#### THE SALOON QUESTION.

The members of the Retail Liquor Dealers Association have had under consideration for some time the reduction of the number of saloons in this town, and any effort on their part in this direction will be heartily seconded by all intelligent and respectable citizens. The keepers of reputable and orderly saloons will heartily indorse the project to rid their trade of a factor which only brings reproach upon it and tends to demoralize the community. No legitimate interest would suffer if the present number of saloons in this town were cut down one half, while the public would be a vast gainer. The license question in sumably speaking for the national co Schuylkiii county has come to that stage when it beliavoves not only the men engaged in the business, but every parent, to assist in remedving the existing evilse

Such a movement need not be prompted by srying to secure settlement since. puritanical or blue law motives, nor a desire to infringe the principle of "personal liberty." A lessening of the number of saloons would not prevent persons from obtaining malt or spirituous drink if they wished to do so. Experience has simply demonstrated that where saloons are in excess of the natural wants of population, competition becomes so sharp and close as to tempt their proprietors to ske out their meager profits by converting their places into dens of vice and crime, and the evil should be stopped. It is the existence of such low resorts, due to overcrowding of the liquor business, which has brought drinking places as a class into disrepute and made it difficult to awaken public interest in behalf of their owners. It is to be heped that the liquor dealers association will see the wisdom of lending their assistance in enforcing the Brooks' high license law, and thus stamping out the low resorts.

#### A CONVICT'S FORTUNE

Stolen Property Amounting to \$170,000

Unearthed by Boston's Police. BOSTON, Nov. 13.—The arrest of James Stevens Chaffee, of this city, by the pelice and the recovery of over \$20,000 worth of stolen plunder was followed last night by even more startling discoveries. In addition to the property recovered on Monday stocks and bonds to the value of \$141,600 (par value) were brought to the inspector's office. An agreement was found signed by Mrs. William Barrett by which she turned over all her husband's property to Chaffee. Barrett is a notorious criminal now serving a life sentence for murder in this state, and Chaffee claimed that all the stuff which was found on his premises has been given to him by Barrett in return for his having spent a great deal of money in Barrett's defense at the time of the murder trial. The charge against Chaffee is receiving stolen goods while knowing them to have been stolen.

#### SUPREME JUSTICE CARLISLE.

The Secretary May be Appointed to Justice Jackson's Vacant Seat.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18,-The Post today says that Secretary Carlisle may be ap-pointed to the supreme court bench to succeed the late Justice Jackson. The Post says that some time ago the president had practically fixed upon Judge Rufus Peck-ham, of the New York court of appeals, for the place. It continues: "All these plans are said to have been changed by recent elections. Had Kentucky elected a Democratic legislature it was expected that Mr. Carlisle would step from the cabinet into the senate. This anticipation cannot now be realized. The political revolution in Kentucky has also materially affected Mr. Carlisle's chances for the presidential nomination. Should Mr. Carlisle leave the treasury his place will undoubtedly be filled by a New York man, and Charles S. Fairchild is said to have been practically determined upon for the position.'

## AMBASSADORS ANGRY

At the Dilatory Tactics of the Sultan of Turkey.

WILL NOT WAIT MUCH LONGER.

A General Opinion in Constantinople That Abdul Hamid Can be Brought to a Realization of His Duty Only by a Show

CONSTANTINOPER, Nov. 13 .- Each day shows the situation of affairs here to be growing more threatening. The porte yes-terday, replying to the identical notes of the ambassadors of Germany, Austria and Italy, simply said that information regard-ing the scheme for reform in Armenia would be forwarded to the representatives of the powers "without delay."

In other words, these three ambassadors, at least, have obtained no satisfaction at all. It is not yet known if the notes of the ambassadors of Great Britain, Russia and France have been replied to, but it is presumed that they were also assured that their requests for information regarding the proposed reforms would be complied with "without delay."

The action of the sultan in sanctioning the official note issued by the porte on Monday, asserting that "order has now been restored in all the districts," etc., causes much surprise among the diplo mats. This really looks like mocking the

ambassadors, and a second in importance only to the snub administered by the sultan to Great Britain in decorating Bahri Pasha and giving him the command of the troops going to Zeltoun, after he had been removed from a governorship, at the in-stance of the British ambassador, Sir Philip Currie, for his ill treatment of Armenians.

As to order being restored in the dis-turbed districts it need only be said that the mobilization of about 150,000 troops to be sent to these districts is progressing as actively as the Turkish government can push such an undertaking, hampered as it is by lack of funds and the incompetency of its officials. Then, again, advices just received here announce fresh disturbances at Marash, Bitlis and Sivas, with their at

tendant massacres It was stated in European official circles here that as a result of an additional ex-change of views between the powers, through their representatives here and at the different capitals, it is believed that a joint course of action, involving a display of naval and, possibly, military force, has already been decided upon, with a view of restoring order in Armenia, recent events saving clearly demonstrated that the sultan has no intention of really carrying out the scheme for reform agreed upon some time ago after so much delay and annoy-ance. Certain it is that the sultan will not be allowed to triffe with the ambas-

sadors for many days longer. A prominent member of the diplomatic corps is quoted as saying that "the end of all this wretched business is fast approach-It is understood that the powers have about decided that further "identical notes" or other such communications are useless in the case of Abdul Hamid, and that only prompt and efficient military action is likely to have any influence upon

According to official Turkish advices re-ceived by the government the Armenians of Zeltoun have, since capturing the battalion of Turkish troops and practically obtaining possession of the city, attacked the village of Tchoukour Hissar, killed thirty-five Mussulmans, pillaged a house at Dunghel and carried off the arms and cattle of the inhabitants of that neighbor-The Armenians are said to have as sassinated the secretary of the collector of customs of that part of the country.

The vall of Adana, a town situated some distance from Zeitoun and nearer the const, telegraphs that 200 Armenians, disguised as Circassians, have attacked and lundered the Mussulman village of tunbell and Narl, killing a number of the phabltants.

It is believed in some Armenian quarters here that the estimate of 10,000 Armenlans killed during the recent massacres may turn out to be considerably under the real total, and that the number may come nearer 15,000 than 10,000.

Procured Fraudulent Registration. BALTIMORE, Nov. 13.—Assistant United States District Attorney H. Snowden Mar-shall caused the acrest of Charles Schlaffer, of Highlandtown, president of the Oriental Brewing company, ex-member of the house of delegates from Baltimore county, and candidate for county commissioner on the Democratic ticket in the last election, for violating the United States naturalization laws. He was released on \$3,000 bail in his own recognizance. He is alleged to have procured the fraudulent registration number of Germans living in the Twelfth district of Baltimore county.

Enceled Out in Four Rounds CINCINNATI, Nov. 13.—A large crowd was present at the Olympic club here Instnight to witness Jimmy Ryan and George Johnson, colored, fight ten rounds for \$200. Johnson was the taller and heavier, and for three rounds displayed science. In the fourth round the colored man swurg his right, but was countered with a jab on the chin that raised him from the floor. He fell heavily and was rendered unconscient Ryan was awarded the prize.
