Belgian Postoffice Thief Captured.
NEW YORK, Feb. 11.—Among the second cabin passengers on the steamship La Gasconne, which arrived yesterday, a deputy United States marshal identified a man registered as Leon Isaac as Henry Augustine, wanted for robbing the postoffice at Paleosul, Luxembourg, Belgium, where he was an official. The prisoner was committed to the Ludlow street jail to await the arrival of requisition papers. Augustine admits that on Jan. 30 last he forged government papers and embezzled money to the amount of 10,000 francs. Augustine had 6,400 francs in his possession, having lost 1,200 francs at gambling on the voyage.

The St. Paul Sent to Norfolk.
NEW YORK, Feb. 11.—The International Navigation company's steamship St. Paul has been sent to Newport News to be placed in dry dock. This course was adopted upon the recommendation of the assistant inspectors of steam vessels, who have been examining the big steamer to ascertain the results of her experience on the sands of Long Branch. The inspectors express the opinion that the St. Paul's hull is uninjured except some slight damage to her bottom plating. She is not strained or weakened.

Aroused from Her Trance.
ROCHESTER, N. Y., Feb. 11.—A special from Marango, Wayne county, says: Miss Hattie Benedet, the young lady who four months ago fell into a comatose state, from which she has only revived three times, is now on the road to recovery. The last trance came upon the girl without warning Jan. 12, from which she awakened last Saturday. The trance has left Miss Benedet in a very weak state, and she is scarcely able to speak.

President Kruger Wants an Understanding.
PIETRIKA, Feb. 11.—President Kruger has notified Sir Hercules Robinson, governor of Cape Colony, that he is willing to visit England, according to the suggestion of Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, the secretary of state for the colonies, provided the subjects of the proposed conference between himself and Mr. Chamberlain are definitely specified beforehand.

NEW COUNCIL INSTITUTED.

Institution, Installation and Presentations by J. D. U. A. M. Members Last Night. Shenandoah Valley Council No. 530, Junior Order of United American Mechanics, was installed in Egan's hall last evening by Deputy State Councilor W. H. Dettrey, assisted by State Councilor C. B. Johnson, of Wilkes-Barre. The installation took place in the room of Major Jennings Council No. 307 and immediately after the adjournment of the latter's regular meeting. The hall was crowded. There were in attendance delegations from the Mahanoy City, Girardville, Ashland, Frankville and Mt. Carmel Councils. Mountaineer Council's delegation from Mahanoy City was attended by its drum corps. The delegations from that town chartered a car on the Lakeside Electric Railway for the trip. W. E. Thompson, of Baltimore, Md., was also in attendance. Mr. Thompson is conductor of the State Council of Maryland. After the institution of the new Council the following officers were installed: Jr. Post Councilor, Colfax Brown; Councilor, Felix L. Klock; Vice Councilor, Frank M. Webster; Recording Secretary, George Hess; Assistant Recording Secretary, Brooks Knolly; Conductor, W. G. Major; Warden, Grant Troutman; Inside Guard, J. J. Miller; Outer Guard, David Hopkins; Financial Secretary, Edward Spear; Treasurer, David Harbin; Trustees, Colfax Brown, Edward Brown and Grant Troutman; Chaplain, John Hopkins.

The installation was followed by a half hour address by State Councilor C. B. Johnson on the objects of the Jr. O. U. A. M., in which he stated that six new Councils of the Order have been instituted in Schuylkill county during the past six weeks. C. T. Straughn, in behalf of Barbara Fretchle Council No. 84, Daughters of Liberty, presented the new Council with a silk flag and ballot box; and National Representative Thomas Sanger, of Ashland, in behalf of Major Jennings Council, presented a bible. The gifts were very graciously received by Councilor Klock and Jr. Post Councilor Brown. Vocal and instrumental music, address, etc. followed until it was time for the visiting delegations to start for their homes.

The new Council starts out with a charter membership of 51 and 7 propositions were received after the institution. The regular meetings will begin next Thursday evening, in Mellet's hall.

Girardville's Water Supply.
The question of water has agitated the people of Girardville for some time, and now it has reached the courts for settlement. Yesterday afternoon Messrs. Albert Arnold, Michael Horn, William Clark and Charles Davis applied for a bill in equity to restrain the Town Council from purchasing the Oak Grove Water Company for \$7,000 and to erect dams and pumping station, etc., at a cost not less than \$40,000, that the increased indebtedness without first having the consent of the electors, which has not been done, is contrary to law; that the petitioners pray for equitable relief to restrain the purchase of the water company. The court fixed Monday, the 24th inst., for argument on the rule.

Advance of Our Public Library.
In his annual report to the State Department of the Public Schools, Superintendent Whitaker has written as follows concerning the public library of this town: "Our library has grown so much in size, popularity and usefulness that it has become necessary to give special attention to it yearly. This annual work has just been completed, at a cost of about \$300. We have had 130 old books rebound, 92 replaced, and have added 235 new volumes. This places the library in excellent condition and makes our collection fresh and up to date. We have now 3500 volumes of carefully selected literature at the disposal of our schools and the general public for use free of cost. The circulation is very large, there having been over 5000 issues of books during the last five months. A large share of this patronage comes from the pupils of our schools. Thus, besides being valuable and beneficial to the general public, the library is an important and valuable auxiliary to our schools. We have through it awakened such an appetite for good literature that it taxes our resources to keep up with the demand. The accomplishment of all this, previously to the Public Library Act, reflects much credit upon the School Board and the citizens, who, during many years of care and patience, and from a very small beginning, have worked faithfully and earnestly, until at last success has crowned their efforts. We are proud of our possession, and proud of the good that is being done thereby."
