VACILLATING MISS AUB.

Her Counsel Wants Her Examined by Insanity Experts,

BUT THE REQUEST WAS IGNORED.

The Prisoner Held in Default of \$1,000 Bail to await Trial for Perjury—She Claims to Have Been Drugged Before Making Her Confession.

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—Barbara Aub, indicted for perjury on her accusation of assault against Walter S. Langerman, was arraigned before Judge Cowing yesterday and pleaded not guilty.

Mr. House, counsel for Miss Aub, suggested that the court appoint a commission to inquire into the mental condition of the girl. He had, he said, arrived so far as no definite conclusion in the case. He had some private facts about the girl's case which he would submit to the court.

Miss Aub's counsel stated to the court that when he was first assigned to the case the woman seemed to feel that she had done her duty in confessing to perjury.



When I saw her on Monday last," he went on, "in response to a message by telephone, she told me that she had no recollection of making any confession, nor did she recollect going to the house of Recorder Goff on the eve of Thanksgiving Day.

"She said that such a confession was impossible, as the story she told on the witness stand was true. I then asked her how she came to make this confession, and she replied that from the time of the trial until Wednesday afternoon she had been in a dream.

"She made one peculiar statement to me. She asked me if I thought that Miss Kellard would be brought into the case. I told her I did not know. She then said: 'If you can give me any assurance that Miss Kellard will not be prosecuted I will tell the truth.' I told her that I had no authority to promise immunity to Miss Kellard, but that I did not think she was in any danger of prosecution."

Colonel Fellows said that he had intended to move that the girl be discharged on her own recognizance; had not the new phase caused by her recent recantation appeared. He asked that bail be fixed at \$1,000. Barbara, he said, was the victim of foul friends.

Judge Cowing paid no attention to the request for a commission in lunacy. He fixed bail at \$1,000, and the prisoner was taken back to jail in default.

At the jail Miss Aub said to a reporter: "As true as there is a God in Heaven, I can positively say that the first statement I made about Langerman is true. Anything else I might have said is untrue."

Miss Smalley asked her if she was influenced in her confession by any one from the Door of Hope. Barbara hesitated a moment and then said, "yes."

Barbara was then asked: "What promise was made to you to confess? Do you know what promise was made to Miss Kellard to obtain your confession?"

Barbara replied: "I don't know that Miss Kellard promised anything, but she said to me that I would never want for anything in the world if I would stick to my confession. She also promised me a house on Madison avenue, near Thirty-seventh street."

Miss Aub then said that some one whom she believed was connected with the Door of Hope had given her a drug in a glass of milk. She said that after taking it she lost her senses, and was like one in a dream. She said she had no recollection of having made a confession, but believed that she must have made it, because it was on record.

Miss Marie Leslie, who was a prisoner in the same room with Barbara, told a reporter that Miss Aub had told her that she had given a check for \$5 to Miss Kellard to have cashed for her, and that she had not seen Miss Kellard since.

After Barbara had refused to see Mrs. Whittemore on Thursday the latter sent her a letter in which she said she was sorry Barbara had not stuck to her and to God, for no one but God could help her.

After reading this letter Barbara said: "The next time I get in trouble I will see a lawyer first and God next."

Barbara said that Miss Kellard had sent her a note during the afternoon, and asked that Barbara send her an answer to the Door of Hope. The letter chided Barbara for the stories appearing in the papers. This letter stated that Miss Kellard had made an addition to her Sunday school class and hoped Barbara would soon join them. With this letter Miss Kellard sent a basket of fruit.

THE ARMENIAN HORRORS

Reports of Misery and Distress Have Not Been Exaggerated.

SWORN STATEMENT OF A REFUGEE

Many Armenian Prisoners Were Killed After Being Taken to Prison—The Red Cross Society Will Undertake the Work of Distributing Relief.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 14.—At the meeting of the ambassadors on Tuesday last the reports received from Armenia at the different embassies were compared and thoroughly discussed, with the view of enabling the different representatives to compile full reports on the subject for the use of their governments. It is believed that if the result of this conference is published it will show an unparalleled state of affairs.

