THE ST. PAUL AGAIN AFLOAT.

The Big Steamer Uninjured by Her Accident on the Jersey Coast.

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—Just before 10 o'clock yesterday forenoon, when the tide was only about half high, the American liner St. Paul, which had been stuck fast in the sand off Long Branch for ten days, was pulled off the shoal and slid into deep water without injury. The wind was blowing with considerable force, the sea was good, and the position of the St. Paul was such that she was able to aid herself considerably by her propellers. The vessel reached her pier in this city at 1.30 p. m.

A. C. Griscom, Jr., vice president of the American Navigation company, said today: "The ship, so far as we know, has not sustained the slightest injury. We will have our own men inspect the ship externally and internally, and, in addition to that, she will be examined by the proper authorities."

The officials of the company are authorized for saying that the St. Paul will probably sail for Southampton in about two weeks, as advertised. They also state that a complete and thorough investigation will be instituted at once regarding the accident.

Shipping men are already at work fixing up a general average list of the losses sustained by the St. Paul. All agree that the salvage that will have to be paid will be the largest ever collected from any one vessel since the business of building ships was begun. The lowest estimate places this amount at \$100,000. The loss will fall on the underwriters, as the American line does not insure its own vessels. If mismanagement could be proved against the officers of the company, however, suit may be brought and the total loss collected from the steamship company.

Fought Fifteen Rounds to a Draw.
BOSTON, Feb. 5.—The largest crowd in the history of boxing exhibitions in Boston gathered in Music Hall last night to witness the bouts arranged by the Prescott Athletic club.

The most important bout was that between Leslie Pearce, of Philadelphia, and Stanton Abbott, the English lightweight. The men were matched for fifteen rounds, and, according to agreement, as both men were on their feet at the end of the fifteenth round, it was declared a draw. It was a very scientific contest.

HITCH ABOUT SEWERAGE.

Some of the Interested Parties Object to the Expense.

A hitch has occurred in connection with the system of sewerage recently adopted in the First ward by joint agreement between the P. & R. R. Co., the Borough Council, School Board and certain private property owners.

The agreement was brought about through a complaint made against a nuisance caused by a stench from an open sewer that was owned by the railroad company.

Upon formal complaint from the Borough Council and Board of Health the railroad company made a proposition by which it permanently abated and the borough and School Board properties, as well as several private properties, could be permanently benefited. It proposed to put in a first-class covered sewer and assume all responsibility for keeping it clear and in repair, if the Borough, School Board and the property owners would assume one-third the cost. The company assumed two-thirds of the costs.

It appears, however, that the cost of the undertaking has been more than the company at first figured, and the individual property owners now object to paying the pro rata share of expense charged against them.

The entire cost of the sewerage was about \$600. The sewer is certainly very substantial. It is 200 feet long, 2 feet wide and 3 feet high inside. The bottom is paved, the sides are of stone and the top is made of substantial flagstones. In the construction 200 barrels of cement and 50 car loads of stone were used. The properties are connected with the north end of the sewer by pipes. The Borough is asked to pay \$60, the School Board \$65 and the eight or nine private property owners \$10 each towards the expense. The latter claim they can run a line at a much less cost for their own use.

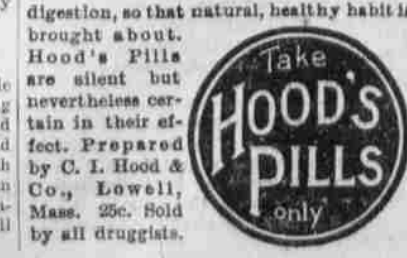

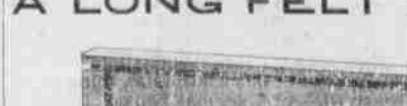
