Throwing up a window the terrified woman leaped to the ground, ten feet below, and ran to a neighboring house, where she

was cared for. The police were notified and three men The police were notified and three men were sent to the Merwin residence. As they tried to enter by a rear door several shots were fixed at them, while the insane man yelled at them, calling them burghars and saying he would kill the first man coming up the stairs. Friends of Merwin were sent for, and tried to reason with him, but it was useless. He fired shots at the n-ighboring houses, breaking windows and causing the inmates to take refuge in the year rooms. and causing the immass to that ready in the year rosins. One or two bicyclists pass-ing by were fired at, but Merwin's aim was bad and they escaped with a bad scare. The poller obtained chloroform and squirted it into the room with a syrings through the keyhole, but Merwin was shruwd and three up the windows, thereby shrawd and threw up the windows, thereby neutralizing it. Finally at about 4 o'clock in the afternoon sulphur was procured and placed in the furnace, and Merwin was soon overcome. The infortunate man was taken to the Desention hospital.

Merwin is 55 years old. He came to Chicago five pears ago from New Haven, Conn., where he was reared. Three years ago, while in the iron range in the Tennessee mountains, Merwin was kicked in

He was married a year and a half ago to a prominent young lady of New p. m. BRITAIN'S ULTIMATUM

Opinions of the British Press on Salisbury's Latest Move.

THE "OUTRAGES BY VENEZUELANS"

London Newspapers Prove to Their Own Satisfaction That the Existing Compli-Can in No Way He Affected by the Mooroe Dootrine of the United States.

LONDON, Oct. 21.—The St. James Gasette follows up its disclosures regarding the policy of the Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, secretary of state for the colonies, regarding Venezuela, and the apparent determination of the British government to uphold its claims by force of arms, by making the following important statement:

"We are in a position to state that the Marquis of Salisbury has sent an ulti-matum to President Crespo, which not only sets out the demands of the British government for reparation on account of this acrest of the deputation and inspec-tors of police at Uruan, but it also states the terms upon which Great Britain will definitely determine the boundary dispute with that republic. The ultimatum is now en route to President Crespo, if it is not already delivered to him."

The Times and The Chronicle this morning print articles explaining in detail the position of the Venezuelan matter, the latter paper especially as regards the American point of view as indicated by official reports issued from Washington. "There is no doubt," The Chronicle says, "that the United States is determined to bring about an early settlement of the dispute. No answer to Mr. Bayard's dispatch to Lord Salisbury has yet been received at the embassy."

The Standard says: "The Venezuelan ultimatum is unlikely to lead to prolonged or doubtful complications. The convention of 1850 has been repeatedly in-fringed by the Venezuelans in encroaching upon soll indisputably British. These galling and high-handed acts might have galling and high-handed acts might have been overlooked had not the outrage by the Venezuelan authorities reached lengths no longer endurable. We shall be surprised if the responsible diplomats of the United States persist in maintain-ing that the Monroe doctring has any bearing on the present case."

The Daily Telegraph says: "It is diffi-cult to see how Monroeism is applicable to the Venezueian affair. If the Venezueians invade British Guiana they must either be punished by us directly or they must be forced by the assumed protectors in the United States to respect international laws."

Smith, a negro, yesterday shot her and then blew out his brains. Smith died in-stantly. He age is 27, and she has been employed as the janitress of the Wallace building in Pine street, New York city, where Smith was engineer.