Switzerland, Dec. 14.—At the meeting of the ambassadors on Tuesday last the reports received from Armenia at the different embassies were compared and thoroughly discussed, with the view of enabling the different representatives to compile full reports on the subject for the use of their governments.

Letters received here from Aleppo say that there is serious fear there of a massacre of the Christians unless the powers intervene promptly to prevent it.

News was also received from Zeltoun that the Turkish troops from March, are surrounding the Armenians, cutting off their lines of communication and preventing them from obtaining reinforcements, provisions and the supplies of arms and ammunition, which are understood to have been forwarded to them from many parts of Asiatic Turkey.

A Turkish official who is familiar with the situation at Zeltoun said today that the Armenians there were inclined to surrender to the Turks, but they distrusted the promises of the latter that their lives would be spared if they laid down their arms.

Izzet Bey, the first chamberlain of the sultan and the great favorite, recently of his majesty, has been replaced by Hadjiali Bey and Emrit Bey at the palace, but the last named has been arrested in consequence of the charges brought against him by Kutchuk Said Pasha, the ex-grand vizier.

Izzet Pasha recently presented the sultan with a long report upon the deplorable situation of the country. The sultan refused to read it, whereupon Izzet Pasha resigned, but the sultan refused to accept it. Izzet, however, persists in resigning.

The young Turks warmly blame Kutchuk Said Pasha for leaving the British embassy, and hope he will insist on his announced intention of going abroad. On the other hand, the old Turks blame him for taking refuge in the embassy. The result is that Said Pasha's prestige in the eyes of the Turks is considered to have been considerably shaken, and it is believed that his political career is terminated.

It transpired today that the British vice-consul at Van and Sivas, who have been here for some time past awaiting their expropriations, have not received these documents, in spite of the long delay, and they started for their posts on Wednesday last without them.

MANY PRISONERS MURDERED.

Statement of an Armenian Who Was Released from a Turkish Prison.

LONDON, Dec. 14.—The Daily News publishes a statement on this made in London by an Armenian named Aslanian, who was sent to New York by the Anglo-Armenian association yesterday. Aslanian says that he lived in America for merely, and that he left New York in the beginning of September to rejoin his wife. On his arrival in Constantinople he was thrown into prison, although he had a regular passport. While there, which was during the recent disturbances, he witnessed a horrible scene, hundreds of Armenians being brought into the prison and deliberately killed.

Aslanian said further that the prisoners were wounded with rifle butts and bayonets by the soldiers under the order of the officers. This continued for forty-eight hours. He believed that 300 people were killed and 500 wounded in that time. The women and relatives who were weeping and imploring at the gates for permission to see their husbands and sons were roughly repulsed by the soldiers.

On the following day Aslanian was put in irons, and was entertained regarding his supposed associates, who had come from America for revolutionary purposes. Upon pleading ignorance of this he was tortured with a truncheon beaten upon the shoulders, thighs and legs, causing agony. This was repeated on eleven different occasions. He was placed in solitary confinement for a fortnight, and other prisoners were similarly treated.

When the delegates from the embassies came to inspect the prison they displayed the marks of their beating, "but," Aslanian continued, "feeling vengeance, I said they were due to rheumatism and begged for my release. Four days later I was liberated."

Red Cross Will Distribute Relief. WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—The American Red Cross Society has decided to accept the duty of distributing the relief funds for the Armenian sufferers. Miss Barton announces that, according to conservative estimates, there are 350,000 utterly destitute people in that country who will have to be assisted for six or eight months. Funds may be sent to Miss Clara Barton, Washington.

Chinese Re-enter Port Arthur. SHANGHAI, Dec. 14.—Several Russian warships yesterday watched the formal re-entry of the Chinese into Port Arthur. It is believed that China, as a reward for Russia's intervention in her favor against Japan after the war, will permit the Russian Pacific fleet to winter in Kiao-Chau bay.

Digby Bell is Hard Luck. TRENTON, N.J., Dec. 14.—The Digby Bell opera company, with forty-five people, is stranded here, and were unable to keep their date at Cedar Rapids last night. A benefit was given Thursday night, but not sufficient funds were raised to get the company out of town.
