### The New French Ministry.

PARIS, Nov. 1.—The new ministry, so far formed, is as follows: M. Bourgeois, minister of the interior and president of the council of ministers; M. Ribot, justice and worship; M. Cavaignac, war; M. Loeferer, marine; M. Berthelot, education; M. Dummer, finance; M. Guyot d'Essaigne, public works; M. Mesureur, commerce; M. Combes, colonies. The foreign portfolio will be offered to Baron de Courcel, present ambassador to Great Britain. At a meeting of the cabinet last night it was resolved that there should be a thorough investigation of Southern railway affairs.

### A Double Lynching May Occur.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 1.—Great excitement prevails in the little suburban village of Benton, eight miles west of this city, on the Missouri Pacific railway. John O'Gorman, an expressman at that place, was shot and mortally wounded by a pair of murderous robbers who entered the saloon of William Wagner. O'Gorman grappled with the men, one of whom shot him. They then fled with the cash drawer. A posse of citizens is in pursuit, and a lynching may occur if they are caught.

### L. M's Murderers Under Arrest.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—The state department has received the gratifying information by cable from Minister Terrell at Constantinople that certain Kurds and Armenians have been arrested for the murder of Frank Leuz, the young Pittsburg boy, who was engaged in making a tour of the world on his wheel for Outing when he was killed. The alleged murderers are to be tried at Erzeroum.

CLEVELAND, Nov. 1.—The Count and Countess Schlegler succeeded yesterday in liquidating their hotel bills through the kind offices of a banker, who went security for them and they left last night for St. Louis. Schlegler is a genuine count and his wife is a niece of ex-Governor Bishop, of Ohio.

### The Katabdin a Success.

NEW LONDON, Conn., Nov. 1.—The latest addition to the new navy of the United States, the rain Katabdin, had her official trial yesterday, and although the result will not be positively known for forty-eight hours or more, it is believed the final official record will show that she has done better than the seventeen knots required by the government. This vessel has excited unusual interest for the reason that she is unique among the navies of the world, and the fact that she is purely an experimental type of war vessel lent unusual uncertainty to the result of her trial.
