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### DUNRAVEN'S CHARGES

To be Investigated by the New York Yacht Club.

DISTINGUISHED COMMITTEEMEN.

William C. Whitney, J. Pierpont Morgan and George L. Rives Selected to Decide on a Mode of Procedure-Mr. Iselin's Vigorous Letter.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.-The New York Yacht club meeting held last night to take action concerning the charges made by Lord Dunraven was crowded with interest. A vigorous refutation of the English man's statements, written by Mr. C. Oliver Iselin, head of the Defender syndicate, was read; also a letter from H. Maitland Kersey, conveying an offer from Lord Dun raven to come to this country for an inves Charge of the whole matter was delegated to a committee of three gentlemen, J. Pierpont Morgan, the financier; William C. Whitney, ex-secretary of the navy, and George L. Rives.

The meeting was of short duration. First, Lord Dunraven's charges, published in the London Field, were read, then rein the London Field, were read, then re-buttal testimony from members of the cup committee and the regatta committee, and then came Mr. Iselin's letter, which is, in substance, as follows:

"A careful perusal of this letter will show that Lord Dunraven makes the charge that, after having been measured for the cup process in Sectorial Process."

charge that, after having been measured for the cup races in September last, the Defender was surreptitionaly loaded so as to sink her four inches deeper in the water; that she sailed in that condition on the first day's race, and that immediately after that race the ballast so loaded was secretly removed, so that when measured the next day (Sunday) no discreases was found to day (Sunday) no discrepancy was found to exist between the two measurements. I consider myself, therefore, as standing before the world solemnly charged by Lord Doursean with an offense as base. by Lord Dunraven with an offense as base as could be possibly imputed to a sports-man and a gentleman, and which I indig-

possible for me to read or reply to before it had already made a deep impression on the minds of his countrymen.'

### TO FIGHT FOR CUBA

Four Patriots Who Broke Their Parole for Independence.

GENERAL GARCIA AMONG THEM.

President Palma Receives Word of the Safe Arrival in Cuba of Two Expeditions, One. of Them Led by General Carrillo, Recently Acquitted at Wilmington.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.-Four men who voluntarily forsook a life of ease to take up acms for the independence of Cube, with the full knowledge that their apprehension anywhere on Spanish territory means death to them, reached this city yesterday on board the French line steam ship La Champagne. They are Major General Calexto Garcia, Mariano Aberiche, Alfred Arango and M. Soto. Calexto Garcia achieved distinction in the ten years' war for Cuban independence, rising to the work. years' war for Cuban independence, rising to the rank of major general of the revo-lutionary forces. Being taken prisoner during that war he was sent to Spain for trial. Powerful court influence was brought to bear in his favor, and his life was spared on condition that he spend the was spared on condition that he spend the remainder of his life within the confines of the city of Madrid, unless permission was given him to leave the city by the Spanish authorities.

Less than a year ago Alfred Arango, Mariano Aberiche and M. Soto were exiled to Spain with other Cuban Insurgents. There they met General Garcia, now a man 55 years old. Their stories of Spanish ty-ranny and cruelty so fired Garcia that he determined to do what he could to secure Cuban independence. In an interview last
