EMBASSIES INSTRUCTED

To Insist Upon the Passage of the Dardanelles.

THE NEED FOR PROMPT ACTION.

While the Sultan Delays Further Massaares of Armenians Are Reported from Hassankalch and Zilch-Germany's Activity in the Negotiations.

LONDON, Dec. 6 .- The Times prints a dispatch from Constantinople, which says that the embassies have received instructions from their respective governments that the guard ships question must be pushed, and that it is impossible for the powers to retire from the positions which they have assumed.

The Daily News has a Constantinople dispatch to the effect that the embassies have unofficially informed the sultan that if the firmans for the extra guard ships are refused the Dardanelles will be forced by the powers. The same correspondent

"The venal press here congratulates the sultan upon the success of his reforms and of his repressive measures, but if the massacres diminish it is merely because victims are lacking.

"Today's news is that 200 Armenians were killed in Kaisariych (Casarea). A massacre has occurred at Hassankaleh, in the vilayet of Erzeroum, about twenty miles east of the city of Erzeroum, where the Armenian monastery was sacked and burned and the bishop, the vicar and other inmates were killed. A feeling of alarm still prevails.

The Daily Telegraph has a dispatch from Vienna which says that sixty-three Armenians were butchered at Zileh and fifty-seven at Hassankaleh, with every ac-companiment of ingenious cruelty. This correspondent affirms that even in Con-stantinople the condition of affairs is far from reassuring.

A Berlin dispatch affirms that Germany has been much more active in endeavors to settle the Armenian difficulty and to maintain the unity of the powers than is generally believed. "It was upon Ger-many's advice," says the dispatch, "that the porte opened negotiations for the submission of the Zeltoun insurgents, which, however, proved fruitless.'

Mail advices received at Constantinople from Jiddah, the scaport town of Mecca, dated Nov. 25, says that the Turkish au-thorities there have made several arrests among the chiefs of the Bedouins, with a view to force the tribes to surrender those persons who made an assault upon the British consul and vice consul, the Russian acting consul and the French consular secretary there on May 30 last. The Bedouius, as a reprisal, are trying to cap ture several Europeans to hold as hostages It is feared that unless a settlement is arrived at the caravans during the coming pilgrimage season to Meeca will be at-tacked by the Bedouins and there will be much bloodshed. The whole country is now unsafe.

Ready to Sail for Turkish Waters, ROME, Dec. 6 .- The Tribuna publishes information from Naples that a squadron of five Italian men-of-war is anchored at Gaeta, and is under orders to be in readiness to proceed to Turkish waters.

EASY ROAD TO WEALTH.

How Philadelphia Electric Light Companies Manage It.

EXOBITANT RATES ARE CHARGED.

The City Pays Twelve Hundred Dollars : Day in Escess of What Is Paid in Other Cities-The Difference Between Chicago and Philadelphia.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 6 .- The subject of electric lighting occupied the entire session of the senate investigating committee yes-terday. Professor William Marks, pres ident of the Edison Electric Light comhas experienced in obtaining privileges from the city. One of the first statements made by Professor Marks created a sensa-tion. It was to the effect that Philadelphia should not pay more than thirty cents per are light per night for lighting in the old city limits, each light to burn eleven ours. Continuing Professor Marks said the

business of furnishing electric illumina-tion should be conducted so as to bring a commercial profit of 0 or 7 per cent. He would be willing to supply all of it, 5.300 lights in Philadelphia, at \$100 per lamp annually, if he could obtain that price, or even reduce it to \$100 per lamp if necessary.

The Edison Electric Light company had not bid on the contracts for city lighting because it was forbidden from so doing by a clause inserted in the ordinance of April, a clause inserted in the ordinances April, 5, 1895, authorizing the Edison company to use the streets of the city. The first section of that ordinance contained a proviso forbidding the use of the Edison system of underground conduits for the transmis sion of currents for electric lighting. The Edison company finally leased its rights from the Penn Electric Light company, which had the franchise.

Arthur H. Lea was recalled to the stand and asked to state the average cost per light in the city of Philadelphia per num. His reply was that each light cost \$159.68. He also said that direct information from the department of public safety showed that there are 6,225 electric lights in the city. He was then asked the names of the directors of the West End company and be said the board was composed of Charles A. Porter, Albert Baltz, James M. O'Brien and James Scholl. He also found that the Northern Electric

Light company's territory had been divided between the Brush, Manufacturers' and Kensington companies. He made a comparison between Chicago and Philadelphia, and found that Chicago charged \$35 a lamp, and Professor Parsons had figured it out that the city pays over \$1,900 in ex-cess of what it should pay for its lights. At the conclusion of the session, the inrestigation was adjourned until Wednesday next.
