

Water Companies Interested.
The injunction case of the Mine Hill railroad and the P. & R. railroad vs. the Shenandoah Water Company, which was argued before Judge Mitchell yesterday afternoon, is one of much interest to water companies and consumers. The leading company claims as it is a consumer it has as much right or more to the use of the water for mechanical purposes than those using it for domestic needs. The water company takes the opposite view of the matter and maintains that the water consumer who uses it for domestic purposes has the first right to it. This case grew out of an attempt of the water company to shut off the supply from the collieries and locomotives owned by the plaintiffs, during the dry season when water was scarce. An injunction was granted preventing the water company from shutting off the water. The decision is awaited with much interest.
