### THE ISSUE.

The issue in the present campaign is not fairly and squarely by the Republican party in this county, a plank in the platform of which proclaims:

"We condemn the uniform incompetency of the Democratic county officials and especially denounce the present flagrant mismanagement of the District Attorney's office of pigeon-holing indictments against political leaders who openly defy the election laws; and call upon all good citizens, irrespective of party, to assist us in electing to that office a lawyer of such legal attainments and personal integrity as will ensure a proper administration of its duties and the punishment of all offenders, regardless of party or political influence."

The Democratic party in the present campaign is in sultrials, when it becomes necessary for three of its prominent leaders to vouch for their loyalty to the ticket through the party organs. They are hopelessly divided, and none know it better than themselves.

### THE JUDGESHIP.

The judicial contest in this county is an important one, and presents the question of minority representation in its strongest light. It goes deeper than the mere qualifications of the two candidates now seeking the suffrage of the people.

Both Judge T. H. B. Lyon and P. M. Dunn, Esq., are men of irreproachable character, and their legal abilities are of such a high order that either would grace the position with honor to themselves and credit to the judicial arm. These statements are admittedly true, and none but the most bigoted partisan would question their truthfulness. Fortunately the latter class of voters do not predominate in Schuylkill county.

The justice of minority representation and a non-partisan judiciary are the issues in the contest that overshadow mere partisan feeling and oblitrate party lines.

The argument in favor of a non-partisan judiciary is recognized in the law creating the Superior Court, without which the friends and admirers of Judge Oliver P. Bechtel would have little hope of his election. The make-up of the boards of County Commissioners and County Auditors is further proof of the justice of the claim that the bench should have minority representation. Take the argument, for instance, that is just now being used by the Democrats in advocating the election of one of their candidates—on the plea of minority representation.

Judge Lyon was appointed to the position he now fills so acceptably by Governor Hastings upon the solicitation and recommendation of the members of the bar, both Democrats and Republicans. He has presided over the Orphans' Court with dignity, and his decisions have been rendered in accordance with law and justice. The issue presented by our Democratic friends in nominating a candidate for the office is purely partisan. No other argument can be produced in behalf of Mr. Dunn's election. If it is advisable to have minority representation in other and less important branches of government, how much more so is it in the judiciary. Without

It a spirit of suspicion and unrest exists among those of the minority, and at times even among those of the dominant party.

The issue is an important one, and, as we have previously stated, is above and beyond all partisan feeling. Were Judge Lyon the inferior of his opponent and not endowed with the same legal ability, there might be good reason for his defeat. But such is not the case, and hence he should be retained in his present position upon the bench by an overwhelming majority, and thus establish the question of a non-partisan judiciary so far as this country is concerned.

SHENANDOAH will give a good account of itself on Tuesday. The vote in this town will be a surprise to many who think they know it all.

## The Gonzalez Case Quashed.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—The state department has received a telegram from the consul general at Havana stating that the case of Martinez Gonzalez has been quashed and his release ordered by the captain general, and that the case of Victoriano Valt Perez has been transferred to the civil courts. Gonzalez was arrested on suspicion of the latter part of September by the civil authorities at Sagua la Grande, and was released after five days' detention. He was immediately rearrested by the military authorities and thrown into prison. He claims to be an American citizen. Mr. Perez also claims to be an American citizen. He was arrested for "proposing treasonable acts."

## Railroad Companies Fined.

HARRISBURG, Nov. 2.—Secretary Latta yesterday imposed a penalty of \$5,000 on the Pittsburg and Castle Shannon railroad and on the New York, Susquehanna and Western railroad company for neglecting to make a report to the department of Internal Affairs of their operations during the fiscal year ending June 30. Both companies have been certified to Attorney General McCormick, with the request that he proceed against them for the collection of the penalties.

## Bulgaria's Entire Ministry Resigns.

LONDON, Nov. 2.—A Sofia dispatch to The Chronicle says: The entire Bulgarian ministry has resigned until Prince Ferdinand shall have promised that his son Boris shall be baptised in the Russian church. It is learned upon high authority that Russia will only consent to enter into diplomatic relations with Bulgaria on condition of the fresh election of a prince from the candidates approved by the powers. The list may include Prince Ferdinand.

## Earthquakes Shock in Rome.

ROME, Nov. 2.—An earthquake shock, lasting eleven seconds, was felt here yesterday morning. Many houses swayed badly, walls were cracked, pictures and other articles fell from the walls and other places, people ran panic stricken into the streets, and serious disaster was feared for a time. However, the first shock ended the disturbance, and the frightened inhabitants returned to their homes. No serious damage was done.

## Lieutenant Peary Back to Naval Work.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Lieutenant R. E. Peary, of the United States navy, reported for duty at the Brooklyn navy yard to-day. He has been assigned for duty as a civil engineer in the department of yards and docks. Lieutenant Peary has given up all thought of reaching the north pole, and will settle down to routine work in the navy department.

## Ex-City Treasurer Arrested.

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 2.—Ex-City Treasurer James McAulay, who was removed from office on Wednesday for inability to give \$100,000 additional bonds demanded by the city council, was arrested yesterday on the charge of having loaned \$4,000 of city money for his personal profit, contrary to law.

## Killed by a Runaway Coal Car.


WILKESBARRE, Pa., Nov. 2.—David Jones, assistant foreman of the Whipcorrier colliery of the Red Ash Coal company, was instantly killed on the colliery's slope by being struck by a runaway loaded coal car. Superintendent Daniel Thomas was also badly cut about the head.

## Accidentally Killed by His Brother.

CAPE CHARLES, Va., Nov. 2.—Benjamin Chandler, 23 years old, was accidentally shot by his brother near Exmore, Va. The shot entered his side, penetrating the lungs, killing him instantly. He was highly respected and a very popular young man.
