

Fatal Tenement Fire in Utica. Utica, N. Y., March 4.—The Genesee flats, the largest apartment building in Utica, seven stories high, burned yesterday. Some 250 people lived in the building, which was a mass shell of brick, but well fitted with fire escapes. Mrs. Hughes, while descending the fire escapes between the third and fourth stories, fell to the ground and died soon after. It is feared that Mrs. John B. Wood, her 17-year-old daughter Mary and Noble Hopkins are buried in the ruins. The property loss is \$200,000.

Nebrians Not in Need of Relief. OMAHA, March 4.—Frequent reports are received from the eastern and middle states that persons are solidifying aid for Nebraska sufferers and making deplorable statements about existing want and destitution. These representations are untrue, and the collectors are, almost without exception, impostors, and are acting without proper authority. The secretary of the state board of agriculture has made exhaustive inquiries throughout the state, and ascertained that no relief is needed.

Murphy Wins at Pigeon Shooting. BABYLON, L. I., March 4.—Edgar G. Murphy, of the Larchmont Yacht club, defeated George Work, of the Carteret Gun club, yesterday in the big pigeon shooting match on the grounds of the Westminster Kennel club. The conditions of the match were 200 birds each, thirty yards rise and fifty yards head. Murphy killed 132 and Work 150. The match was for \$1,000 a side and a silver trophy.

Ford Gets Off with a Fine. TRENTON, March 4.—Bernard J. Ford, the former state house superintendent who pleaded non vult to several indictments against him, as a result of the senate investigation, was sentenced yesterday by Judge Woodruff in the Mercer county court to a fine of \$1,000. Ford had previously paid in the state treasury about \$1,000, the amount he estimates the state lost through his transactions.

A New Ocean Cable. PARIS, March 4.—The chamber of deputies yesterday adopted the project for a new submarine telegraph line between France, the United States and the Antilles.

ATTACKED BY A BURGLAR. Mrs. William Herman Has a Thrilling Early Morning Experience. Special to Evening Herald. DELANO, March 4.—Mrs. Lizzie Herman, wife of William Herman, one of the firemen on the Lehigh Valley railroad, was brutally attacked by a burglar at her home here early this morning. It is Mr. Herman's custom to leave his home shortly after 4 o'clock in the morning, and after making a trip to Shenandoah returns to his home shortly after 7 o'clock to get his breakfast. This morning he left the house as usual, leaving Mrs. Herman alone. Shortly after Mrs. Herman heard a rap on the door, which she promptly opened, supposing that her husband had returned for something he had forgotten. As the door opened a masked man grabbed Mrs. Herman by the throat and savagely beat and kicked her. The woman fainted and can give no account of what transpired after the first attack.

When Mr. Herman returned for his breakfast he found his wife lying on the floor suffering from a convulsion. He summoned the neighbors and medical attendance and Mrs. Herman's condition was pronounced serious, but not dangerous. She has bruises on her forehead and lower limbs. The burglar only secured some change that was in a pocketbook kept on the sideboard. He escaped without being identified. Mrs. Herman was formerly Miss Lizzie Powell, of Shenandoah.
