## A MURDERER'S CURSE.

Harry Hayward's Denunciation of His Brother Adry.

WANTED TO CHEAT THE GALLOWS.

When Adry Declined to Assist Him the Condemned Man, with But Three More Days of Life Before Him, Indulged in the Vilest Abuse. MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 9 .- "May the curse

of God fall on you and yours and allow me from the minute I drop from the scaf-fold to haunt you day and night until your death. Then I will welcome you on the brink of hell with a red hot iron."

These are the farewell words of Harry Hayward to his brother Adry yesterday afternoon. He hurled them at the latter as he descended the stairs leading to the tier in which the prisoner was confined, and passed through the Iron doorway to the outer office. It was their last meeting on earth, and such the murderer intended

The meeting between the brothers was arranged by the parents, who beseeched

the condemned man to see Adry once more before he died. He remained obstinate to their entreaties for a long time, but finally yielded and sent by messenger a note,

"Dear Adry, I want you to come at once to the jail, as I wish particularly to see you. I have no other object than the desire to ask your forgiveness for any wrong, either real or imaginary, which I may have done you. I want once more to see you on this earth. This is the wish and dying request of your brother.

When Adry reached the prison Dr. Hayward was with the condemned man. The doctor left, however, and on the way out stopped for a brief interview with his brother Adry as the latter passed up to see the condemned brother. They addressed each other in a friendly manner, and then, at Harry's request, the deputies withdrew. What passed was not heard by any person until Harry raised his voice to

say:
"Now, I have done my part. I have forgiven you for all you have done. Now, do

as I ask."

"But," returned Adry, appealingly,
"Harry, how can I?"

The prisoner sprang to his feet and
poured forth a tirade of abuse never before
heard in the jail. "You low down,
mean, contemptible, miserable, damnable
wretch," he said, "if I could only get at you, I would dig out your brains with a knife. I would tear out your heart with my hands. I would crush the two together, cut them into pieces, squeeze out the juice, make it into a pie and thrust it down your throat.

He clenched his hands in his rage and CLUSTON ROBBINS, M. D., stamped his foot flercely. His face was

ashen and livid by turns,
Adry, seeing the uselessness of further waiting, arose to go, saying as he did so, "God bless you, Harry." Then followed the prisoner's parting words, as his brother P. F. BURKE, M. D.

It is stated today that the murderer had asked his brother to procure him some poison, that he might cheat the gallows. On Saturday Governor Clough signed J. H. POMEROY, the death warrant for Hayward's execution, which is set for Wednesday next.

Fought Fire All Day Sanday.

CHICAGO, Dec. 9.-The firemen in the down town district put in all day yester-day fighting a stubboru fire that caused a loss of \$200,000. The five story brick and stone front building at 250 and 252 Madison street, owned by the Seipp estate and occupied by H. Wolf & Co., dealers in general merchandise, was completely destroyed. The adjoining building, owned by Paul Robbarth and occupied by the Steuben Wine company and Shilby & Co., elgar dealers on the first floor; A. W. Hayward & Co., wholesale shoe dealers, and H. Wolf & Co., on the floors above, was slightly damaged, and the stocks of the occupants also suffered to a large extent. A heavy fire wall between the two buildings prevented more serious results.

Run Down by a Trolley Car.

NEWBURGH, N. Y., Dec. 9 .- A rapidly moving trolley freight car Saturday night struck a wagon on Broadway in which were riding Moses Daley, Patrick Leahy and Michael Burke. Daley and Leahy re-ceived serious scalp wounds and bruises. and Burke's back was injured. They were all taken to St. Luke's hospital. Sent to Prison for Eight Years. NORRISTOWN, Pa., Dec. 9.-Joseph Buz. gard, alias Frazer, and D. H. Brant were each sentenced to eight years in the Eastern penitentlary by Judge Weand. The prisoners were indicated for thirteen robberies in the vicinity of Souderton. Although they had only carried on operaplunder found at their homes amounted to over \$3,500.

An Insane Father's Crime.

DEXTER, In., Dec. 9.-Grant Hibbs fa tally shot his wife and committed suicide Saturday night. When neighbors entered the house Mrs. Hibbs was holding her huspand's head in her lap and a year old baby playing in the blood that flowed from its father's wounds. Hibbs had been released from Mount Pleasant Insane asylum as oured five weeks ago.

Julian Refuses to Sign.

Houston, Tex., Dec. 9.—W. K. Whee-lock yesterday saw Martin Julian, man-ager of Bob Fitzsimmons, and tried to induce him to sign articles for the meeting with Peter Maher. Julian positively re-fused to sign, objecting to the date, Feb. 14, and to the size of the purse hung up, wanting \$20,000.

# Almost > RUSSIA MAKES A DEMAND

She Joins the Powers in Insisting on Extra Guard Ships.

REPORTS ANENT KUTCHUK SAID.

