DEATH BY EXPLOSION.

It Wrecks a Manufacturing Building at New Haven.

ONE VICTIM TORN TO PIECES.

The Other Two Were Burned to Death in the Fire Which Followed the Explosion. Four Others Seriously Injured—Workmen Rush for Their Lives.

NEW HAVEN, Jan. 22.—A tremendous explosion of gas occurred in the factory of Frank Pfeizer & Co., located in the building of English & Merrick, on Crown street. One man was instantly killed by the explosion, two others lost their lives in the floor fire which followed, the buildings and contents were totally destroyed, and a loss of \$100,000.

The dead are: Joseph C. Hausor, machinist, aged 38, body frightfully mangled; Thomas Toof, aged 40, body almost burned away; Harbana Stevens, aged 34, body horribly burned.

Injured: Frank P. Pfeizer, Sr., burned about face and arms; Alexis Krah, a foreman, burned and bruised; Frank C. Richter and James T. McNeil, seriously injured.

The explosion occurred within a second's warning, and was felt throughout the city. The cylinder of a gas regulator, containing a gaseous fluid with which an experiment was being made, blew out with a report similar to that of a ton pounder. The report tore through the ceiling in the apartment of Frank P. Pfeizer & Co., and burst through the roof. Joseph Hausor, a machinist, was attending the regulator, and was torn to atoms. His throat was cut, one leg was blown off, both arms and the remaining leg were broken, the face was battered to a pulp and the trunk was a mass of cuts and bruises.

At the time of the explosion there were in the building forty persons, including the factory hands and the office clerks. In the three corners located there. The building was a four-story brick structure. On the ground floor and second story were the works of English & Merrick, manufacturers of carriage hardware. On the third floor were the rooms of Edwin J. Toof & Co., makers of sewing machine attachments, and the fourth floor was occupied by F. P. Pfeizer & Co., machinists.

As soon as the report was heard the workmen rushed for their lives. In an instant the building was filled with smoke, steam and dust, and flames burst out with great violence, fanned by the draft of air admitted through the front of the building, which had been completely blown out. In a trice the flames communicated to the whole building, and at that time it was thought the loss of life must be appalling. No one could enter the building owing to the furnace like heat which was breaking plate glass windows in other buildings located in this business center.

The entire fire department, together with the reserves, was called to the scene, and it was three hours before the fire was under control. Meanwhile Hausor's body had been found on the first floor. As the firemen arrived upon the scene the crowd which had gathered was scattered by another explosion, not so violent as the first. When the building could be entered the search for dead bodies was begun. The roll was called and it was thought that all had been accounted for. A little later, however, the firemen made their way through a mass of debris and came upon two horribly burned bodies which were identified as those of Bookkeeper Stevens and Thomas Toof.

The loss will prove total to the owners of the building and the tenants. Although the loss will not reach a figure much in excess of \$100,000, there is insurance on the property amounting to \$133,000. It appears that in order to use acetylene in a building a special permit must be obtained. This had not been done in this case, and it is likely that some contest will be made against the claims for insurance.

Kentucky's Senatorial Contest.

FRANKFORT, Jan. 22.—The vote in the two houses of the legislature for senator yesterday, they voting separately, is summarized as follows: Hunter, Rep., 67; Blackburn, Dem., 57; Carlisle, Dem., 4; McCroarty, Dem., 3; Buckner, Dem., 1; Stone, Dem., 1; A. E. Willson, Rep., 1; C. E. Bate, Pop., 1. Hunter carried the full Republican vote except that of Stego, who voted for Willson. Populist Poor voted for Bate, but it counted for Hunter on the final vote. In the senate Blackburn received 18 votes against 15 for Hunter.

Plowed Under a Pullman Sleeper.

GEORGETOWN, Tex., Jan. 22.—A north bound International and Great Northern stock train, running on a special schedule, overtook the regular St. Louis passenger train, which was a few minutes late, just as it was leaving Hutto. The engine of the stock train ran its way under the rear Pullman and stopped, leaving the Pullman car, with two teams, who in the rear car next to the engine. Passengers escaped injury.

Chicago Gas Companies Will Fight.

CHICAGO, Jan. 22.—The four principal local gas companies, foiled in their recent plans of consolidation by the secretary of state in refusing to accept resolutions in favor of consolidation, passed at a meeting at which \$14,000,000 of the stock was represented, have agreed upon a definite plan of warfare for their claimed rights. The action of the secretary of state will give the opportunity to squarely test the question of the right of the gas companies to consolidate.

The Alabama Conflict.

MONTGOMERY, Jan. 22.—At the meeting of the Democratic state executive committee here John E. Knox, a staunch supporter of Joseph E. Johnston, the free silver candidate for governor, was elected chairman, and all vacancies were filled with Johnston's supporters. April 21 was selected for the date of the state convention, which is to be held here.

Utah's First Senators.

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 22.—For United States senator the entire Republican vote in both branches of the legislature was cast yesterday for Frank J. Cannon and Arthur Brown, the caucus nominees, excepting one vote for Fennell and one for Goodwin. The Democrats voted for Thatcher and Rawlins.

