THE INSURGENTS BUSY.

General Weyler Seems Still Unable to "Hem Them In."

MOVE ABOUT AS THEY PLEASE.

When the Captain General Decides That He Will Move to Matanzas in Order the More Conveniently to Direct Operations the Enemy Escapes Through the Line.

Havana, March 12.—The insurgents have fired upon a train escorted by troops in the vicinity of Guanajay, province of Plnar del Rio. The insurgents were repulsed with loss. The cane fields of Jesus Maria, Santa Maria and the houses of the village of Yareyai, as well as the villages of Holguin and Vereda Neuvo, province of Pinar del Rio, have been burned by the insurgents. The insurgents have also burned a church and the barracks of the gendarmes in a village without a garrison gendarmes in a village without a garrison

near Santlago de Cuba.

The police have captured a number of rifles, etc., in the houses of eight persons at Santiago de Cuba who intended to join the insurgents.

The lighthouse of San Antonio has recently been extinguished several times and in future it will be garrisoned by troops. The light referred to is situated at the extreme western end of the province of Pinar del Rio, on San Antonio.

A dispatch from Matanzas says that a mixed train between Guarreiras and Manguito has been captured by a numerous band of insurgents, who plundered it and afterwards burned the cars.

The Wadras battalion, between Mantua and Guane, province of Pinar del Rio, has had a skirmish with the insurgents under Pablo Oliva. The insurgents lost sixteen killed, left six wounded behind them and seited with the past of their wounded. retired with the rest of their wounded

On Tuesday it was announced that Cap-tain General Weyler would shortly remove his beadquarters from Havana to Matanzas in order the more conveniently to direct in order the more conveniently to direct the operations against the insurgents who retreated into Santa Clara. Meantime Macco and his followers, including Ban-ders and Lacret, seem to have turned upon their road, gone through the line of troops like small fish through the meshes of a seine, and made their way across the entire province of Matanzas. Before he en-countered a force of troops to oppose him he was at Nucza Pas, fairly across the Matanzas border and in Havana province again. Here he met the battalion of Al-manza with whom he had a brush, leaving seven killed, and proceeded on his

Maximo Gomez has not accompanied the present countermarch, according to the report received here, but is hovering around the borders of the Clenega swamp, practically inaccessible to Spanish troops

lunaties who are confined there, but they were driven off with a loss of three killed. A great fire is now burning in the sugar refinery at Rogla, on the other side of Ha-vana harbor. Nothing is reported to indi-cate that the fire is the work of insurgents.

Chicago Bucket Shop Prosecutions, CHICAGO, March 12.—The preliminary hearing of the cases against the bucket shop operators, who were recently indicted wholesale by the grand jury, came up be-fore Judge Horton yesterday. Pleas of not gullty were entered in nearly all the mass, and continuances were granted until next Monday, when dates will be fixed for the trials. It is probable that the messengers, stenographers and other em-ployes of the various bucket shops will not e prosecuted.

Accused Bank President Acquitted. SAN FRANCISCO, March 12.—R. H. Mc-Donald, Jr., president of the defunct Pacific bank, was yesterday acquitted of fal-sifying the records of the concern. Mo-Donald was arrested two years ago, after the failure of the Pacific bank, and has been in prison ever since. The jury dis-agreed in a former trial. There are sev-eral additional charges against McDonald, but it is not likely that he will be tried on any of the others.

Death of a Prominent Minister.

PITTSTON, Pa., March 12.-Rev. T. E. Colborn, corresponding secretary of the Foreign Missions of the Methodist Protest-ant church, died suddenly yesterday at the home of Rev. R. S. Hulsart. He was 49 years of age. He was to have lectured last Sunday, but was taken sick while coming from Pittsburg to Pittston, and on his arrival took to bed and never railted.

Fatal Disobedience of Orders,

Williamspour, Pa., March 19.—Two freight trains collided on the Northern Central railroad about thirty miles from here. Brakeman H. H. Van Nest, of El-mira, was killed, and Fireman R. C. Cummings seriously injured. The engineer on one of the trains is alleged to have disobeyed orders.
