POTTSVILLE, Nov. 12.—There are 700 teachers of the public schools in attendance at the thirty-third annual Teachers' County Institute.

James E. Lewis and W. N. Ehrhart are among the vice presidents. Superintendent M. P. Whitaker is on the advisory committee.

This morning's session was opened by Dr. Arnold Tompkins with a talk on "Instruction." Dr. A. E. Mally spoke on "A Lesson on Cotton."

Addressed by Dr. E. O. Lyne and Dr. George B. Haucher followed and Superintendent Henry Houck closed the session with a talk on "Instruction."

The afternoon session was opened with a talk on "The Heart" by Dr. A. E. Mally. An address by Superintendent Houck and talks by Drs. Arnold Tompkins and John B. DeMotte will form the program for the balance of the session.

To-night's entertainment for the teachers will be in the form of a lecture on "Electricity, Its Nature and Possibilities," by Prof. John B. DeMotte, A. M. Ph. D., of Cambridge, Mass.
