A CONSERVATIVE ESTIMATE Our Pottsville Correspondent Says the Republicans Lead. DEMOCRATIC CAMPAIGN FOR BOODLE It is Upon the Lavish Expenditure of a Large Corruption-Fund That they Hope For Success—The Republicans Are Confident.

Special correspondence to HERALD. POTTSTVILLE, Nov. 2, 1895. Three days before the battle, the Republican organization is in better shape than it has been since the ticket was nominated. Around headquarters there is an air of confidence that is gratifying to the party workers who have occasion to call upon the county chairman and his lieutenants. This confidence is not without reason, either. The fact that the Democratic managers are engaged in raising large sums of money in every precinct in the county is prima facie evidence that they see the utter hopelessness of their cause, and are becoming desperate.

There is a strong effort made to turn the people of that nationality in line for the Democratic ticket, and money is being freely used for that purpose. It is well known here that this will be the line of battle in Mahanoy City and Shenandoah, where these people predominate.
