EXPLOSION AT THE ST. LOUIS FIRE.

It Results in Three Deaths and Serious In-Juries to Many Others -The Sad Fatality Which Befell a Columbus Family and There Lady Guests,

St. Louis, Jan. 3.—Three persons were killed, two fatally injured, four more are missing and thirty-one received injuries more or less serious as the result of an exmore or less serious as the result of an ex-plosion that occurred yesterday afternoon at 309 North Second street. The building, which is occupied by the Anchor Peanut sompany and H. B. Grubb, agent of Det-willer & Street, of Jersey City, N. J., was set on fire in some manner. The flames which started on the first floor, communi-cated to a countily of flamously on the cated to a quantity of fireworks on the second floor, owned by Grubb. These ex-ploshed with terrific force, throwing burn ing brands, bricks and dobris in every di-

Three alarms were sent in. The whole down town fire department re-sponded, and the work of rescuing the injured was performed in a courageous man-

ner by the police and firemen.

Emmet Kennedy, a boy, was taken from a third story window of Levison & Hiythe's establishment. Kennedy said there were two other men near the middle of the second floor. The firemen hurried to the spot and could hear the cries of the men, who were slowly burning to death. By this time a stream of water was turned on the fire surrounding the burning men, who were screaming pitcously for help. As soon as the flames were subdued a dozen firemen began tearing away the wreckage around the imprisoned mess—the picks, axes and saws. Albert a sew was taken out, and soon after the and cored.

Both of his legs were fastened by timbers and a heavy iron ring circled his neck, while the fire was cating into his flesh. He suffered the most horrible agony as the rescuers pulled away at the splintered timbers and twisted iron work. A physician was called, and he crawled into the wreck and admirishment to the content of more istered a hypodermic injection of mor-phine to the sufferer. When he was fin-ally rescued he was bleeding from a hun-dred wounds, was burned in many places and badly crushed.

After working at the debris for half an hour longer the firemen succeeded in finding two more bodies, lying side by side. They were horribly mangled and burned. They were identified as Albert Chemir and Paul Hauptner.

The firemen searched every foot of ground for the bodies of other missing men, but were unable to find any. The missing, it is thought, may have escaped and neglected to report their safety.

For three hours the city dispensary physicians were kept busy attending to the injured victims as they were brought in by the ambulances. Among these were Richard C. Cowles and his nephew, R. W Cowles, both compositors in the employ of the Frey Stationery company. The former was the most seriously injured, his face, head and hands being chopped almost to bits by the broken glass. His injuries are very painful, but not necessarily danger ous. His nephew's injuries consist of a out face and hands and a scalp wound.

John Coreoran and Ernest Gannon, two boys employed in the same building, were also badly cut about the face and hands. E. C. Whitteeck, foreman of a gang of men in the Excelsior Wire company, was buried under a mass of debris and did not regain consciousness until dragged out by a fireman. He sustained a fractured rib.

ening sight. Every inch of his body was burned, blackened and reasted almost to a His injuries will prove fatal. Michael Stack, a teamster, was knocked senseless by the explosion. A heavy timber fell across him, breaking his right leg and injuring him internally. Frank Hager, Fred Williams, employes of the Frey Stationery company, and H. L. Green, Fred Rovene, W. J. Werner were each treated for injuries caused by broken

The building in which the explosion oc curred is a complete wreck. The rear half was blown to atoms and the whole front of the four story building was blown out. The rear of the Excelsior Iron and Wire works and the rear of the Levison & Blythe Manufacturing company were en-tirely demolished. The property loss is astimated at \$100,000.
