POLICE PROTECTION.

How It is Said to be Procured for Cash in Philadelphia. PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 10.—The senate investigating committee yesterday touched the "Treaty" police district and brought to the surface charges of corruption against Special Officer Martin and Policeman Cope and Dixon.

In the city hall one day, the witness said, Charles Binder, a brother, approached Special Martin, in Slook's presence, and asked that if the case be squashed, Binder, the witness said, then gave Martin \$300, which was given to Cope and Dixon.

Binder, being placed on the stand, admitted giving Martin the latter amount, but said it was simply a loan. These same charges have been made public before and led to Martin's arrest. The case was called seven or eight times and was finally disposed of through the statute of limitations.

The remainder of the committee's session was devoted to individual cases of police abuse to citizens, and participation in politics. Samuel Neff and Robert Whitehead, ex-city employes, told how they were dismissed shortly after having supported anti-combine delegates to the state convention.

POLITICAL MOVEMENTS.

All The Candidates Will be Known Within the Next Week. But one week more remains for candidates for nomination on the Citizens ticket to file their names with the Standing Committee, therefore there can be little further delay in letting the voters of that party know who they can vote for at the primaries, which will be held two weeks from today.

The new shaft at the old Vadvorville colliery, owned by the P. & R. C. & I. Company, has reached a depth of over 300 feet and work is progressing very rapidly. It is the purpose of the Reading company to sink the shaft to the depth of 1,000 feet. When this colliery is re-opened it will be one of the finest in the region.

This constitutes the list of official candidates, but there are many more spoken of and, of course, many more to be added to the list. It is understood that Councilman T. J. James will be a candidate for re-election, and yesterday M. H. Keller announced to his friends that he would be a candidate for School Director in the Third ward. William T. Treasie has not announced himself officially as a candidate for re-election to the School Board in the Third, but it is believed he will do so within the next three or four days.

In the Fourth ward George Hares is spoken of as a candidate for Council on the Citizens ticket, and George Lorsch is also referred to in the same connection. In the Fifth the Citizens nomination for Council appears to be between Christ, Poliz and Henry Warnick. In the Second Councilman John P. Boehm will probably secure a re-nomination without effort.

James Emanuel and Edward Mason are out for High Constable on the Citizens ticket. The former expects to win favor through his record of the past two years in addition to the other claims he put before the people before, and Mr. Mason feels that he has an excellent show this year because there will not be as many candidates as last year.

John Matthews, of the Fourth ward, is making a very active canvass for the Democratic nomination for High Constable and is evidently building up excellent chances. He is an old and respected resident of the town and will make a strong candidate.
