DURRANT IS MUDDLED.

The Accused Double Murderer Gets Mixed in His Dates.

HIS CONTRADICTION TESTIMONY.

Admits Having Written a Letter to His Lawyers Which He Had Previously Denied Under Oath, and That He Had Asked for Graham's Notes.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 12.—After a three days' ordeal, Theodore Durrant yesterday left the witness stand. District Attorney Barnes tried yesterday to draw from the defendant admissions that he was well acquainted with the use of bromo seltzer, as used in medicine. Durrant's replies indicated that he had devoted the night to a study of the compound, as he replied that he had conversed with Dr. West about it in jail last evening. He was able to give its analysis and detailed its pathological effects.

For the first time during the trial Durrant yesterday pleaded ignorance. In reply to a question by Mr. Barnes he said he did not know what an alibi was until after his trial began. While testifying the prisoner became badly confused at times, and when questioned regarding his experience at Cooper Medical college became so mixed in his dates that he had to refer to a card that he carried in his pocket to set himself right. He became noticeably confused and rather testy in his replies when examined in regard to the interview that he had with Gilbert P. Graham, a fellow student at the city prison, when the prosecution claims Durrant asked Graham to furnish him with a copy of the notes of Dr. Cheney's lecture, remarking: "If I had those notes I would be able to prove an alibi."

Durrant, in his dogged way, denied absolutely that he made such a declaration, and tried to explain by testifying that Graham came to him with proffers of assistance, going so far as to inquire anxiously if Durrant had the notes to Dr. Cheney's lecture.

Durrant finally admitted that he asked him to furnish the notes, but he testified that he made the request at the advice of his attorneys, who instructed him to get the notes from students of his class and compare them with his own.

District Attorney Barnes forced Durrant to admit that he had written a statement of his case and enclosed it in an envelope to his attorneys with the instructions to "open it if he was convicted and to return it if he was not convicted."

Durrant was asked if he did not recently show an envelope bearing such an inscription to Miss Carrie Cunningham, a local newspaper reporter. Durrant replied emphatically that he had not. He also denied that he had told Miss Cunningham that he heard suspicious noises in the belfry of Emanuel church on the afternoon that Blanche Lamont was murdered.

Several specimens of Durrant's handwriting were introduced in evidence for the purpose of comparing them with the writing on the wrapper in which the rings of Blanche Lamont were mailed to her aunt, Mrs. Noble.

The district attorney closed his cross-examination of the witness by trying to show that when he was at the furies, ostensibly to search for Blanche Lamont, he was in reality looking for Minnie Williams, who came over from Oakland that afternoon and was found murdered in the church the next day. The defense fought vigorously against the admission of anything bearing on the case of Minnie Williams, and after a long argument Judge Murphy sustained the objections.

After Durrant was excused, Charles T. Lenahan, who was said to have been mistaken for Durrant by Pawabrook Oppenheim, was recalled to the stand for further examination. Little progress had been made, however, when court adjourned until Tuesday next.

Benefits of the Nicaragua Canal.

LONDON, Oct. 12.—A C. Colquhoun addressed the Liverpool chamber of commerce on the position and prospects of the Nicaragua canal. In the course of his remarks he said that he regarded it as indisputably the best of the interoceanic canal projects, and he estimated that by about 1905, assuming that the canal should be commenced in 1896, 7,000,000 tons of goods would pass through. This would bring Japan, China and Australia nearer to the Atlantic cities of the United States than they now are to England. The benefit of the canal to America would be infinitely more than it would be to Europe.

Beck's Indian Police Halted.

PENDER, Neb., Oct. 12.—Pursuant to orders from the interior department and by reason of the decision of Judge Shiras, Indian Agent Beck began eviction of the tenants. The Indian police were ordered to eject a tenant on Garrett place, and while they were executing the order, J. T. Myers, of the Flouring Land company, and W. S. Garrett, approached, revolvers in hand. Myers commanded the Indians to release the prisoner and replace his effects as they found them, and warned them he would kill the first man who attempted to interfere again.

Preacher Charged with Infanticide.

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 12.—A special from Zebulon says that Tom Speer, a negro preacher, is in jail there, charged with murdering his infant child. Speer's wife accuses him of trying to poison her and their children. His daughter says that she saw him empty a box of some powder into the coffee. The family ate breakfast and soon thereafter the wife and four children were taken sick. The infant died.

Desperate Fight with a Highwayman.

ALTOONA, Pa., Oct. 12.—At 10:30 o'clock yesterday morning two highwaymen held up and attempted to rob John H. Shope, of Conemaugh, as he was crossing one of the bridges which span the Pennsylvania railroad in Altoona. Shope made a vigorous fight. One of the thieves slashed him several times with a dirk knife, inflicting dangerous wounds. Shope's assailants escaped.

To Christen the New Warships.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—The navy department has designated Miss Gray, daughter of Senator Gray, of Delaware, to christen the new gunboat Wilmington, and Miss Guild, daughter of the mayor of Nashville, to christen the Nashville, at the launching of the two boats at Newport News on the 18th inst.

Thrashing Engine Explosion Kills Four.

SPRINGFIELD, Minn., Oct. 12.—A thrashing engine near Mount Lake, blew up Thursday, killing four men. The dead are: Joseph Schumaker, Jasper Mallate, and two unknown men.

ARMENIAN REFUGEES.

Weak, Irritable, Tired

"I Was No Good on Earth."

How They Were Finally Induced to Desert Their Churches.

THEIR UNREASONABLE DEMANDS.

Wanted Permission to Retain the Arms in Their Possession—Their Demands Defied by the Delegates of the Foreign Embassies, Who Demanded Protection.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 12.—It is now stated upon good authority that the total number of killed, wounded and missing Armenians, up to date, as a result of the recent rioting in this city, is over 700.

The dragomans of the various embassies, accompanied by the consuls, after receiving instructions from the different envoys of the powers to assist the Turkish authorities in proceeding upon the Armenians to leave the churches in which they sought refuge after the outbreak, at first proceeded to the Armenian church of Constantinople. There the Armenian bishop and the dragoman of the British embassy exhorted the Armenians to return to their homes, assuring them they had nothing to fear from the Turks, and that the strongest assurances had been given to the representatives of the powers by the Turkish government that the lives and property of Armenians would be protected. After consultation all delay the refugees declared they would not leave the church except on the following conditions:

"That amnesty be granted for political offenses; that they be permitted to retain the arms in their possession; that the prisons be opened for the inspection of representatives of the powers; and that the innocent prisoners be released.

The dragomans refused to consider this proposition.

In the meanwhile, however, the Armenian women and children had come out of the church, but when they noticed that the men had not followed them they returned, weeping and crying out that they would be killed if they returned to their homes alone, and saying they preferred to die in the church.

The dragomans, in view of the obstinacy of the Armenians, had a conference with the Armenian patriarch, after which, and through the influence of that prelate, the evacuation of the Kunkapou cathedral commenced. As the refugees left the cathedral the priests entered their names on a special list, while the consuls searched them. When arms were found upon the persons of the Armenians they were taken from them and deposited in the patriarcal palace. The evacuation of the other church followed, the police not interfering with the work. In the Armenian church of Constantinople, it was subsequently announced, 1,500 persons had sought refuge, and 500 refugees left the Kunkapou cathedral.
