WORKINGMEN FOR PEACE

Labor Leaders Oppose Proposed . Warlike Preparations.

NO NEED FOR COAST DEFENSES.

Henry George Declares He Would "Rather See Every Locomotive Thrown from the Rails Than to See Order Preserved by the Bayonets of a Standing Army,"

NEW YORK, Feb. 29.-Members of the Central Labor union, sympathizers of or-ganized labor and others filled the large ball of Cooper Union last night to protest against the proposed expenditure of \$100,000,000 for coast defense, as well as more

millions for an increased navy.

Jerome O'Neill, secretary of the Central Labor union, acted as chairman. He made a brief spech explaining the object of the meeting. The first speaker was then in-troduced in the person of Charles W. Hoadly, secretary of the Building Trade association. Mr. Hoadly declared that nobsdy wanted war, except perhaps the inventor of a new rifle, a smokeless pow-der or the maker of the bunting used on land and see. The courson resole did land and sea. The common people did not want war, and as the United States had never provoked war he maintained that we were not open to attack from

other nations.

John McLuckie, of Homestead, Pa., who was connected prominently with the strike at the Carnegle works, followed Mr. Hoadly and spoke of the armor plates manufactured for the navy. He said that beit line armor plate "X8," now located on the Monterey, had one hole in it as large as the face of an ordinary eight day clock and which was filled with forty plugs. Herman Helzel, of Philadelphia, said that he ways of the county o

that he came from the city of Brotherly Love and poor wages. He begged all men in his hearing never to join a military or-ganization and to stand together, of each other and for each other.

Ernest Howard Crosby said he wished to congratulate the Central Labor union to congratulate the Central Labor union on having inaugurated a struggle against militarism. An appropriation of \$88,000,000 for coast defenses, he said, meant war, whatever some people might say to the centrary. He asked why American workingmen should be against English workingmen should be against English workingmen, for instance. If the wage earners here and in other countries would only say the word, he said, there would be no more war. We need protection in the country from the faults, vices and imperfections of our social system rather than fections of our social system rather than const defenses, he said. Mr. Crosby asked if, after a hundred years without coast defenses, any nation would now begin to attack the United States.

Henry B. Salisbury was the next speaker. He said that Benjamin Harrison, lectur-ing upon law, had given the best defini-tion extant of capitalist legislation when he said that the object of law was to make the rich secure and the poor content. An appropriation of \$88,000,000 for coast de fense, he said, was to make the rich se cure, and when the poor looked down the muzzles of the guns they would have to be content.

The secretary then read a set of resolutions denouncing the proposed appropria-tion, which were adopted with but few dissenting voices.

Henry George, who followed, asked that those in favor of the resolution and those opposed should rise in turn. Those opposed amounted to hardly more than two dozen, and Mr. George, after saying that he respected the antis for the courage of their convictions, said that he had no their convictions, said that he had no doubt that the proportion shown in the hall very fairly represented the great body of the working people of the country. Although denying that he was a socialist, Mr. George said that in one respect he could always be counted with the socialists, and that was in his opposition to war. President Cleveland's message on the Venezuela difficulty he characterized as "insane." The proposed appropriation

as "insane." The proposed appropriation, he said, he considered to be a carefully laid plan to build up a standing army which will crush labor whonever it dares to raise its head.

"As a citizen of the United States, and from thought, study tion," he said, "I would rather see every locomotive thrown from the rails, every car broken, every rall torn up, than to see order preserved by the bayonets of a standing army. Order is Heaven's first law, but there is one thing I prize before order, and

that is liberty."
Among the resolutions adopted by the

"Resolved, That the American republic is great enough and strong enough to set to the world an example of a nation that fears no foreign fee, and that refuses to join in the monstrous armaments that are bolstering up the thrones and crushing down the masses of Europe; that her true glory and real safety lie in securing the right to gain an honest and ample living to every willing worker, and that threats of war and preparations for war—means that the classes have always used to dis-truct the masses from the demand for sochaireform and to induce them to aid in their own enslavement—are prompted by the fear of justice on the part of holders of ill gotten wealth, and should be re-sisted by every friend of the rights of labor and of American institutions.

"Resolved, That the times call for the

organization of a political party that will demand the abolition of an aristocratically organized standing army and mavy, and of the means that have been insidiously taken to put under control of a cen-tralized government the militia of the states, and that shall devote itself to the crushing of monopoles that are rapidly bringing or as all the social evils of the old world that our fathers thought they


