

BAYARD AND VENEZUELA

Latest Phases of the Case.

FAVORS A BOARD OF CONCILIATION

Meantime the English Newspapers Contimus to Rall Against Venezue's and the United States, and a Paris Paper Dec ares That England Is Hight.

LONDON, Oct. 22.—The Times this morn ing publishes an interview with United States Ambassador Bayard, in which the latter is quoted as saying that he had only very general ideas of the latest phase of the Venezuelan trouble, except what he had gathered from the newspapers. latest mission was an endeavor of the friendliest character to arrange to resum the Venezuelan frontier negotiations. The delay of Lord Salisbury's reply was doubt less due to the latter's boliday, and to the subsequent occupation of the foreign office.

many disputes of the United States with Venezuela had always been amicably arranged by a board of conciliation, and Mr. Bayard said he did not see why the same method should not be adopted as be tween England and Venezuela. Lord Sal-isbury's demand upon Venezuela for reparation, he added, was quite outside his

mission in the affair. The Chronicle says editorially "We are much oblige for American efforts at conilliation in the Venezuelan affairs, but the offer would come with more grace if she would pay the Behring sea scaling in-demnity in accordance with the Paris award. While we hope that Mr. Bayard and Lord Salisbury will come together, it is evident that America has no footing

The Times says: "Some of our American friends have been too previous in their interpretations of a report that the Marquis of Salisbury had sent an ultimatum to Venezuela. Lord Salisbury's dispatch had to be sent through Berlin. Its tenor was not such as to raise the questions which a portion of the American press seems so anxious to discuss.

"The claim that the right bank of the

Cuyani river belongs to them does not jutify the Venezuelans in an attack upon the British police. Until the violent act is atoned for, and an ample apology is made, they are in a position of having removed the dispute from the sphere of diplomacy and challenged its settlement by force. Whether they count upon enjoying immunity for the net on account of the distance from Georgetown or other weak states, they presume upon their insignificance to do things no great power would attempt. It is time the Caracas politicians were taught a salutary lesson."

The Daily News says: "It is little credit to diplomacy that the Venezuelan ques-tion should be so long unsettled. The most serious aspect of the question is in the United States, and the dispute will need to be managed with the greatest tact and temper on both sides, especially as there is a similar difficulty with regard to Trinidad. If rains do not come it will mean a shutdown until after the close of navigation. If the government insists upon keeping the lake full, however, it is probable the mills will have to run without water all winter.

Rhode Island's Ex-Attorney General Sued for Divorce.

COLONEL COLT ALSO BRINGS SUIT.

He Charges Mr. J. J. Van Alen, of Newport, with Alienating the Affections of Mrs. Coll, and Demands Damages in the Sum of \$200,000,

PROVIDENCE, Oct. 29 .- Mrs. Samuel P. Colt began suit for divorce yesterday, fore-stalling the action which her busband was expected to institute. In the papers filed by Mrs. Colt's attorney adultery on the part of Colonel Colt is alleged, but no co-respondent is named. The petition asks for an allowance for separate maintenance, for the custody of her two children, and that Mr. Colt be restrained from disposing of or encumbering any of his property until the petition is heard by the court. An allowance of counsel fees and for maintenance during the pendency of the matter in court is also asked for.

Colonel Colt is a former attorney gen-eral of the state and the president of several manufacturing and financial institu-tions, and he and Mrs. Coltare well known in Newport, New York and Washington society. It is said that Mrs. Colt tried to arrange a separation and secure a settle ment of money from her husband to avoid the notoriety of a divorce suit, and that he refused to accode to the settlement.

A sensational feature was added to the case last evening by the issuance of a writ for the arrest of Mr. J. J. Van Alen, of Newport, on the charge of alienation of the affections of Mrs. Colt, damages being everwork, fret, worry, dissipation or ex- demanded by Colonel Colt in the sum of cesses, break down their nervous systems, \$200,000. If Mrs. Colt brings her case into court it is said there will be some remarkable de-velopments that will involve not only state officials, but one person who stands very high in national affairs.
