

# WEYLER PROCLAIMS.

Cuba's Captain General Kept Busy Writing Orders.

FIFTEEN DAYS TO SURRENDER.

The "Little Rebel Bands" Will be Permitted to Lay Down Their Arms If So Inetined-Meantime Alteged Spanish Victorics Are Reported.

HAVANA, March 0.—Captain General Weyler has issued the following circulars:
"I have promulgated an order that the toschers of divinity of the provinces of Matanzas, Santa Clara, Puerto Principe and Santlago de Cuba who have taken part in the movements of the rebels shall be pardoned on making their submission, according to the part of the p surrendering their arms and placing them-selves under the surveillance of the lawful authority, provided they have not com-mitted other crimes since the Issuance of

my last proclamation, "The teachers of divinity who, without arms, shall come in under the same cir-cumstances, will be immediately trans-ferred to the encampments, forts, towns and in general where they may be under the immediate vigilance of the troops, and all the teachers shall be under the control of the commandants in whatever jurisdic-tion they may be assigned. They will be-come permanently attached to the mill-tary forces, and will give their attentions to the dying, and will be entitled to such rations as treops in the field or travellag.

"These directions will not go into effect in the provinces of Pinar del Rio and Ha-

vana until these provinces have extended to them the prevailing law in the case of those who deliver themselves up to the

Another proclamation by General Wey-

ler is as follows:
"I make known to our harrassed troops and to those who attempt to demoralize them as they pursue eastward the rebel arties more numerous than those whom they leave in the provinces of Pinar del Rio and Hayana, that the time has arrived to pursue with the greatest activity and rigor the little bands, more of outlaws than insurgents, who have remained in the said provinces, and to adopt whatever measures are necessary for the proper and immediate carrying out of that intention.

"Each community may arm a section of volunteers or guerrillas of thirty men, equipped as infantry soldlers, which force will defend the country and operate under orders of the military authorities of the locality. Each section may be commanded by retired officers, or deputed officials, or by other persons of satisfactory qualifica-tions and antecedents.

The authorities of the villages who will "The authorities of the villages who will show themselves friendly within a term of ten days, and those of the vicinity of the same, and all those within its limits that are engaged in the insurrection, are warned to surrender themselves within the space of lifteen days from the publication of this production, otherwise, they will be subclamation, otherwise they will be sub-

ject to arrest. Rebels who may not be responsible for any other crime than rebellion, who within fifteen days present themseives to the nearest military authority, and who will assist in the apprehension of any one guilty of the burning, robbing and sacking, will not be molested, but will be placed at my disposal. Those who have presented themselves at any earlier time will be pardoned."

ALL QUIET IN MADRID. Though in Other Parts of Spain Disorders

Are Reported. MADRID, March 9 .- The disorders have ceased in this city, and the state of Mad-rid has been tranquil since the university was closed.

The gendarmes dispersed a crowd who were cheering in front of the French con-sulate in Barcelona as an expression of a hope for a Franco-Spanish alliance,

hope for a France-Spanish alliance.

Valencia was again in a turbulent state
yesterday over the condition of the relations between Spain and the United States.

A mob gathered and was proceeding towards the American consulate with the
intention of causing a disturbance there, but a force of police and gendarmes op-posed their passage through the streets. A desperate struggle ensued and several persons were wounde The mob succeeded in entering the plaza De Toros by destroying the gates leading to the bull ring. They then held a meeting in the arena. A state of slege was proclaimed.

Several foreign military officers, including some Englishmen, have offered their services to the Spanish minister of war, Senor Marcelo de Azcarraga, in the event of war between Spain and America. The official belief, however, is expressed that no conflict will occur. Patriotic demon-Strations have occurred throughout the country since the action of the United States congress on the Cuban question, and many wealthy Spaniards are offering money to the government. Several towns also have sent messages offering goods and the lives of their citizens in defense of the country. The shipowners of Seville have offered to place fifty steamers at the disposal of the government.

THE INSURGENTS' SIDE,

The War in Cuba as Reported by an Agent of the Patriots.

TAMPA, Fin., March 9.-Among the passengers arriving from Cuba last night was an insurgent emissary with important dis-patches from Antonio Macco to the junta in New York. This gentleman gives some interesting facts about the progress of the revolution and of plans which General Gomez intends putting into effect.

Macoo, he reports, is now at Cano, five miles from Havana, with 8,000 men. Gen-eral Weyler, the agent says, does nothing to disperse the encamped enemy who are occupying atrong positions all over the island awaiting Weyler's promised attack. Macco's march from the Viuetta Abajo district to Mattanzag province and back to Havana province, during which he was not attacked by the Spanish forces, is described as a promenade. Among other things mentioned in Macco's report is that from Jan. 1 to Feb. 20 he captured from the Spanish 2,800 Mauser and Remington rifles and other miscellaneous arms, be-sides a quantity of ammunition.

Since Weyler's proclamation fully 8,000 men have joined the insurrection in the province of Puerto Principe. General Gomez, the agent says, has returned there to raise an army of 9,000 in order that he may by April is a consequent. may by April, in conjunction with Macco's forces and others, consolidate an army of 40,000 men near Havana, and be prepared for an aggressive campaign.

ALLEGED SPANISH VICTORIES. Their Losses So Trilling as to Discredit

Havana, March 8.—An important engagement is afficially reported to have taken place in the contral portion of Matanus province. Colonel Vicuna reports that he met a force of insurgents numbering 7,000, and led by Maxim; Genez, Antonio Macco, Lacret and others at the plantation of Diam and at Abrens, in the district of Corral Falsa, They were dislodged from their positions by the troops, and made a precipitate flight towards Santal made a precipitate flight towards Santal Corral Falsa. and made a precipitate flight towards Sanmiguel De Los Banos. The insurgent loss is reported to be seventy-one killed and forty-two wounded left on the floid, as well as numerous others carried off. The insurgents also lost 200 horses. The loss of the troops was three killed and nineteen wounded.

General Pando also sends in a report that Maximo Gomez passed by Ladores in the Clenfuegos district. The columns of Lieutenant Colonel Loisun fought the insurgents at Sorplenies, Saneti Spirius. Volunteer troops at the plantation of Oviodo fought the insurgent leader Band-ramos, two privates being wounded and two taken privates. two taken prisoners.

The insurgents attacked, plundered and destroyed a passenger train from Cardemas. The train was carrying ammunition to a fort under construction at Artemiss. The firing was done by a band supposed to be that of Perico Delgalo. The train's escort was taken. The insurgents sustained a loss of men and borses.
