A REPUBLICAN SWEEP!

(Continued from First Page.)

make a conservative statement to those wanting to bet on over 100,000. Chairman Kurtz gave out the following: "Returns received at midnight indicate that the Republicans have carried the state by a plurality not less than that given two years ago and elected a decisive majority of the members to the next general assembly."

Chairman Kurtz will not claim over 50,000 at the most. Others go higher. Mr. Kurtz does not estimate that the Republicans will have two-thirds of the legislature, but he says the Republican majority in both branches will be so large that the actual interest is not taken in ascertaining the exact number of Republican and Democrats on joint ballot for United States senator.

At the Democratic headquarters an announcement was made that the state had gone Republican by a decisive majority in the legislature, as well as by a large plurality on the state ticket. As both parties had the same financial platform, the silver question was not an issue in the campaign. The tariff was the only national issue between the parties. The Populists cast about 40,000 votes, the Prohibitionists about 20,000, and the Socialists about 2,000. Neither the fourth or fifth parties nor the A. P. A. affected the result.

Ex-Congressman Charles Manderson, chairman of the Democratic committee, this morning gave out the following: "We concede the state to the Republicans by 60,000 plurality, and both branches of the legislature by a large majority. The Populist vote of over 40,000 for Coxe for governor hurts us. The hard times were too fresh in the minds of the people to be forgotten and this led to our defeat."

CRUSHED IN THE ROLLERS.

A Boy Dies From Injuries Received in Indian Ridge Breaker.

William Lewis, Jr., 16-year-old son of William Lewis, an aged miner residing on South Bowers street, died last night from frightful injuries received in the breaker of the Indian Ridge colliery yesterday afternoon. Although the boy was terribly mangled he survived for about four hours. He failed to rally from the shock. Drs. J. S. Kistler and G. M. Hamilton were called to attend the boy as soon as he was removed to his home, but they pronounced the case a hopeless one and said there was nothing to be done but make the victim as comfortable as possible under the circumstances until death should relieve him.

Young Lewis was employed as overseer of the small rollers located in the middle of the breaker. The place is very dark and the boy worked with a light. A set of rollers became stalled and, in accordance with his duty, Lewis cleaned them out and the machinery was again set in motion. Lewis went to another place and it is believed that on his return he stepped into the opening above the rollers. They are covered by a sheet iron box having a door in the top. It is thought Lewis left the door open when he left the place after the machinery was set in motion again.

The agonizing cries of the victim attracted the attention of men in other parts of the breaker and they signalled the engineer, who promptly stopped the machinery, but not until the unfortunate boy's left leg had been drawn through the rollers up to the hip joint. The limb was frightfully mangled and the pelvis and hip bones were also horribly crushed.

Lewis was removed from the place to the engine house of the colliery until an ambulance could be secured, when he was removed to the home of his greatly distressed parents. Notwithstanding the terrible nature of his injuries the boy remained conscious almost up to the moment that he passed away.

Much sympathy is expressed for the father of the deceased. He is a very old man who is incapacitated for labor on account of miners' asthma, and the boy was one of the main supports of the family. There are two other sons, one older than the deceased. The family at one time resided at Ellangowan.

The Rettig brewery at Pottsville is to be enlarged to double its present capacity.

The Mores colliery resumed operations on full time after an idleness of almost two months.

Father Kenney, of Centralia, who has been very ill with typhoid fever, is reported greatly improved.

William Javis, a miner working at Ellangowan colliery, had his right leg broken by a fall of coal yesterday.
