STILL IN THE BUSINESS.

The Old Justices of the Peace Continue in Harness. Justices M. J. Lawlor and John J. Gardin, who claim election as Justices of the Borough, have not yet instituted proceedings to oust the other Justices, but are making arrangements to take the step.

At Pottsville this morning answers were filed in rule for a mandamus to require the Judges of Election who have failed to do so to make official returns of the votes cast at the spring election for Lawlor and Gardin as Justices of the Peace.

The answer of the Fourth ward Judge of this town sets forth, among other things, that he knows nothing of what the Judge of Election in the First ward has done, or failed to do; that the officers are entirely distinct and, therefore, an error has been made in joining the two Judges as defendants in one suit.

The answer of the First ward Judge was practically the same. The Second and Fifth ward Judges are not interested in the proceedings, as they made their returns, and the Third ward Judge claims he made return to the Prothonotary for all votes cast at his poll.

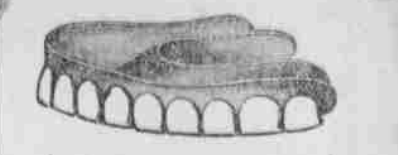
