VENUEZUELA AND GUAYANA

The Governor of the British Colony Arrives in England.

HE ANTICIPATES NO TROUBLE.

The Concessions to Americans, Governor Lees Declares, Are Not Within the British Sphere of Influence—Thinks There Will be No Resistance to the Demands.

LONDON, Oct. 31.—Sir Charles Cameron Lees, governor of British Guiana, arrived at Plymouth at midnight, having been called to England to confer with Colonial Secretary Chamberlain on the Venezuelan boundary question. Sir Charles was seen upon his arrival by a representative of the Associated Press, who sought to obtain his views upon the Venezuelan question, and to whom he accorded an interview. He said:

"I regard the frontier outrage (the so-called Uruan incident) as a purely individual act, as the British subjects, Barnes and Baker, who were arrested by the Venezuelan officer, when brought before the higher representatives of the Venezuelan government were asked by them to return to the British territory. But they declined, on the ground that there was no means of transit back."

"The Uruan incident referred to by Sir Charles Lees was that upon which the reported British ultimatum to Venezuela was based. A British sergeant of police (the Barnes above referred to) and two assistants crossed the river at Uruan and planted the British flag on the Venezuelan side. The Venezuelan police tore down the flag, drove the intruders across the stream and subsequently arrested them. While on their way to Ciudad Bolivar with their prisoners they were instructed from Caracas to release the Englishmen, and to permit them to return to British Guiana. The British government demands reparation for these arrests.

Sir Charles Lees was asked further to explain the action of the Guiana high council in voting its disapproval of the Colonial Secretary Chamberlain's suggestion for the purchase of Maxim guns to be taken to the Venezuelan frontier. Sir Charles said:

"With regard to this vote the matter was purely an imperial one. There is only one post, consisting of seven men, at Uruan, being merely a police station to mark the frontier on the Schomburgk boundary line, and there is practically no military station there, although the colonial government has repeatedly asked the imperial government for a supply of Maxim guns.

"The Venezuelan party when they crossed the river at Uruan hoisted their flag upon a building within the Schomburgk boundary. Sergeant Barnes and Baker hauled it down to show that it was within the British boundaries, though the colonial government would be delighted to welcome squatters to that territory, and only desired to show it was British territory."

He was asked if he thought any serious affair would occur in the event of a crisis, to which he replied:

"I think not, as there is only a very small police station on the Venezuelan frontier. The Venezuelans tried their utmost to persuade Barnes and Baker to return to British territory after they had been arrested."

The Associated Press representative then asked the governor if any difficulty was likely to arise out of the concessions made to American capitalists by Venezuela. He said:

"No concessions have been made within the British sphere of influence, and therefore no difficulty is likely to arise.

"I have no idea that there will be any serious resistance to the British demands growing out of the Uruan incident, as the Venezuelan government seems desirous of doing everything possible to repair any injury done to British subjects."

Sir Cameron has come home principally to recruit his health, and although some matters of private business will also receive his attention, he will see Mr. Chamberlain, secretary of state for the colonies, as early as possible.

VENEZUELA AND GUAYANA

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DURRANT TRIAL NEARLY ENDED.

The Case Will be Given to the Jury This Afternoon.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 31.—District Attorney Barnes yesterday appeared as the central figure in the last scene of the trial of Theodore Durrant. He delivered what is considered in many respects one of the strongest arguments ever made to a jury. Aside from being logical and convincing in his discussion of the testimony, he made two or three dramatic by plays that put a severe test to the iron nerves of the prisoner. The most impressive took place in the early part of his argument when he spoke of how counsel for the defense had invoked the spirit of Blanche Lamont, and voiced her thought by saying: "Let him go free; he harmed no one."

While looking intently at the frame bearing Miss Lamont's dress, which stood near the jury box, and telling how through the long days of the trial he had seen the young school girl clothed in all her innocence and purity, Mr. Barnes reached the climax of the scene. Turning upon Durrant, who was seated only three feet away, the district attorney, with clinched fists and in a voice of thunder, exclaimed: "I see her now! There she stands behind him at this very moment, not praying for vengeance for her deep and remediless wrongs, not for the law's retribution upon her murderer, but with uplifted hand and storming eyes, praying that God will not put it into your hearts, by the mockery of a verdict of not guilty, to set free this monster to prey upon other souls, pollute with vile hands the unstrung snod of other children and defy again that god of justice whose ministers you are."

Durrant was the least affected person in the court room, while Mrs. Noble, the dead girl's aunt wept silently and everybody else was thrilled with the impressiveness of the scene. Durrant sat stolid and indifferent.


The district attorney will conclude his argument this afternoon, when the jury will be charged and the fate of Durrant placed in their keeping.

To Destroy a Lincoln Monument.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Oct. 31.—The Lincoln monument at Oak Ridge cemetery, which has for the past twenty years been admired by thousands upon thousands of people from all over the world, will have to be torn down. It is too far gone to be repaired, and, besides, its construction is such that it will not admit of repair. Instead of being a substantial pile of solid granite, as external appearances would indicate, it is a rickety structure of brick veneered over with slabs of granite. This is the verdict of state trustees who have charge of the monument. The monument cost \$200,500, which amount was raised by popular subscription.

Bahama Islanders Starving.

GALVESTON, Tex., Oct. 31.—Captain Hudson, of the British steamship Honiton, just arrived from Antwerp, reports having passed the Bemini islands, on the Bahamas, on Saturday last, when ten men, white and colored, came out to him in two boats and asked for food, saying that the island had been devastated by the cyclone of Oct. 22. They said the people were starving. He gave them as much of his supply as he could spare. As he passed along others came out and begged for food. The British Jack was run up to half mast at one place as a sign of distress. The matter has been reported to the British consul here.

Big Fire in a Massachusetts Town.

MILLERS FALLS, Mass., Oct. 31.—Fire which started in a main street livery stable at 10:30 o'clock last night swept away eight buildings, including a big hotel on one side of the street in the business section, and jumped across the street and destroyed the buildings on that side. The fire department early proved entirely inadequate, and help was summoned from Greenfield and Northampton. The loss cannot be estimated at present. The telephone wires are down and telegraph communication cannot be had.

Counterfeiters Sentenced.

NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—Dr. Orlando Bradford, the counterfeit, was yesterday sentenced to six years' imprisonment in the Kings county penitentiary. Michael Marjov, for passing counterfeit money, was given a similar sentence. Frank Carr, for counterfeiting, was sent to the Erie county penitentiary for six years, and Albert Brown was given four years in the Kings county penitentiary for counterfeiting. Harvey Kingstrick, another counterfeit, was sent to the Elmira reformatory for thirteen months.

Sent to a Penal Colony Without Trial.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—Information reaching here in Washington prominently identified with the Cuban movement is that on Sept. 30 four prominent citizens of Santiago de Cuba who had been identified with the Automoni club were sent without trial to the Spanish penal colony of Ceuta, on the coast of Morocco, Africa. They were arrested by the military authorities on suspicion of being friendly to the insurgent cause, and the Spanish commander directed their transportation to the Morocco colony.

Texas Bank Looted by Burglars.

McGREGG, Tex., Oct. 31.—The First National bank of McGregg, was looted shortly after 2 a. m. Entrance was effected through the door. The thieves opened the outer door of the combination. To the inner steel chest dynamite was applied, completely wrecking the safe. The booty assessed amounted to between \$10,000 and \$12,000.

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