Citizenship for Utahanders.

BERLIN, Jan. 22.—The semi-official newspapers publish a Pretoria dispatch which says that President Kruger has granted citizenship to the Utahanders who supported him in the recent crisis. There are very few Englishmen among them.

CHIBBERING CHAMBERLAIN

England's Colonial Secretary on the Venezuelan Question.

THE LOYALTY OF THE COLONIES.

In It Lies the Main Strength of the Home Government—A London Newspaper Bitterly Assails Our Commission—The House Will Shelve the Davis Resolution.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—A banquet was given last night at the Hotel Metropole in honor of Baron Lambert, who is about to assume the governorship of Queensland, Australia. Joseph Chamberlain, secretary of state for the colonies, in toasting Lord Lambert, complimented the colonies upon their loyalty.

He proclaimed, he said, to say nothing upon the Transvaal question, pending the judicial inquiry which was to be made, and he felt confident, he said, that the country would wait to hear both the indictment and the defense before pronouncing judgment.

In regard to the recent references to the isolation of the British empire, he said that long standing differences appeared to have suddenly assumed threatening proportions "from quarters from which we might have expected friendship and consideration." The secretary then continued: "We were confronted with suspicion, and even with hate, and we had to recognize that our success itself, however legitimate, was impeded to us as a crime; our love of peace was regarded as a sign of weakness, and our indifference to foreign criticism was construed into an invitation to insult us. The prospect of our discomfiture was regarded with hardly disguised satisfaction by our competitors, who must be forced to admit that we alone hold our possessions throughout the world in trust for them all, and admit them to our markets as freely as our own selves."

"While regretting the existence of such a feeling, we rejoice that it has found expression. No better service was ever done to this nation. We were enabled to show our united determination to maintain our rights three weeks ago. In the words of Mr. Foster, of the Dominion parliament, the great mother of the empire stood splendidly isolated." How stands she today? She stands secure in the strength of her own resources. From Australia, from Canada, come expressions of patriotic enthusiasm as the natural response to the outbreak of the national spirit at home, and a proof that British hearts beat in unison throughout the world. Let us to the utmost cultivate this sentiment. This is the lesson to be derived from recent events.

"Lord Lambert goes to an infant colony destined to become a giant. Queensland has an area—shall I say three greater than Germany? Yet this great colony is only one of seven, all equally important." The speech was loudly cheered, and the proceedings closed by the guests singing "Rule Britannia," and with reference to Mr. Chamberlain, "He's a Jolly Good Fellow."

Right Hon. C. J. Goschen, first lord of the admiralty, addressing the Conservatives at East Grinstead last night, declared that no menace to any country was intended by the formation of the flying squadron. "It will be ready," he continued, "for any emergency, and will remain under the orders of the admiralty rather than of the foreign office. I beg the public, if they hear that the squadron has been sent to any particular quarter, not to imagine that the motive is necessarily a menace against our neighbors or our rivals."

WILL SHELVE DAVIS' RESOLUTION.

House Foreign Affairs Committee Consider It Advised.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—The prediction is freely made by members of the house committee on foreign affairs that if the proposed reaffirmation of the Monroe doctrine introduced by Senator Davis is adopted by the senate and sent over to the house for action it will be allowed to rest quietly in the committee files. A canvass of more than a majority of both Republican and Democratic members of the committee failed to discover any member who indorses it.

Courtesy to their colleagues of the senate impels the members of the committee in the other house to refrain from putting themselves on record in interviews as opposed to the resolution, but in conversation they do not hesitate to criticize the verbiage of it, and to deprecate the policy which brings it forward at this particular time. One of the foremost authorities on diplomatic matters in the house said that he deemed it very poor diplomacy to take any step tending to increase the tension between this government and Great Britain in what practically amounts to a crisis. The committee members think it will be better policy to side track the resolution without any demonstration of disapproval than to make an adverse report upon it to the house. They say that it will be impolitic to evoke any appearance of discord in congress upon a question of foreign policy, and that if the concurrence of the house is not to be secured for the resolution, and they believe that it will not be, the friction over it should be minimized.

A BELLIGERENT BRITISHER.

The London Globe Assails Our Commissioners' Invitation to England.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—The Globe publishes a severe article on the invitation of the United States Venezuelan commission to the governments of Great Britain and Venezuela to submit to the commission all of the evidence in their position which is likely to further the work of the investigation and also inviting these two governments to be represented before it by attorneys, without prejudice to either's claims, and says: "Great Britain will never allow this monstrous claim to determine the territory of a British colony within its jurisdiction. No power could admit it except at the close of a long and disastrous war. Were such a demand made by any other power our only reply would be to hand its ambassador his passports and mobilize the fleets. Will these portentous commissioners undertake to answer for the effect upon their own countrymen of forcing the premier to snub the American secretary of state?"

The Daily News says: "Justice Brewer has displayed genuine statesmanship and has furnished Lord Salisbury an opportunity which ought not to be lost. Lord Salisbury would show wisdom and dignity by complying with the request so tendered."
