TERRIBLE EXPERIENCE.

Seven Sailors Meet Death on a Rocky Bluff.

WRECK OF THE JEANNETTE COWAN.

The Big Four Masted English Ship Went Ashore on Vancouver Island, Known as the Honeyard of the Pacific—Survivors Rescued by the Tug Tye.

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 13.—Ten days of suffering from cold and privation on a rocky bluff, during which time seven of the crew, including the captain and mate, met their death, and the other mate and seven men with terrible accidents, tells the tale of the wrecking of the big four masted English ship *Jeannette Cowan* on Vancouver Island, otherwise known as the Bone Yard of the Pacific ocean. The news was brought to this city yesterday by the tug *Tye*, which had a few hours before landed fourteen members of the crew at Port Townsend.

The tug *Tye* sighted the wreck on Saturday afternoon. The sea was running pretty high at the time the tug hove to. A portion of the crew could be seen on top of a high bluff, on which a tent had been pitched. A sight met the gaze of the rescuers that will not be forgotten for years to come.

Seated about the fire were thirteen men, all wearing an expression of utter helplessness and misery. First mate Charles Legall, who was lashed to a boatwains chair, suffering from a fractured leg, told Mate Hall of the *Tye*, the story of the disaster. He said the *Cowan* came from Cape Town, South Africa, for Royal Roads, B. C., and was 108 days out when she reached Cape Flatery on Dec. 19. There was a terrible storm off the cape and the vessel stood off the cape two days before trying to come in. Then she was driven quickly to the northward by a strong southwest wind and sought shelter in the treacherous waters of Barclay sound to avoid being driven ashore on some more exposed point.

The sound afforded but little shelter, and she was driven on the rocks at high tide. This was 2 o'clock on the morning of Dec. 31, and a snow storm was coming on. The ship seemed to be breaking in two, and it was decided to leave her at once, and with the aid of a line made fast ashore the entire crew was taken off.

Captain Thompson died three days before the arrival of the *Tye*, and the cook and an able seaman and the man who ran the donkey engine died the following day, the latter becoming violently insane. The second mate and two apprentice boys met their death while trying to make land in a small boat the night the ship struck.

The survivors of the wrecked vessel are: Mate Legall and seaman Hunt, Moran, Smith, Olson, Kerr, Cox, Chamberlain, Chamberlins, Conin, Heals, Rosano, Carpenter and Wilson.

Shot in Defense of Her Honor.
BALTIMORE, Jan. 13.—Mrs. Mattie V. Angeller, wife of Frank Angeller, a cigar dealer and pool room proprietor, shot Charles H. Parker, 33 years old, agent for the Levitt Machine company, of Athol, Mass., in her husband's store at 1431 North Charles street. Parker was taken to the City hospital, where he died. Mrs. Angeller says she shot Parker in defense of her honor, he having attempted improper liberties with her. Mrs. Angeller and her husband were held by the coroner's jury on a charge of murder in the first degree. Testimony was adduced which tended to show that the husband had suspected his wife of improper conduct with Parker, and that he had said he would never believe in her innocence till Parker was dead.

Suicide by Inhaling Gas.
NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—A man and woman registered as John Malcolm and wife at the Kiberson hotel Saturday midnight, and were assigned to a room. Yesterday morning the woman left the place early. Nothing more was seen of the man until his dead body was found in the afternoon, when escaping gas attracted attention to the room. He was found lying dead on the bed, with a gas tube connecting with an unlighted burner in his mouth. The windows were shut and locked, and every possible crack in the window and door had been stuffed with cloth or paper. The police think that there is no doubt that the man committed suicide. The dead man's name is supposed to be John Meyer, formerly a traveling salesman for an out of town grocery house.

TERRIBLE WORK OF LYNCHERS

A White Man and His Negro Wife Crucified by a Mob.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 13.—Patrick Morris, a white railroad hand, and his colored wife met with a terrible fate Saturday night. They lived in a flat boat near the Westwego wharf of the Texas and Pacific, a few miles above the city, on the opposite side of the river.

On account of their difference in color, as well as the charge that they kept a disorderly place for negroes, there has been a growing sentiment against them. They were sitting up in their boat when a body of men came down and set fire to the hull. They sought refuge on shore, and as soon as they made their appearance they were riddled with bullets. The woman was killed outright, but the man fell crippled, and the two were burned to ashes with the boat.

