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## CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR.

Already Preparing for the Great Convention in July.

MONSTER GATHERING EXPECTED.

It Is Believed That Fully Seventy-five Thousand Delegates Will be in Attendance, and There Will be Ample Accommodulions For All.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.-The fourth annual convention of the local Christian En-deavor union closed yetserslay afternoon with an overflowing mass meeting in Central hall. Enthusiasm has run high during the past few days, and Washing tonians look upon the event as but a foreeast of the international convention to be the district was represented at the sessions, and a very large number of the city's elergymen occupied platform seals.

The most enthusiassic meeting was the rally of the international convention comnoities in Central Hall. Every seat was occupied and scores of persons stood during the entire session. The meeting was addressed by President Clark and by John Willis Baer, general scoretary of the United Society of Christian Endeavor, both of whom came from Boston for the both of whom came from Boston for the express purpose of conferring with the of-ficers of the committee of '06 and of seeing and speaking to the rank and file of the

Secretary Baer talked on "The respon-sibility of the individual worker," and as his memory was fresh with the achieve-ment of the Boston committee in charge of the '95 convention his points and suggestions were exceedingly practical. He was followed by President Clark, whose subject was "Spiritual blessings to be ex-pected from the '96 convention."

Strong resolutions upon the Armenian question, the saloon and Sabbath observ-

ince were adopted. The vast committees, composed of 3,000 persons, have already begun work for the national convention. Their organization is complete, and very soon they will un-dertake the detail work of canvassing the city for accommodations and making the assignments of churches. The hall com-mittee has made contracts for the erection of three mammoth tents. A joint resolu-tion was recently introduced in the senate and shouse, the purport of which is to grant the society permission to use the large reservation in the rear of the execu-tive for the purposes of the convention, and here the tents will be pitched. The seating espacity of these tents will be 10,-000 each, and in addition to the tents arrangements will be made to conduct over-flow and simultaneous meetings in a dozen churches conveniently located. The music will be led by a chorus composed of 3,000 boys, which will include the entire mem-bership of the famous Moody choir.

Besides having a hotel headquarters such state will have a headquarters at one of the city churches. Pennsylvania, with a delegation of 7,000, has been assigned to the Calvary Baptist church, New York to the Church of the Covenant, Massachusetts to the First Congregational church and Indiana to the Vermont Avenue Christian church. The churches will be kept open during the entire convention, and here the delegates will receive their mail. The committee expect that, at the lowest calculation, 60,000 delegates will be registered at the July convention. Recent indications are that the number will be nearer 75,000.

THE KENTUCKY SENATORSHIP.

An Evident Disposition to Ignore the Agreement for Postponement. FRANKFORT, Ky., Jan. 20.—The city is filling up with the friends of Blackburn and Hunter. Although the leaders of both parties had agreed that there should be no balloting for senator till Feb. 4, or until after the successor of Wilson had qualified, yet the nominees of the enucuses seem to be so suspicious of each other that they are marshaling their forces here for balloting in both houses soparately to-morrow, and the friends of Hunter are claiming that he will be declared sleeted so Wednesday. Some Republican sena-tors insist they will join the Democrats in postponing the election till after Wilson's ssor arrives, as there was authority for the agreement.

Some of Hunter's most ardent supporters think the scheme to postpone the election of senator was a trick in the interest of Bradley or Yerkes, and that they should therefore not abide by it. In addition to the opposition from those who want to tread the triangle of the scheme of th stand by the compromise agreement, a Populist, Poor, has become estranged from Hunter, but he says he will never go to Blackburn, so that it does not seem possible for any election of senator to occur this week. The deadlock between Hunter, and Blackburn, with their fighting friends on the ground, is expected to make trouble. Both sides are very determined.

Professor Moore's Experiments.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—The weather bureau, under the direction of Professor Moore, is now engaged in experiments in the management of aeroplanes, or kites, that promise to be of high scientific value. It is the purpose of Professor Moore to de-vise a system of kites that can be relied upon to carry a considerable weight, six or eight pounds perhaps, two miles above the surface of the earth. The tail adopted for the purpose is of cellular construction. without the old fashioned tail, and has re-markable lifting power. It is intended to carry up to this great altitude various observation instruments, barometers, thermometers, hygrometers and other like in-struments which will automatically record the conditions of the atmosphere above.

Ricked to Death by His Own Horses. HAGERSTOWN, Md., Jan. 20,-Samuel Rauck, a prosperous farmer, living in Fulton county, Pa., just across the line north of Hancock, this county, was de-scending a hill near his home with a load of lumber, when the chain holding it on the wagon broke and the heavy oak lumber went forward on the horses and Mr. Rauck and crushed them to the ground. Mr. Rauck became fastened between strug-gling horses and the wagon wheel and was kicked to death. He was a union veteran, 60 years old, and leaves a large fam-

Charged with Murderous Assault. NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—Viscount R. Im-bert de Mirabillo and his wife, Jeanne, are under arrest on a charge of assaulting Raphael Spiridon, a dealer in antique Spiridon is suffering from concussion the brain, and his physician says he w not live. Viscount de Mirabillo is a member of an old French family. He was a partner with Spiridon in the importing of antiques, but a bitter feeling has existed between them for some time past. De Mirabillo does not deny the assault, but pleads self defense.

Unsuccessful Highwaymen. BLOOMSBURG, Pa., Jan. 20.—Two high-waymen attempted to hold up B. W. Drake, the Light Street carriage manu-facturer, about a mile north of here Sat-urday evening. Mr. Drake was walking his horse down a hill when the men jumped from the side of the road and attempted to catch the horse by the bridle. The animal, however, became frightened and started to run. The highwaymen then fired two shots after him, neither of which took effect.

Broker Chapman Convicted. WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 .- The jury in the trial of Elverton R. Chapman, the mem-ber of the New York brokerge firm of Moore & Schley, who refused to answer questions put by the senate sugar investigating committee, returned a verdict of guilty. The case undoubtedly will be appealed to the court of appeals of the District of Columbia and thence to the United States supreme court, whichever way the next highest tribunal decides.

Three Fatal Mine Accidents.

HAZLETON, Pa., Jan. 20.—Three fatal accidents occurred at the mines in this region on Saturday. Patrick Boyle, aged. 60, was killed by a fall of rock in a gaug-way at the Yorktown mines; John Bish-asterock, aged 10 years, fell into the breaker rollers at Eckley and his lower limbs were ground up; John Yanvis, while putting off a blast at Harwood, was shockingly in jured and cannot recover.

Chinese Merchant Murdered.

Augusta, Ga., Jan. 20.—Yack Seng, a peaceful, law abiding Chinese grocery merchant, who came to this city from Sar Francisco five years ago, was found dead on the floor of his store yesterday with his throat cut from ear to ear and his skull crushed. The theory is that the murder was for the purpose of robbery. Jim Cobb a negro, has been arrested for the crime.

Committed a Hundred Robberies.

Connellsville, Pa., Jan. 20.—Charles Smalley, a noted counterfeiter and housebreaker, was arrested here on Saturday Two years ago Smalley operated in this vicinity, committing upwards of 100 rob-beries. His capture was effected only after he had been shot through the arm by Officer Campbell
