

AFTER A BIG SWINDLER Adolph Guttman, Who Stole \$400,000 in

Germany, Probably Still Alive. NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—When the North German Lloyd steamship Elbe went to the bottom of the North sea last March, carrying down her human freight, it was genscally believed, says The World, that among the lost was Adolph Guttman, who, with his brother Daniel, it was charged, had stolen \$400,000, and was on his way with it to this country. It is considered certain that Daniel Guttman and his sis-ter perished on the Elbe, but the evidence that Adolph had taken passage on the

steamer was never positively established. From the story told by Marie Holomany, a pretty Austrian girl who arrived at Ho boken on the steamer Wittekind on Feb. 11, it is believed that a passenger known to her as Joseph Pfeifer, who made love to the girl, was none other than Adolph Guttman, and that he had stolen money with him. Detectives are working on the

Dunraven's View of Defender.

LONDON, Nov. 9.-The Times this morn-ing publishes an extract which fills three and a half of its columns from a pamphlet which the Earl of Dunraven is just issuing, giving a complete history and an explanation, from his standpoint, of the America's cup races. The statement concludes: "On the whole, my belief is that Defender is the better of the two vessels on the reach, and that Valkyrie III is the better in turning to windward. We never came on a run, owing to the wind shifting so much during the first race, but as run-ning is Valkyrie's best point and seems to be Defender's worst, judging by her sailing against Vigilant, I consider Valkyrie III the better of the two on that point of salling also." The Times says editorially: "The general impression the statement leaves is that no effort can possibly secure a fair race for the cup."

Run Down in a Fog.

NORFOLK, Va., Nov. 9.-During a dense log off Sewell's Point, in Chesapeake bay, the Norfolk and Washington line steamer Newport News last evening ran down and sunk the tug Katie of this city. The crew of the steamer Louise heard the two ves sels crash together and the cries of men in distress, but the fog was so heavy that they were unable to render assistance. When they arrived at the scene of the disaster they found the bodies of the cook and fireman floating near the sunken tug. It is presumed that the remainder of the crew of the tug were rescued by the steamer, which proceeded to Washington.

Suicide to Avoid Prosecution.

ONEONTA, N. Y., Nov. 9.-John Fritchly, of Afton, was arrested yesterday by Pennsylvania officers on the charge of higamy preferred by a former wife living with her children in Pennsylvania. On being left alone a few minutes after his arrest he drew a revolver and fired a bullet into his forehead, dying instantly. Fritchly, who was about 47 years of age, arrived in Afton three years ago, and soon afterwards married Julia Davis, a highly respected young lady. They have always lived happily, and she is prostrated with grief.

Banker Probert Again in Trouble.

WASHBURN, Wis., Nov. 9.-Banker A. C. Probert was arrested yesterday for the second time within two weeks, this time charged with embezzlement at Shell Lake. Mr. Probert has been having a great deal of trouble with his banking institutions here and at Shell Lake and Prescott since the panic of 1893. He owes depositors nearly \$150,000, and the state bank examiners a few days ago make a report show-ing that the cash resources of the three institutions aggregated only \$550. Probert Is mayor of this city.




