keating (State Democrat); county clerk, Thomas Z. Livingston (Platt Republican); justices of the supreme court, Ernest Hall (Platt Republican), C. C. Beaman (Independent Republican) and Myer S. Isaacs (Republican and Good Government candidate); judges of the court of general sessions, Thomas Allison (Platt Republican) and John Fennell (State Democrat); city court justices, Henry C. Bratty (Platt Republican), Daniel O'Connell (State Democrat) and James W. Hayes (Republican).

The ticket was finally agreed upon at the conference at Republican headquarters, which lasted almost to the hour of holding the convention. It was a great disappointment to the "straight ticket men," as three places had been conceded to the State Democracy, one to the committee of fifty and one to the Good Government club. There were left but four Platt Republicans on the ticket, as James W. Hayes has not been identified with either faction. The Sixteeners' independent county organization and the Jimmie O'Brien anti-Tammany Democracy were refused a place on the ticket. Edward Lauterbach, however, and the other Platt leaders expressed themselves as satisfied with the ticket.

The Republicans and State Democrats both held county conventions and formally placed in nomination the fusion ticket. It is expected that the German-American Reform union will indorse the ticket, because the ex-cisive plank of the State Democracy is indorsed. The plank charges Tammany Hall with responsibility for the existence of the present ex-cisive law, speaks of the sanctity of the Sabbath, and concludes:

"We favor, and will endeavor to secure, such modification of existing laws as will prevent blackmail, partiality and oppression, and will enable the city to determine for itself, by popular vote, whether the sale of food, beverages and other necessities shall be permitted on Sunday, during such hours and under such restrictions as will not interfere with religious observance and exercise."

THE CHARGES AGAINST COLLECTOR HERRING.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—Internal Revenue Collector Grant Herring, of the Saratoga district, has been in Washington to see Commissioner Miller in connection with charges against the former that were filed by a Mr. Burke, formerly an income tax deputy in the office. While the specific nature of the charges cannot be ascertained, it is understood that they are of a personal nature and also reflect on Mr. Herring's management of his office. Commissioner Miller declined to say anything about the charges further than that they had been made and would be investigated.

INVENTORS SHOULD FACE THE DANGER.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—General Flagler, chief of ordinance, has just received the report of Lieutenant Colonel F. H. Parker, who made an expert investigation of the accident at the Sandy Hook proving grounds on the 28th ult., in which the blowing out of the breech of a Coast rapid fire gun caused the death of two enlisted men and the wounding of three others. The expert finds that the firing pin of the new gun was too long and of defective shape. No one is found blameable, but it is suggested that hereafter the inventors be required to do their own firing.

POWERS OF A BISHOP.

Fuller Attempt to Curtail Them at the Episcopal Convention.

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 8.—Both Boston and Atlanta presented invitations to the Episcopal convention, now in session here, to hold the convention of 1895 within their borders. Both were referred to committee without comment. There was a sharp debate in the house of deputies over a proposition to put a check on the house of bishops by requiring that it should act on all matters of legislation coming from the house of deputies within three days, or the same would go into effect without the bishops' sanction. The resolution was introduced by Bishop Hildreth, of Pennsylvania. Several amendments were voted down, as was the Hildreth resolution, and the bishops will be left without restraint.

Another debate came over the talking from the calendar of a resolution thanking the bishops for their pastoral letter of last year. A parliamentary tangle for twenty minutes ensued, and finally the entire matter was laid on the table.

The deputies spent the entire afternoon in debate, and the only action on record is that they decided to hereafter call an assistant bishop, bishop-confessor. This is in accordance with the desire of the revision commission.
