THE FINAL DEMANDS

Of European Governments on the Sultan of Turkey.

AN ULTIMATUM WILL COME NEXT.

The Domands but Slightly Modified from Those of May Last -Details of the Recent Massacre of Armenians at Akhlusar. The Discontent in Crete.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 16.-M. Cambon the French ambassador, M. Nelidoff, the Russian ambassador, and Sir Phillip Currie, the British ambay for, on Monday presented to Said Pasha, the minister of foreign affairs, the final demands of the Powers for Amenian reforms. If this is not accepted an ultimatum will be presented. No further modifications will be permitted.

The scheme drops the demand for a Christian high commissioner, but other wise it is almost identical with the proposals of last May. It is believed, however, that Russia hesitates to force an acceptance, because she fcare ultimate Armenian autonomy.

News received from Trebizonde is to the effect that a Russian postal steamer is ly-ing there with 2,000 Christian refugees on board. Two other vessels, also full of refugees, are there awalting the arrival of Russian ships to transport them to Batoum.

Reliable news has been received here that fifty Armenians were killed and a number wounded at Akhissar, in the villayet of Aiden, on the Anatolian railway, by a Moslem mob. The slaughter occurred on Oct. 9, which was market day, when many Armonians had gathered from adjacent villages.

Early in the morning a Turkish rough, finding that the Armenians were not armed, picked a quarrel and shot one of There was then raised on all sides them. the cry: "Why healtate to massacre the in-fidels?" A mob of Turks, armed with revolvers and knives, then looted the market and massacred the helpless Armenians. Their bodies were thrown into the wells. It is stated that the mudir was responsible for the attack.

No women or children were injured, probably on account of the arrival of Kaimaikan from the village of Gieve, three miles distant, who made valiant efforts at the risk of his own life to safe the Chris-tians. Otherwise the slaughter would have been complete.

have been complete. The panie is reviving in Constantinople, on account of the continued isolated at-tacks, and the Armenians are again flock-ing into the churches. The police disregard the safe conduct cards given to the Armenians by the foreign embassies, and they insult and maltreat the holders of the

The Constantinople correspondent of the London Standard blames the Armenian revolutionary committees for forcing the Armenians to close their shops and to maintain the appearance of a panic when the Armenians themselves are ready to resume business.

"I visited the prison," the correspondent says, "and questioned the prisoners, and found that there were no serious complaints against the police. The in-specting commission sent a list of fifty six prisoners for liberation while I was there. The revolutionary leaders are responsible for the continuance of the deadlock."

The Discontent in Crets.

LONDON, Oct. 16.- A dispatch from Ath-ns, describing the growing discontent with Turkish rule on the Island of Crete, says that a band of a thousand armed Christians recently met at Klima to petition the sultan to restore the charter abol-Ished In 1889, and for a reform of taxation and of the gendarmerie. The governor of Crete sent troops against the petitioners, M. J. LAWLOR, May an of annexition to Greece. The Greek government, fearing complications, deprecates such a Cretan movement, but the situation is perilous.

DIMINUTION OF SEALS.

Annual Report of James Sheakly, Governor of Alaska.

BRITISH MAINLY RESPONSIBLE. Save the Governor, for the Ruthless De-

struction of Female Sonis at Son, by Wholly Ignoring the Provisions Laid Down by the Parls Tribuant.

WARRINGTON, Oct. 16.-James Sheakly, governor of Alaska, in his annual report to the secretary of the interior, says re-garding the disappearance of the sails: "No one at all familiar with the past history of the Islands can look upon the deserted rookerles today and not realize with crushing force how great has been the diminution of seal life, especially of the reproductive class, the females."

The governor says that the claims of the Chandians and the British that the ex-cessive killing of scal on hard is the cause of the depletion is disproven by the statistics. He says that on the rookeries now there are many male seals, while females are scarce. The diminution is due directly to the killing at sea, where The diminution is no discrimination can be made as to the sex of the scals. He says that better protection must be granted them than is afforded by the Paris tribunal, and that the scheoners have not been able to make the usual catches this season, the catch of the British vessels being not over 200 per vessel.

He says of the British vessels: "Their only hope of saving themselves from loss was Behring sea, as the supply here (Pribyloff) is greatly diminished. Great Britain gave to the Canadian sealers increased facilities by availing herself of a technicality, and violating the clear in-tent of the Paris regulations relating to frearms. When the Canadian authori-ties secured from England what is prac-tically a repudiation, or at least a nega-tion of the Paris tribunal, they knew it would be possible for British Columbian schooners coming from the Asiatic side of the sea to use the allowed firearms and evade detection by asserting that the skins found on board with shot wounds while In Behring sea were skins taken on the Japan coast."

The governor says that the remedy for the evil is simple, but "under existing conditions its application is difficult, unless Great Britain has forfeited, by her re-cent action, all right to consideration, and the United States hold with a firm hand all vessels engaged in destroying scals. The remedy laid down by the Paris trib-

unal has proved a failure." The governor says that 15,000 skins were taken on the islands this year, and 38,000 were taken by poachers, 75 per cent. of which were females.


The governor says that the patrol of the sea by the United States has been of the best, and the government has acted in good faith in its efforts to enforce the Paris tri-

bunni. The governor discusses at some length the mining industries of Alaska, and says that the production indicates that it will be a profitable and permanent industry. The laws of the mining country are administered by the miners' themselves, and it is wholly impracticable to try to exer cise government control of the mines at

Upon the subject of the Alaskan boundary the governor says: "The people of Alaska, over the whole country, expect and believe that the government of the United States will defend and maintain our right to all the territory, included within the boundary line fixed and agreed upon by treaty made between Great Beltain and Bussia in 1825, and acquiesced in for nearly three-quarters of a century without question or dispute.



LONDON, Oct. 16 .- A dispatch from Valparaiso, Chile, announces that the Amer ican ship Parthia, Captain Caster, from Liverpool June 25 for San Francisco, with coal, was burned at sea on Oct. 1. She is a total loss. Several of her crew landed at Valparaiso in one of the ship's boats, but the captain, chief mate and mineteen of the crew, who left the wreck in boats, are still missing.
