NEW JERSEY LEGISLATURE.

A Bill Providing for Patriotic Exercises in Public Schools.

THEXTON, Feb. 27.—The house yester day passed Assemblyman Stanger's bill amending the stone road law, giving boards of fresholders discretionary power in disposing of petitions for building stons roads. The house also passed a bill pro-viding for patriotle exercises in the public schools on the days preceding Lincoln's birthday, Washington's birthday, Memo-rial Day, Fourth of July and Thanks-

giving.

Assemblyman Bullock's three cent fare bill again came up on second reading. Mr. Roll offered an amendment exempting companies paying less than 5 per cent dividends. The amendment was besten and then amendment and bill were both laid on the table.

The house bill making it a misdemeaner to sell bogus "sterling" silver was passed. The Newark armory bill was passed by a vote of 35 to 12.

The senate passed a number of bills among them one prohibiting the holding of elections in barrooms, and one approving the merger of the Pennsylvania and New Jersey millead in New Jersey with the same company in Pennsylvania.

Belgian Postal Thief Sent Back. New York, Feb. 27.—The extradition papers for Henry Augustin, alias Leon Istace, who robbed the Postoffice Savingbank at Palesuel, Belgium, of 10,000 france on Jan. 30 last, having arrived from Washington, the prisoner was sent back to that country yesterday on the steamship Southworth. Augustin was arrested on the La Gascogne when it arrived here a fortnight ago. He had in his possession 6,450 francs, and said he had gambled away 1,200 francs while on the trip across from Havre.

Accident to Ex-Senator Platt.

New York, Feb. 27.—Thomas C. Platt slipped on the sidewalk near the Twenty-third street entrance to the Fifth Avenue third street entrance to the Fifth Avenue hotel last night, and fell heavily, injuring his hip and thigh. A physician was sum-moned after Mr. Platt had been assisted to his room. An examination revealed that no bones had been broken, but that the ex-semator had suffered a severe nerv-ous shock. His remains will be taken to Urbana for interment.

Dietzel was once in prosperous circumstances. but of late years has been dependent upon his children for support, and their frequent taunts on his condition, it is said, was the cause of the crime.

A Remarkable Shell,

Washington, Feb. 27.—Surprising re-sults were obtained at a test of shells at the Indian Head proving ground on Tues-day, and if these shall be confirmed by further experiments our navy, which al-ready possesses the best armor plate in the world, will have by far the best armor penetrating shells, and both of American invention.
