Daring Bank Robber Caught.

HARRISBURG, Neb., Oct. 22.—A daring attempt was made to clean out the Banner County bank of this place. A masked robber entered the bank at about 4 p. m. and demanded the funds of Chrislie, the cashier. The robber had some difficulty in drawing his revolver from his belt, and Carlisle ran out the side door to the street and gave the alarm. As the robber came out citizens opened fire, and after an exchange of two shots the robber was wounded in the leg by a rifle ball and surrendered. In his haste he had overlooked most of the bank's funds, only taking small change amounting to \$107.

No Influx of Japanese.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—Commissioner General Struening of the Immigration Bureau, has made to the secretary of the treasury his report of the results of an investigation recently made by him in person of the allegation that Japanese were being imported into this country under contract, in violation of the alien contract labor law. The commissioner general, after a thorough examination of all the facts, finds there is no reason to fear any influx of Japanese, and the statement that large numbers of them have been improperly admitted to this country is absolutely untrue and without foundation. It is not the policy of the Japanese government to encourage emigration.

Exploding Boiler Kills Two Men.

BURLINGTON, Ia., Oct. 22.—Late yesterday afternoon a boiler in a few miles from here, John Holmes and James White were killed instantly and two others fairly cut and bruised. The boiler of the Lomax Pickett Four company factory exploded, demolishing the building. The flues of the boiler were blown seventy-five feet, and a 1 1/2 inch iron pipe was hurled through a window 250 feet away. Holmes was picked up a mass of broken bones and torn flesh. White was killed instantly by being driven literally into the pile of splinters in front of him and his flesh cooked by the escaping steam.

Electricity in the Mines.

The Mt. Carmel News says an electrical test was made at the Enterprise colliery and it proved a grand success. The breaker is lighted by electricity and arc lights are used in various parts of the outside workings. The Enterprise is the first colliery in this region to adopt electricity in its mines and the result is being watched by numerous operators. The power house is located at the head of No. 3 slope, and the part of the mines in which the electricity is used is the Skidmore vein of the No. 3 slope, and the line extends a distance of 3000 feet. The cars are conveyed by electric engines to different parts of the slope. Work has been commenced in extending the line to every part of the mine. The mines are not yet lighted with electricity, but will be in a short time. The colliery will have very little use for mules in the future. In the Wyoming Division the use of electricity in the mines has become quite common, and it is thought that before many years all the collieries in this section will have it.
