FORTY-THREE KILLED

By an Explosion of Firedamp in a North Carolina Mine.

BODIES FEARFULLY MUTILATED.

Out of Sixty-seven Men Who Went to Work in the Mine Only Twenty-four Were Brought Out Alive, and Some of These Will Probably Die.

RALEIGH, N. C., Dec. 20.—Shortly after the day force numbering sixty-sevenmen, had gone on duty at the Cumnock coal mines, six miles west of here, a terrible firedamp explosion occurred, with fatal effect. Upon hearing the roport the peo-ple of the village and relatives of the en-tombed miners hastened to the scene, but for some time they were unable to gain tidings from below. After pumping fresh air into the shafts several miners were prevailed upon to venture down and in-

They found and brought out twenty-four men from shafts Nos. 2 and 3. Five or six of them were badly wounded, and some of them will probably dis. Others were slightly wounded. A male and two men were killed in slope No. 2. After considerable distributions of the state of the sta able delay the scarching party entered slope No. 1, where they were grooted by a most horrible and ghastly sight. Dead men, fearfully mutilated, were found, some of them partly covered up with pieces of coal, timber and other debris. The searching party came up and reported what they had found. At 4 o'clock ten or twelve miners went down to bring up the dead bodies, but at last accounts none of

the dead had been recovered.

It is believed that forty-three men were killed. Several had families living at Cumnock. Eight of the dead miners were from Pennsylvania, and expected to return to that state today to visit relatives. Mothers, wives and sisters were around the mines all day weeping and wringing their hands with grief, expecting every minute to see the lifeless forms of some loved one brought up.

A quantity of dynamite which was in the mine exploded, weeking coal cars and splitting massive pieces of timber into kindling wood.

The Cumnock mines were opened about fifty years ago as the Egypt mines. A year before the war there was an explo-sion in the mine which caused a few deaths. After the war the mine was vir-tually abandoned, but about fifteen years tually abandoned, but about fifteen years ago was pumped out and some mining done, but the output was small. Five or six years ago a company composed of Pennsylvanians bought the mine, and two years ago expended \$300,000 on new machinery. This company changed the name this year from Egypt to Cumnock, after a noted mine in Scotland. HAYWARD'S CONFESSION

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 20.—The ante-mor-tem statement of Harry T. Hayward, the full text of which makes 30,000 words, is in many respects a most remarkable document. It was made under the most formal conditions and with solemn assertions on the murderer's part that he wastelling the truth. Not only does Hayward claim to have murdered during his brief career no less than five different persons, but in de-scribing the various tragedles in which he figured he shows an utter absence of human feeling and a pleasure in his achievements that mark him as an un-usual type of criminal. The language used in describing his criminal adventures is in the same careless, flippant style that characterized his testimony on the stand.

acceptived his testimony on the stand.

His first murder was that of Carrie Hass, near Pasadena, Cal., and he describes the affair thus: "I met this girl at a dance, and, to cut it short, I killed her. She had money, and I shot her and buried her. That is all of that, I look at it in this way -it was not much of an amount-it was \$700 and some old that she had. I got the money. She would naturally holler, and I fooked at it that she would be better off if dead. There would not be anybody to holler around, and she did not have any holior around, and she did not have any relations. She was young, pretty and a little bit on the sporting order. The money was left her by her father. It has always been in my head to kill a person and not look at their face after they are dead, be-cause there's that mind business. That leaves an impression on your mind. That is what makes murderers confess. The conscience bothers them."

He then goes on to describe how he got her money on some pretext, inveigled her out to drive in the mountains and how he shot her. She did not die at once, but flopped around.
