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ADVANCING UN HAVANA

Cuban Insurgents Rapidly Nearing the Capital City.

CAMPOS UNABLE TO CHECK THEM.

By Clever Strategy the Insurgent Commanders Avoid the Spanish Army, Leave the Spanish Leaders Bekind and Destroy Railways and Bridges Between Them.

HAVANA, Dec. 198 - Further details reached here yesterday from Matagas of the rapid advance of the insurgent army, numbering about 12,000 men, upon Havana, after foreing its way through the province of Santa Clara and into the province of Matanzas, in spite of the efforts of Captain General Martinez de Campos and about 80,000 troops at his disposal in the territory traversed and invaded.

The reported important battle on Tues-day between the Spaniards under Campos and the insurgents at Coliseo plantation, twelve miles from Cardenas, does not appear to have been a very severe engage-ment. Cardonas is a scaport, quite an im-portant place for Cuba, of about 4,000 inabitants. It is only twenty-one miles from Matenzas, capital of the province of that

The Spanish forces do not appear to have encountered the main body of the insur-gents, as at first announced. The fight at the Collseo plantation was between a portion of the northern column of the three insurgent columns now pushing through the province of Matanzas, and instead of turning out to be a great victory for the Spaniards the result of the engagement was virtually a defeat for Campos, for the Cubau army pushed onward unchecked,

and is still advancing on this city.

The fighting took place amid burning cane, under wood, tall grass and trees, and was of the usual guerrilla nature. At times both the troops and the insurgents were surrounded by walls of flame, and the smoke was so dense over certain portions of the ground contested that the Cubans and the troops, unable to see each other, kept banging away at open spaces, wasting vast quantities of good ammuni-tion. It is true that this indiscriminate firing was more noticed upon the part of the troops than on the side of the insurgents. For one insurgent killed at least 2,000 shots must have been fired.

General Campos seems to have a supreme contempt for the bullets of the insurgents, but he is rapidly learning to admire their tactics. In spite of all the veteran Spanish commander does, the Cubans are marching through his forces, with but a few skirmishes here and there, and he seems to be utterly unable to concentrate ahead of them forces sufficient to draw the enemy into a pitched battle. When Campos establishes a headquarters and lays out a place of battle the Cubans seem, by some mysterious means, to hear of it, for, pretending to fall into the trap, they push a body of men forward, skirmish with the troops, draw the Spanish forces upon them and then the Cuban army proper out flanks the Spaniards and pushes steadily onward towards Havana.

The admirers of the captain general

claim this is his plan of campaign, that he is allowing the Cubans to get by him and near and nearer to Havana, only for the purpose of eventually falling upon them in the rear and scattering them to all the points of the compass. This sounds plausible, but the insurgents are destroying all bridges, railways and plantations behind them. The route they have followed is marked by a blackened swath of smoking ruin and desolation, and the Spaniards will have a very difficult task to push on after their fleet footed enumies.

All the Spanish generals in the rear of the insurgent army have been instructed to hurry after the enemy with all possible speed. Here, however, comes in the weak-est feature of the campaign of the Spaninrds. Chairman Dingley Has Them Ready for Action by Congress.

THE DEBATE IS TO BE LIMITED.

Both Bills, It Is Expected, Will Have Passed the Lower House by Tomorrow Evening-Democratic Members of the Committee Vote Against Them.

WASHINGTON, Doc. 24.—The house ways and means committee devoted several hers of Christmus to a final consideration of the two recentre bills which were preof the bills were laid before the full committee, the plan being announced to the Democratic members for the first time, al-though they were familiar with the details, The offic were formally adopted as com-mittee measures, motions to be them on

the table being overraled by party votes.
Each bill was read by sentions and mo-tions were made by the Democrats to strike out each section, which, of course, falled to carry. It was voted to give today to the consideration of the tariff bill by the house and namerow to the bond bill, with a vote on each at the end of the day's debate upon it. The Democrats endeav-ored to secure three days' debate; to gain a postponement of two or three days in which to study the probable effects of the measures if emoted; also to have the bond bill debated before the tariff bill, but the Republicans adhered to their orig-

ind arrangements.

Mr. Dingley stated to the committee that the bills were not framed as a Republican measure, but as one calculated to save the credit of the government, which, according to the president's message and to personal communications made by Secretary Carliels to members, was endaggered. The condition of the treasury from their representations demanded immediate action, and the Republicans had prepared emergency bills on lines which seemed most expedient.

Mr. Dingley laid particular stress on the assertion that the first bill did not constiture, and was not intended for a revision of the tariff. Consequently there was no necessity for a long discussion of the bill. The Wilson net had been taken as the basis for the tariff bill. An estimate of the probable increase of revenue to be derived from the tariff bill had been made, based on importations under the Wilson act in 1894. This showed a probable increased revenue of \$40,000,000, which about equalled the deficit of the past year. It was estimated that \$12,000,000 would be derived from the increase on raw wool, \$11,000,000 from manufactured wools and \$14,000,000 from the 15 per cent, horizontal advance on other schedules,

The Republicans had waived their pro-tection principles for the time in prepar-ing these bills, Mr. Dingley said, "so they hoped that President Cleveland would walve any antagonistic views that he might hold and sign the bills."

One of the Democrats asked why the Republicans had not gone to the full ex-tent of the McKinley bill, to which Mr. Dingley replied that they would do so if they had the power.

The Democrats, on their part, contended that the effect of the bond scheme would be to retire the greenbacks by holding them in the treasury, and said the Republicans proposed to do indirectly just what the president had recommended and what they (the Republicans) denounced. The tariff bill, they claimed, was a strictly Re-publican measure, and a measure for which President Cleveland had not asked.

Mr. McMillin asserted that there was no need for additional revenue, as the treasury statement showed a each balance of

\$170,000,000 Mr. Dingley replied that \$70,000,000 of this was in greenbacks, which had not come in as revenue, but had been redeement by gold. The Republican plan would provide for the expenses of the gov-ernment without encroaching on the gold reserve or employing redeemed greenbacks.

"The revenue bill is not intended to be a tariff revision, but simply an exigency bill to raise about \$40,000,000 of revenue to meet the deficiency. The main object is revenue, although incidentally the increases will help American industries to some extent. The bill is limited to two and a half years, the expectation being that by that time the Republicans will be in full power and able to revise the tariff on their own lines.

The bond bill gives the secretary of the treasury authority to issue a 3 per cent. five year coin bond to maintain the redemption fund, in addition to the authority he now possesses, but provides that the proceeds of all bonds sold under this act and under the resumption act shall be used only for redemption purposes. It also provides that all bonds shall be first offered to the people of this country. The bill also anthorizes certificates of indebtedness bearing 3 per cent. Interest, and payable within three years, to be bound, to meet any temporary deficiency of revenue. The only object of the bund bill is to reduce the rate of interest and the time to run, as the bonds which the secretary is now authorized to issue bear 4 or 5 per Ent. in
