## TEN MEN WERE SCALDED

By Escaping Steam on the American Liner St. Paul.

SEVEN OF THE VIOTIMS KILLED.

Those Who Escaped Doath Had the Skin Peeled from Their Faces and Arms, and Presented a Horrible Appearance—The Aceldent Delays the Steamer's Departure.

New York, Dec. 19.—By the bursting of a steam valve on board the American line steamer St. Paul at Pier 14, North river, seven men were scalded to death and three others were so badly scalded that they had to be taken to the hospital. The St. Paul was to have sailed for Southampton yes-

terday, but her departure was delayed.

The dead are: James Fawns, assistant engineer, of England; George Manning, fourth assistant engineer; Robert Camp bell, machinist, New York: George Williams, machinist, Hoboken, N. J.; Daniel McCallion, machinist's helper, Brooklyn A. Foget, cleaner, Scotland; Robert Wilson, machinist, Scotland.

The injured are: Frank Vespers, third assistant engineer, Roxbury, Mass.; Andrew Heard, storekeeper, Scotland; M. Dunham, machinist, England; Edward

Wischert, engineer.
At the time of the accident there were about thirty men, engineers, machinists and helpers in the fire room and engine room. A large steam valve, leading from the fire room into the engine room, burst and filled the two apartments with escap ing steam.

James Carnegie, chief engineer, was not in the engine room at the time of the explosion. The second assistant engineer, plosion. The second assistant engineer, James Fawns, was there with other assis-tants and machinists oiling the machinery and getting ready to sail. The noise of the escaping steam which followed the bursting of the valve was heard on deck, and great excitement followed on the ship.

cries of the men in the fire room were also heard, and some of the crew went to their resone. Two or three of the scalded men climbed up on deck. The skin was peeled from their faces and arms, and they presented a horrible appearance.

When the steam had cleared away it

was found that five men had been scalded to death and that five others were badly injured, two of whom died after reaching the hospital. The police were notified and ambulances were summoned from the Hudson Street hospital. Doctors accompanied the ambulances to the pier, and did what they could to relieve the scalded The injured were then conveyed to the hospital.

Fawns, Manning, Campbell, Williams and McCallion were dead before help reached them. They were nearest to the steam valve which burst, and the escaping steam struck them with such force that they were unable to help themselves, and they were scalded to death in a few minutes.

The other men who were in the fire room at the time of the accident ran for their lives. All succeeded in escaping with the exception of those mentioned. Edeard Wischert, of England, the electrician of the St. Paul, was also scalded about the hands and face, but not severely enough to go to the hospital. He was at-tended on board the steamer.

The cause of the explosion has not yet been determined.

## SUSTAINING CLEVELAND.

Bill to Create a Venezuelan Commission Introduced.

#### A VERY BELLIGERENT SENTIMENT

Prevails Among the Members of Both Houses of Congress - Mr. Chandler Wants a Heavy Increase in the National Armament-England's Alaskan Claims,

WASHINGTON, Doc. 19.—Yesterday's ses sion of the house did not last an hour, but it sufficed for the passage of a bill authorizing the president to appoint a commission to investigate the Venezuelan boundary, and appropriating \$100,000 for the expenses of the commission. The bill, which carries into effect the recommendations of the president's message, was pre-pared by Mr. Hitt and met the approval of Speaker Reed. Although several Republican leaders expressed themselves in conversation as favoring the reference of the message to the committee on foreign af-fairs, Mr. Boutelle was the only member who voiced that view on the floor.

Speeches for the bill were made by Mr. Hitt and Mr. Crisp and attempted by other members, who could not secure recogni-tion. There was not a vote against it, and considerable applause was given to the pa-triotic references in the speeches.

The house decided to have its holiday re-cess extend from Friday. Dec. 20, to Fri-day, Jan. 3, a vacation of two weeks. There will be but one more session before the holidays, that of tomorrow, when Speaker Reed will probably announce the house

A bill was also introduced in the house by Representative Fairchild, of New York, to provide for a national military park on the Palisades of the Hudson and the preservation of the Palisades mountain from destruction by blasting and other agencies. The bill was prepared by the commissioners appointed last winter by the legislatures of New York and New Jersey. The park proposed is twelve miles long and from 100 yards to three quarters of a mile wide, extending from Fort Lee, N. J., to Piermont, N. Y. The plan fol-lows the precedents made by the establish-ment of the Chickamanga and Chattanooga battlefield parks.

The senate shared the general sentiment of belligerency prevalent yesterday, and from the outset of the session the measures proposed breathed a spirit of patriotism and of preparation for any emergency that might arise concerning Venezuela. The first bill introduced was that of Mr. Chandler, of New Hampshire, providing an appropriation of \$100,000,000 for a heavy increase in the national armament. This was quickly followed by propositions and the secretary of war to purchase a late device of heavy buttery, and for a report on the feasibility of equipping for service the old ship Constitution.

Mr. Hill, of New York, added to the suggestions of defense by asking immediate consideration for a bill making ex-Confederates eligible to service in the army and navy. Aside from these steps inaugurating legislation the day passed without decisive action on the Venezuelan question.

As a further expression on the subject of British encroachments the senate agreed to a resolution calling on the presidence.


