## A CONDITIONAL COMPROMISE

Effectuated Between Pittsburg District Miners and Their Employers.

PITTSBURG, Dec. 6.—The joint miners and operators' convention, with but three dissenting votes, adopted the following resolutions: The price for mining in this vein shall be state-fair, from Jan. 1 to March 31, and seventy cents from April 1 to Dec. 31, 1905. All company stores shall be abolished; sixty-five cents, with 12 1/2 cent bonus, shall be paid to miners; select shall mean such coal as miners select from the mine in each on the 15th and 25th of each month, and any company store shall be closed at the end of each month. A committee of five operators and five miners was appointed, to report all differences under the contract shall be referred to this committee.

This committee will meet between Jan. 1 and 15 to discuss the situation. If they shall find that the provisions are being practically complied with, and the New York and Cleveland Gas Coal company is paying the district price of sixty-four cents, then the committee shall declare the contract in effect. If, however, the coal company is not paying the price, the committee shall declare the price being paid by said company to be the price for mining.

## Here Advertiser Arrives in New York

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—Dr. Herman Advertiser, of Berlin, the celebrated anti-semitic agitator, arrived yesterday on the North German Lloyd steamship Spree. Here Advertiser expects to give several lectures in this country under the auspices of a New York anti-semitic club. It is said Dr. Advertiser's mission to America is to start a campaign against the Hebrews, his doctrine being that they are encroaching upon the wealth of the world, and are a menace to the prosperity of other races of the earth. He does not believe they should hold office, enjoy the rights of citizenship or have any share in public affairs.

## Victory for Chicago's Gas Trust

CHICAGO, Dec. 6.—I cannot see anything to prevent these companies from consolidating. I cannot see that it is contrary to the statutes of this state," said Judge Shawler in the United States circuit court yesterday afternoon in refusing the injunction against the gas trust. The court's announcement, following immediately upon the conclusion of the attorney general's appeal for an injunction, was a surprise. No one had expected an instant decision. The decision of the court was upon the question of the proper interpretation of the act of 1893, amending the act of March, 1872, referring to corporations.

## The Referee Not Responsible

OMAHA, Dec. 6.—S. G. V. Griswold, sporting editor of The Bee, and the recognized authority on sporting affairs in the west, was exonerated yesterday, at Plattsmouth, of complicity in the death of Arthur Robbin, who died there a year ago after engaging in a prize fight with James Lindsey, in which Griswold was referee. The jury declared him in no wise responsible for the fatal termination of the affair.

## A Grave Robber's Delayed Confession

VINTON, Ia., Dec. 6.—John Cummings, a painter, yesterday confessed to grave robbery, the body being that of a young lady relative of J. R. Christie, the foremost citizen of Marion. Cummings implicated five highly respected citizens of Vinton. The robbery was committed twenty-two years ago. He promises more startling developments.

Happenings Throughout the Region Chronicled for Hasty Perusal.

East Apple alley has been graded from Bowers to Emerick streets.

Five collieries at Shamokin were compelled to suspend operations on account of scarcity of cars.

Mahanoy City Republicans have adopted a modified form of the Crawford county system of voting at primaries.

Secretary Curtin, of the Board of Health, is preparing the annual report to be forwarded to the State Board.

Cards are out announcing the marriage of Miss Jennie Fisher and Samuel Powell, both of Ashland, on the 31st inst.

The Citizens Standing Committee has decided to meet next Monday evening to begin preparing for the spring elections.

Some of the tenants of the Girard Estate, notwithstanding notices to the contrary, have applied for a renewal of their licenses.

There have been 305 applications for liquor licenses filed up to noon yesterday. This is 91 less than at the same time last year.

The crossing at Centre street and Plum alley, on the south side, has been raised to make it more in conformity with the new grade.

The Girard Estate officials have staked off their grounds between the Kehley Run colliery and the Lehigh Valley railroad, to show the limits.

Jack Frost has put a stop to much of the street digging and there will be less trenches for pedestrians and wagons to avoid between now and spring.

A cooking main of three battles between Mahanoy City and Gilberton birds was fought at the latter place on Wednesday, Mahanoy City winning two out of three.

The boroughs of Sunbury and East Sunbury will vote for or against consolidation at a special election in the near future. Greater Sunbury will then have about 10,000 population.

James Lohner, of Mahanoy City, while hunting lost his way and wandered about the woods all night. When found by friends he was four miles the other side of the Pottsville dam.

Mrs. Grace Williams died at her home in Girardville, about 60 years of age. In September she was knocked down by a carriage from the effects of which she never recovered, and which caused her death.

## First Journey of the Liberty Bell

We have received from Wauwauker & Brown, 6th and Market streets, Philadelphia, a large photograph of a painting in oil, 13 feet by 6 feet, representing "The First Journey of the Liberty Bell." It has been painted expressly for them and will be unveiled for public view in a few days. Their purpose is to place it on the 6th street front of their building, and present to all who apply by letter or in person an excellent half-tone copy of the picture with historical pamphlet. The story of the journey is familiar to our readers. After the battle of Brandywine, while the British were approaching the city, the bell was lowered, and placed on a wagon and hurried away out the old York road to Trenton, through Bethlehem, then to Allentown and hit in a cellar. After the success of Washington at the battle of Monmouth, in 1776, it was taken back to Philadelphia and placed in its position.

## THE LYON-DUNN CONTEST.

A Copy of the Petition Has Been Served on Judge-elect P. M. Dunn.

A copy of the petition in the Lyon-Dunn contest has been served upon Judge-elect P. M. Dunn, and the latter accepted service. The question will be argued before the Attorney General next Wednesday, and his decision is awaited with much interest. There is much difference of opinion as to whether or not the Attorney General will grant the prayer of the petitioners to direct the process to issue.

The petition sets forth that there were ballots in each and every polling place in the county deposited for P. M. Dunn that were improperly marked; that the ballots of illegal and fraudulent electors were counted contrary to law; that persons whose names were not upon the registry of voters were received and counted for P. M. Dunn for the office of Orphans Court Judge.

It further sets forth that at the election Thomas H. B. Lyon was duly elected, having received more legal votes than P. M. Dunn, the candidate who was returned as elected, and is therefore entitled to the office. The petitioners pray that a process may issue to the end that the complaint set forth may be heard and determined.

The petition has sixty-nine signatures, which is sworn to by seventeen of this number, namely: James Clifford, Lloyd Dennis, J. W. Snyder, John Wyatt, C. O. Smith, W. G. Breckons, Joseph B. Klondius, William Rudige, George W. Oelger, W. T. Clifford, Joseph A. Weller, William Smith, H. E. Smith, J. A. Wagner, Morris J. Lock and C. F. Kleindienst.

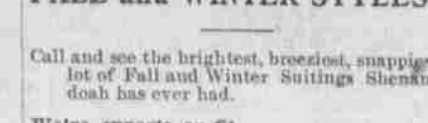
