**Shoving the Queer.**

Yesterday afternoon a Hungarian walked into the post office and asked Postmaster Mellet to change a ten dollar bill for him. Mr. Mellet took and scanned the bill proffered and, in a deliberate and severe tone, with a sharp look over his spectacles at the man, demanded, "What do you mean by trying to pass upon the government a \$10 Confederate bill?" Such was its character. The Hungarian stammered something in broken English about not knowing that the bill was no good and hurried out of the office as quick as his legs could carry him. Mr. Mellet retained the bill, and still has it. Two or three friends of the man have since called upon the postmaster and assured him that the character of the bill was not known when it was offered. Their solicitation in the case was due to a fear that steps might be taken towards a prosecution. While in this case the one who proffered the bill may have been perfectly innocent and probably a victim of some imposition, it is nevertheless a fact that many people in the foreign classes, and some of them by no means of no importance, are inclined to "plunge" in irregular tenders and some who get their hands on a stock of such tenders find a market for them. One very prominent foreigner had the audacity to boldly ask one of our leading citizens not long ago where he could buy some "counterfeit" money. Of course, the designing class depend upon the plea of ignorance of the customs and language of the country, but some day one of them will get in such a position he will learn that ignorance of the law is not a plea that will pass fire. It is at the same time no doubt very true that much of the Confederate money in the hands of the foreign classes in town (and there is considerable) has been obtained through bona fide ignorance.

**A NEW SCHOOL BUILDING.**

Committee of the School Board Recommend the Erection of One.

The Building and Repair and Finance Committees of the School Board held a joint session last night to consider the question as to whether another school building should be erected. Superintendent Whitaker was present and made a very exhaustive report and address upon the present condition of the schools as bearing upon the capacity and attendance and the outlook for the future. He showed that by careful computation the increased attendance under the compulsory education law will be from 600 to 700. As the schools are now crowded more room will certainly be required during the ensuing year. Several members also spoke and it was eventually resolved that a report be submitted to the School Board recommending that a building be erected on the White street property recently purchased from Charles E. Titman. No recommendation was decided upon as to the size or design of the building, nor as to the cost.

In talking upon the subject to-day with a HERALD reporter, Mr. T. R. Edwards, who is a member of both committees, said: "I think it is absolutely essential that our School Board should erect another school building which will accommodate at least 300 children. The Compulsory Education bill, which should be enforced for the good of the child, as well as the nation, will certainly increase our attendance and at present we are crowded and paying rent for one building. There is not another town in the county which has such a foreign population as we have, and many of them cling to their own customs and cannot speak the English language. I do not think the problem of educating these children has been fully solved. The Poles and Lithuanians are becoming an important factor in our schools. In fact, nearly one-fifth are of the Slavonic race, and a large majority are bright and intelligent, but many come to school unable to speak one word of English. At present they are crowded into a room with 50 or 60 others, and it is utterly impossible for a teacher to give them the time and attention which they should have; consequently they are in the lower grades too long and hinder the progress of other pupils."

"Such children," continued Mr. Edwards, "irrespective of creed, caste or color, should have all the advantages our public school system affords; and if it becomes necessary to erect a building to accommodate them, or employ teachers who have mastered the foreign languages, I will certainly give it my earnest support."

Mr. Edwards seemed to warm up on the subject as he asked: "Why not give such children who may never have the privilege of entering a High school a teacher who can understand their native language, and thus assist them, as well as give the children of more fortunate circumstances a teacher thoroughly conversant in Latin? Who would think of asking our High school pupils to learn Latin without a teacher? And yet we have, so far, asked many children to learn the English language without knowing how to do it, and without more school buildings and teachers it could not be otherwise. The hope of our town, state and country depends upon the education of the young of to-day and it is practicable to mould and make good citizens out of this foreign population. Shenandoah can and should be willing to do her part, and I think the people will do it."