One Dispatch Declares That He Will Re turn to the Yildis Palace, While Another Story States That He Has Decided to Leave Turkey.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 9 .- The situation here on the question of extra guard ships of the powers remains unchanged, and continues to offer a tribute to the powers of the evasion of oriental diplomacy as practiced by the Turkish government. Statements are constantly reiterated of the continued accord of the powers on the subject, and their unyielding determination to insist upon a compliance with their de-mands. Less is heard, however, of the rumors which were of frequent occurrence in the early period, after the demand had been presented, that the sultan had at length decided to gra t the necessary firman to permit the passage of the Darda-nelles, or even that he had actually issued

Neither is there such explicit announce ment of the period which is to elapse be-fore a movement of the warships of the powers is to commence to enforce the de mands made upon the sultan. Since the return of her majesty's ship Dryad to Salonica bay no word has been heard of any actual order or movement to advance upon the Dardanelles. Opinion continues di-vided as to whether the delay in taking any action to enforce the demands is due to a fear of causing a fanatical outbreak against the Christians by the Mussulmans subjects of the sultan or to a dread of a clash ensuing between the powers them-

It is currently reported that M. Nelidoff, the Russian ambassador, yesterday gave the sultan the czar's message, insisting

upon the entry of the guard ships.

That the suitan lives in a state of constant apprehension of his life was indicated by his demeanor during the course of the ceremony of the Solamik, on Friday, which involves the departure of the sultan from the walls of the palace and his ap-pearance in public for a sort of review of the troops, attended by many high officials,

followed by prayers at the mosque. On Friday, as the sultan was quitting the mosque, a man attired as a Turk and bearing a petition forced himself through the soldiers to the sultan's carriage. The sultan was seen to become much agitated and deathly pale, but the man was promptly arrested and hustled off to prison without having accomplished any harm to

the sultan's person.
It is probable that, as a result of the ne gotiations, Said Pasha will voluntarily quit the British embassy. Lord Salisbury has telegraphed his approval of Sir Philip Currie's conduct. Meantime the gates of the embassy are closed, and the force

the embassy are closed, and the force which was landed from the ambassador's yacht Imogene patrols the ground.

Authentic details have now been received of the Sivas massacres. They show that the slaughter began on Nov. 12 and continued for a week following. It is known that 1,200 Armenians and ten Turks were killed before these presents. killed before there was a cessation of the

bloody work. A high official in position to know de clares that the massacres were the delib erate act of the sultan's vengeance for having been compelled to grant the reforms in Armenia demanded by the powers. A few of the Turkish shops were attacked to afford a pretext on which to accuse the

Armenians of having started the disorder. The expulsion and removal of the Ar menians from Constantinople and from the vilayets continues by wholesale. All the Armenian monasteries in the vicinity of Erzingjan have been pillaged. The massacre there occurred after the Armenians had been disarmed and Zokki Pasha had faithfully promised to protect them.

At the village of Pesuan, near Erzingjan, the Kurds and Turks attacked a crowd of Armenians who had taken refuge in an Armenian church and killed forty of them. Altogether, 400 were killed and 800 wounded in the Erzingjan district.

Says a Hundred Thousand Were Killed. MEMPHIS, Dec. 0.-The relatives of Mrs. Helen Royster Bliss, who resides in Mem-phis, are in receipt of a letter relative to the Armenian wars. Mrs. Bliss says: "At Harpoot all but four of our missionary houses have been destroyed and these were looted. At Erzeroum 20,000 Armenlans were killed in less than ten days. Over 100,000 Armenians have been butchered, mostly men, leaving women and children in awful poverty with winter upon them.

Kutchuk Sald Will Leave Turkey.

LONDON, Dec. 9.-The correspondent of The Times confirms the report that M. Nelidoff gave the sultan the ezar's mes-sage insisting on the entry of the guard ships. This correspondent adds: "I be-fleve that an irade is imminent appointing the Kurd, Said Pasha, grand vizier. The Said Pasha, who is at the British embassy, is named Kutchuk Said. I learn that Kut chuk Said has determined to leave the country.

Cardinal Gibbons Celebrates Mass, New York, Dec. 9.-Yesterday was the occasion of the joint celebration of the feast of the immagulate conception and the solemnization of the feast of St. Francis Kavier, the patron saint of St. Francis Xavier church in this city. Cardinal Gib bons, of Baltimore, celebrated the high pontificial mass in honor of the occasion. The church was profusely decorated with flowers, terns and other plants. About the great altar were banked palms and roses, as were also the altars of the virgin with lilles, and that of St. Joseph with choice exotics.

The Dead Man to Blame,

CLEVELAND, Dec. 9 .- It is said that the coroner has decided upon his verdict in the recent viaduet accident by which seventeen persons lost their lives. Motorman Rodgers, of the car which plunged into the open draw, is held blameless, it is said. It is said that the coroner also ex-onerates the bridge captain, and that the verdict will place the blame on the conductor of the car, Edward Hoffman, who met death in the accident.

Mrs. Farrall Injured in a Runaway. WALDORF, Md., Dec. 9.—Mrs. Belle Far-rall, who became widely known through her sensational trial at La Plata some months ago for the poisoning of her hus-band, and which resulted in her acquittal, is lying at the home of P. A. Sasseer, suf-fering from serious injuries received by a fall from a road eart. Mrs. Farrall's horse ran away, and the cart was wrecked. Her injuries, it is thought, will not prove fatal.
