# A GREAT OCEAN RACE.

Interesting Speed Contest Between the St. Louis and Majestic.

BOTH CARRY AMERICAN MAILS.

As the St. Louis Has a Mail Clerk on Board Her Mail Will Doubtless Reach London Many Hours in Advance of the Major-

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.-The new American liner St. Louis sped from the harbor yesterday on her race with the mails across the ocean. She left her pier in the North river four hours ahead of her rival, the White Star liner Majestic, but that fact will not in the least stifle the ambition of the craft to get their postal matter in London first.

The St. Louis is bound for Southamp ton, or 280 miles further than the Majes-tic's destination, which is Queenstown. This means from fourteen to fifteen hours extra steaming for a leviathan of the St. Louis' speed, but in landing the malls at Southampton the journey between that point and London is two hours only by rail. The distance between Queenslown and London by way of Dublin, Klugstown and Holyhead is an miles, which is acbe seen what a close contest it is, all things

What lends additional interest to the journey of the two ships is the fact that through the medium of the St. Louis the American line inaugurates on this trip a the ten years in which the agreement will hold good. These figures are given on the basis of one trip to Europe each week by any of the four greyhounds—the St. Louis, St. Paul, Paris or New York.

The postal revenue to the company is exclusive of any that the British governtinents will watch the inaugural trip with the greatest interest.

The St. Louis has a mail clerk on board, a novelty that England has not yet adopted. This postal clerk, on the way over, will sort and distribute the mall, so that when It reaches the Southwestern rallway station at Southampton it will all be practically ready for delivery. There being no postal clerk on the Majestic the mail of that vessel will be delivered at Queenstown in the same crude shape in which it was put aboard, and the sorting process will have to be done on the other side.

## Liquor Dealers as Reformers.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 .- At the convention of the National Association of Retail Liquor Dealers the need of more radical steps for protection of their interests and more powerful organization at Washington to combat the temperance movement was urged, and it was asserted that with-out some such action the effect of the movement would be soon felt in the

movement would be soon felt in the "abaking of the liquor interests from center to circumference." One of the resolutions passed reads: "We emphatically denounce all illicit and disreputable resorts, because they propogate drunkenness and debauchery among the youth of the community, descerate the Sabbath and cast an odium on the legitimate trade, and we therefore piedge ourselves to assist in their suppression."

The Indiana's Preliminary Run.

Boston, Oct. 17.—The battleship Indiana was given a preliminary run yesterday over the government trial course off the Massachusetts coast, between Cape Ann and Boone Island, and the result was very satisfactory. On the run up the course the average speed was 15.31 knots an hour for two hours. Bollers, engines and everything about the ship showed to such advantage on the rnn up that it was not deemed necessary to speed her on the return trip, and she was therefore jogged back over the course at an average speed.

Foreigners Organizing for Protection. SHAMOKIN, Pa., Oct. 17 .- Three thousand Polish, Russian, Lithuanian and Slavonic residents of this vicinity have organized a Citizens' Protective society for the pur pose of advancing the condition of their fellow countrymen here. In future a tribunal appointed by the society will hear and possibly settle all disputes among the foreigners, and the executive committee will recommend what political candidates are to be voted for by the members.