The authorities of Jefferson parish, where the affair occurred, claim that they cannot discover the perpetrators, but the 11-year-old son of the victims, who escaped with his life and is now in charge of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, says that a business rivalry was at the bottom of the burning, his father having had trouble with a saloon keeper in the vicinity. He claims to have identified several of the crowd, all of whom were white men.

The citizens in the vicinity, however, say that the place was a nuisance and that the couple had been run away from several places. They think that the mob went there for the purpose of giving Morris a whipping, but that he showed fight and infuriated his oppressors to encompass his own doom.

NARROWLY ESCAPED CREMATION
Young Men Save a Girl by Forming a Human Ladder.

STURGEON RAY, Wis., Jan. 13.—Fire in the residence of Charles James Keogh, at an early hour yesterday morning, caused near sufficing in a terrible holocaust, and as it was four members of the family and the domestic were badly burned, and one severely cut with glass. Mrs. Keogh was killed, and the shock and burns she received. It is feared will cause her death. Mr. Keogh saved four children by heroic dashes through the flames.

Upstairs were two daughters. When awakened the downstairs part of the house was ablaze, but one of them rushed down and out of doors, receiving only slight injuries. The other feared to follow and broke the window to call for aid.

By this time the young men outside had formed a human ladder several high by standing on each other's shoulders, and were enabled to rescue the distracted girl, who was badly cut about the body in getting out, being held only in her night dress.

The Kentucky Senatorship.

FRANKFORT, Ky., Jan. 13.—Since the nomination of Senator Blackburn by the Democratic caucus and of Congressman Godfrey Hunter by the Republican caucus, there is a bitter political fight for election as senator. Blackburn and his friends are attending the burial of Representative Wilson. The law provides for balloting the second Tuesday after the assembling of the legislature. Blackburn's friends say they will be no joint balloting on Tuesday, Jan. 21, and filibustering will prevent it. The special election for Wilson's successor will be Jan. 29. The Blackburn men will have the new Democratic member here on the 21st. Without the two Populists, and with Wilson's place filled, there is a tie between the Republicans and the Democrats.

Proposed New Schools for Bridgeton.

BRIDGETON, N. J., Jan. 13.—The joint committee of the board of education and city council met to consider the matter of erecting new school buildings and decided to recommend to council tomorrow night the erection of a six roomed school house in the northern part of the first ward and a twelve roomed school house in the Third ward, the former to cost not over \$10,000 and the latter not over \$20,000. The committee will recommend that the city issue bonds to run twenty years to cover the entire cost.

The Belmonts at Newport.

NEWPORT, R. I., Jan. 13.—Mr. and Mrs. O. H. Belmont, the latter the divorced wife of W. K. Vanderbilt, who were married in New York on Saturday by Mayor Strong, are at Mr. Belmont's place, Belmont, where they will remain for a few days. The couple will sail for Europe on Jan. 29. They will meet the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough in Italy, and the brides, mother and daughter will go to all Egypt, where they will remain until March.

Cat Off His Toe and Died.

JERSEY CITY, Jan. 13.—Charles Helzmann, 29 years old, of Bergenline avenue and the Hackensack plank road, Union Hill, died from blood poisoning. Helzmann was troubled with a bad corn on the small toe of his left foot, and after trying various remedies he finally cut the toe off at the first joint. He did not consult a physician until the foot had swollen to twice its natural size, and too late to save his life.

Pennsylvania's Prohibition Convention.

LANCASTER, Pa., Jan. 13.—Professor H. D. Patton, of this city, chairman of the Prohibition state committee, has issued a call for the Prohibition state convention to meet in Philadelphia on May 9 for the purpose of nominating congressmen to the national convention.

Miss Nelson the Winner.

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—The ladies' international billiard race ended Saturday night. Frankie Nelson winning. Her score was 418 miles and 8 laps. She was closely followed by Helen Baldwin, who finished just five lengths behind the winner. The close was exciting in the extreme.

Peruvian Mutineers Suppressed.

LIMA, Peru, Jan. 13.—The enemies of the government and a number of generalists who had mutinied, created a disturbance at Moquegua. The outbreak was suppressed promptly. Troops have gone to the support of the officials of the place.
