### The Lyon-Dunn Contest.

The court to try the Lyon-Dunn contest convened at Pottsville yesterday afternoon. Counsel for the Dunn side submitted the following in support of their motion to quash: "First, That the petition to contest was not read by any of the signers, nor to any of them, nor was its contents made known to said petitioners; that the same facts exist as to the affiants to said petition; that many of the signers to the petition swore that they did not intend to open a contest such as the petition sets forth; that the signers to the petition signed it simply as an accommodation to Judge Lyon, and at his request. Second, Because the petitioners have sworn that they know of no illegal voting, no irregular votes, no fraud, and no false returns. Third, Because a large majority of affiants to said petition have admitted under oath that they did not know the contents of said petition, and had no knowledge either directly or indirectly of the correctness of its contents, and as to the remaining signers they were duly subpoenaed, but failed to appear." The motion was argued by both sides, and a decision will be rendered when the court again convenes on March 29th.

### For a New Survey of the Chesapeake.

Richmond, Va., Feb. 8.—The house committee on the Chesapeake and its tributaries yesterday afternoon, with only one dissenting vote, reported favorably the Hland oyster bill. It provides for what is practically a new survey and describes the method by which it shall be made.

### For Good School Government.

EDITOR EVENING HERALD.—Allow me space in the columns of your paper to show how the School Directors of West Mahanoy township arrange their political advantage to their personal convenience. When regulating the salaries of teachers one will say to another, "Are you going to raise your son's salary?" and the other will answer, "I guess I will," and then plank goes another \$10 on the son's salary, without any motion, or approval of the other Directors. It is all right, so long as certain Directors do it, and these people are those who always boldly proclaim that they do not run for office for glory. I do not know of a place in Pennsylvania where a School Director derives a maintenance from the office, except in West Mahanoy township. When proposals are being received for supplying the schools with fuel some of them will manipulate matters so that friends will have his bid in for \$635, but at the end of the year he receives \$700. The citizens have time and again petitioned the Board for night schools, so that the boys who work in the breaker by day may have an opportunity to attend school at night, but our economical and "Bob" Pattison-like School Board pleads lack of funds. It does not exercise much economy when it gives a man \$150 annually, besides his salary of \$60 a month. The amount of this extra money the teacher retains has frequently been a matter of public speculation. Another public feature is the crusade for docking teachers for losing time and failing to provide substitutes, but the Institute order, of \$10, which goes into the campaign fund, is marked full time, even if there is only one hour on it. The question now before the people is this: Will they encourage School Directors in underhand work and the squandering of revenue of the township by re-electing them to office? No citizen who cares for the welfare of the township can do so with the facts given staring him in the face. The candidates on the Citizens ticket are men who understand something about the efficiency of the school room, who have received an education and, if elected, will see that the interests of the taxpayers are protected. They deserve the support of every honest and intelligent citizen who desires to see the revenue of the township used legitimately for the maintenance of the schools. P. D. Lost Creek, Feb'y 8, 1896.

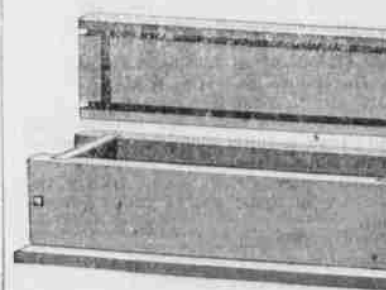

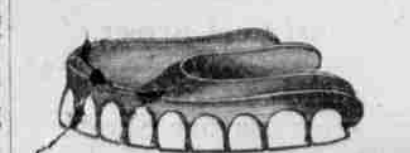
